I find myself writing this article now that all of the children and staff have gone home for the summer holiday. We're looking forward to a 'scorching' hot summer as promised by the Met office, but I'm not quite sure.... Sadly although we had a very exciting and successful Foundation and Key Stage 1 sports day where lots of parents and friends turned up, our Key Stage 2 sports afternoon was rained off on

two occasions. I think that judging with changing weather patterns next year we shall hold our sports days in June which has proven to be a drier month over the past 8 years.

What a busy term it has been with lots of successes!

#### **Curriculum Enrichment**

The children have enjoyed a number of visits out of school and some visitors into school to enrich their learning.

Foundation pupils enjoyed a train ride to Barton and later visited The Deep in Hull. Year 1 visited Sundown Adventure land near Retford and had an extra special day there. Year 2, as well as

enjoying a visit to the theatre to see 'The Tiger who came to Tea', took a train ride to Cleethorpes and had a lovely day building sand castles on the beach and lunch on the pier. Year 3 benefitted from a fantastic experience where a local artist from Artlandish Ltd visited them to work with environmental sculptures in their own classroom. The

results were magnificent and can be viewed by parents next term. Year 4 went on a visit to the Ropewalk at Barton and similarly came back with some fantastic art work which again will be on display next term. Year 5 experienced enrichment from the visiting poet Dave Webb as well as participating in Cycling proficiency where all pupils passed the award. There were further sporting and musical successes for the year 5 children. Year 6 visited Caistor Outdoor Pursuit centre rewarding them for all of their hard work over the course of the year and enjoyed a very busy week on their residential visit in June. As well as all of this they made us really proud by achieving much success in their year 6 tests they sat in May.

52% achieved Level 5

In Science 92% of children achieved Level 4 and

68% achieved Level 5

We said sad farewells to 3 members of staff at the end of the term namely Miss Thompson, Mrs Dixon and Mrs Jackson and wished them much success in their future ventures.

We look forward to the autumn term where future projects will include the development of a new garden area, a new integrated services building on

the school site, an art project which we will use to support us in successfully securing an Artsmark Accreditation and we will participate again in Operation Christmas Child where we are setting a target for 200 boxes this year. The school recognises enormous educational gains in all of these projects. More details on each of these will follow in



September.

Finally, again I would like to thank all of the community and parents for the warm support you have all given to the school and myself over the past year and in making our Summer Fayre such a huge success. I know that if we don't get fantastic weather over the summer holiday, September will be a bright month when all of the staff will look forward to welcoming the children back to school to start another journey!

# LETTERS FROM THE CHURCHES

In our lifetime we will enter into many covenants. A covenant is basically an agreement between two or more people, usually where both parties bring something to exchange be it money for services, payment in kind, a marriage covenant, vote for me and I promise ....etc, etc. etc. Covenants are generally sealed by signature or handshake nowadays but in Biblical times it was common for a covenant to be sealed by the shedding of sacrificial blood. God made covenants with his people in the Bible, for example with Noah, David and Abraham. He is still prepared to make a covenant with us today! What we can bring to this agreement is not money or material goods. After all, God has no need of what he can supply anyway. No, what he wants is ourselves, our body and our soul, our heart, our whole being, our past, both good and bad, our sicknesses and weaknesses, our pride, our battles and our sins. What God brings to the agreement includes eternal life, healing, a future, forgiveness, hope, peace, redemption, righteousness, love, justice and so on. In effect God says to us "give me your life and I will give you mine, your battles are my battles, give me your past and I will give you a future". God's son, Jesus, was the sacrifice who sealed this covenant for us.

What remains is for us to live in the fullness of the covenant. God cannot and will not ever break his covenant but neither will he compel us to keep our part of the bargain. We can, and do, make daily choices to live in the blessings of his covenant such as choosing not to do things in our own strength but to rely on God. If we take back any part of our lives we prevent Him from fulfilling his part of the covenant and we are the ones who end up in a mess. Let's try to make the right choices.

The season of earth's local harvest is in full flourish, and with some of the first year of produce from my husband David's allotment the freezer is already bursting and others have had a share.

Over the years David has also cultivated thousands of sweet peas, wonderful colours and glorious perfume, and mainly sold for church funds. When we lived in Lancashire we had a bucket of water holding bunches of sweet peas down at the roadside and an honesty pot next to it. Not quite so easy to sell them now we live at the end of a cul - de - sac!

Anyway, at the bottom of our Manse garden at that time we had a Bramley apple tree and up until the the year we moved that tree had but one apple per year. We would eventually pick it, stuff it with dried fruit and bake it, then share it between us. Same gardener, but very different result. One amazingly bountiful, blessing dozens of folk, the other rather embarrassingly frugal.

Jesus told us, in the parable of the sower, of the farmer scattering seed and the various conditions that stopped a good crop, contrasting it with the seed that fell on good soil, 'where it produced a crop - a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown' (Matthew Chapter 13); same farmer, but contrasting harvests.

We all have the same good God, who longs for us to put our roots of faith deep into His love and power and produce a good crop. What is a good crop in the Kingdom of God? Living in Jesus to God's purposes and blessing others through His abundance to each of us. 'All we can do is nothing worth unless God blesses the deed, vainly we hope for the harvest - tide till God gives life to the seed' states the well - known hymn. In God's eyes what kind of harvest is our life producing, beyond measure or barely visible?

# Can you help improve our LIVES?

LIVES is the Lincolnshire Integrated Voluntary Emergency Service, a registered charity number 1098364.

One of the disadvantages of our rural location is that it can take an ambulance longer to reach us. At best the delay can add to the stress of waiting and in extreme cases, particularly cardiac arrest, every minute can literally be the difference between life and death. LIVES consists of volunteers like you who can spare a few hours a week to be on call to attend and offer emergency care until the ambulance arrives. Most times the ambulance will arrive soon after, or even before, you do – but in those exceptions you will be on hand with equipment that can help and which you have been fully trained to use.

Our local branch of LIVES covers Goxhill, Barrow and New Holland with several volunteers from each of those villages regularly on call. But we are not there all the time. To enable us to provide cover for more hours and days each week, we need more volunteers. You receive full initial training, with monthly updates and support from your fellow volunteers. All equipment is provided and you only commit to being on call when you can fit it in.

# **HANWAG**



#### **Beware of Card Games!**

HANWaG recently alerted neighbourhood watch groups to the problem of substitution credit and debit card frauds. These can occur any time that you let the card out of your sight, even for a moment, perhaps when paying for goods.

What happens is that an expired card of the same type is swapped for your own valid card. If you spot the substitution then your own card is returned with the explanation "I'm sorry, I mistakenly picked up the wrong card from behind the till. That one was confiscated by us on the bank's instructions when a customer tried using it earlier today."

To protect yourself, try to develop the habit of glancing at your credit or debit card whenever you return it to your purse or wallet. If somebody tries this scam on you then please do report it – either to the manager of the store or restaurant or to your own card provider. If the exchange was a genuine mistake then nobody should mind you being cautious. If it was a scam then you will have done your bit to save someone else from becoming a victim.

What can make this particular fraud worse is that, as you would not know your card had been stolen, you could not report it stolen. Theoretically that could mean you having to stump up for any fraudulent purchases right up until you realise and report it stolen.

# Ploughing in Goxhill in the Eighteenth

Century

There are some beautifully preserved iron Ploughs to be seen in Goxhill and it is easy to picture the scene as the ploughman and his team of horses plough the land. That is recent history the Iron plough

was introduced at the beginning of the nineteenth century. By the year 1840 all of the land was ploughed by the new light iron ploughs drawn by teams of horses. What happened before the iron plough was used? For more than a thousand years the plough simply scratched the surface and the field was ploughed twice the second time at right angles to the first. This shallow cultivation produced very light crops.

In the twelfth century a new heavier plough began to be used which was made of wood with an Iron blade (Share) which cut through the soil allowing a flat wooden mould board to push the soil over to the side leaving a furrow which was deep and wide. This deeper cultivation of the soil produced heavier crops but was much harder work for the plough man and the animals which pulled the plough. For about six or seven hundred years there was then little change in the way that the soil was cultivated. This heavy wooden plough remained in use until the industrial revolution made iron readily available and manufacturing techniques enabled strong light Iron ploughs to be made at reasonable cost.

The wooden plough had a variety of designs in different parts of the country and I do not know which type of plough was used here. We do however have some information from the records of Thomas and Joseph Hardy 1762 Iron for both the ploughs weight to Thos Young 57lbs.

That is 3237 cubic centimetres of iron or a piece about half an inch thick and four inches wide by seven inches long for each plough. They let their blacksmith work each year to a blacksmith in the village.

Michaelmas Last 1784 an agreement made with Thos Brown Blacksmith for to shoe 6 horses and keep two ploughs in repair and 2 pair of harrows and all things belonging there to and to find new shares for £1:18s:0d per year

For the year 1787 the sum was £2:2s:0d

This wooden plough was a big heavy structure it had to be to give it the strength required. This made it difficult to manoeuvre and to pull. The motive power was provided in the main by oxen which may seem surprising but there were sound economic reasons for this. The choice was between horses and oxen. Oxen can live and work all the year round on a diet of grass and low quality hay. Horses require oats and good hay. Horses are perceived to be faster than oxen because they are seen to trot and gallop but farm work is done at

walking pace and ploughing with horses is little faster than with oxen. When the useful life of a horse was over it is of no value. When the ox finished its working life it could be put out to grass to fatten and then it could be sold to the butcher for meat for about the same price as was paid for it, (How about a tractor that has a scrap value the same as was paid

for it and runs on grass).

The record of animals bought and sold by Thomas and Joseph Hardy records the name of the buyer or seller and the price and the type of animal. This is Horse, Cow, Heifer, Beast, but always for Oxen the quantity of 2 is given. Oxen were bought and sold in pairs never singly. Stock men were always looking out for big male beasts that could become working oxen. They were paired when very young and were trained to live and work together. They worked together for the whole of their working lives and were never far apart. They were always yoked together side by side and one was the right hand and the other the left hand animal. They were given names and answered to voice command.

There were several problems in using oxen for although they ate grass it did not provide long lasting energy so that by mid day the ox needed to refuel and to spend the afternoon eating grass. As they walk quite slowly to fetch them from pasture in the Neatgangs to the village field where they were to work could take a whole morning so when they were working they had to be kept in a close near to home. The eight oxen plough team would probably not be needed for the soil at Goxhill and four oxen yoked in two pairs could be used but the length of the team and the plough would require a big headland for turning at the end of the furrow. Two men worked together the ox man drove the oxen and the plough man guided the plough and kept it in the furrow.

This heavy wooden plough with its team of oxen shaped the ridge and furrows of the open fields of Goxhill before the enclosure but at about that time some farmers began to use two oxen and one horse for ploughing because the horse kept the oxen moving faster. The note above regarding the blacksmith work may suggest that this happened here but horses were mainly used to pull carts for transport. When the smaller fields created by enclosure had to be ploughed the wide headlands needed to turn the oxen were a problem and horses began to replace the oxen.

# PARISH COUNCIL


It was good to see summer return to Goxhill albeit briefly, but not so welcomed was the increase in speeding and general disregard to road regulations that appear to accompany the good weather. Lately this appears to be gathering momentum with many near misses being reported on Ferry Road where the traffic joining from Howe Lane takes no notice of the give way that is required there. Equally the same problem is happening at the junction of Thornton Road where the traffic joining from Goxhill Road fails to give way to the traffic approaching from either direction. This problem is further exacerbated by the speed of the traffic travelling in both directions on Thornton Road which is 30 mph. The other problem here is the lack of courtesy being shown by drivers when passing parked vehicles. Only too often nobody slows down and some drivers appear to be happy to damage their cars rather than show some courtesy to their fellow motorist. If the obstruction is on your side why not wait until the approaching traffic has passed before attempting to pass the obstruction. You might be comfortable with the width of your vehicle and where exactly it can fit through but the driver coming the other way may not be so happy and the sight of a vehicle coming the other way at them could be enough to cause an accident. Luckily it has not happened yet so why not employ the strategy of slowing down and give way if the hazard is on your side. At most it takes seconds for the vehicle to pass and all will be happy. Goxhill is a lovely village so please do not let it be spoiled by dangerous driving and intolerance to our fellow motorists.

Another activity that increases with the good weather of course is gardening and it is pleasing to note that the village is looking splendid especially when the sun is shining. There is just one small point that we the Parish Council would ask is that you consider the visual impact the removal of the trees and shrubs might have on the visual aspect that can be seen by everyone in the village. There is no way we would wish to tell you how to manage your garden but all we ask that you consider the impact on the overall presentation of the village when and if the trees, shrubs or bushes are removed and just ask yourself one more time if it is really necessary to remove them. Your continuing assistance in this is very much appreciated.

Finally are you aware that plots in the village cemetery can be pre-bought. Further detail can be sought from the Parish Clerk.

Yes I know I missed the last edition of the "Gander" and in truth, I nearly missed this one. I was surprised at the number of people who have commented on it's absence. Life was just so hectic I forgot... Anyway – I'm here now – late as usual with the sun beckoning me outside to do the jobs I should have done yesterday. I usually have a backlog and end up taking a days annual leave to catch up so if anyone out there is into poo picking, fence mending and painting, driving a tractor or general tidying up please give me a call!

I mentioned in the Spring edition I had a pony on loan called Rosie. She is partly why more of my time has been taken up because I wanted to bring her on slowly. I must say she is a little treasure although we seemed to hit a blank when it came to steering, rounding down and she refused to canter. This is not normal. It would have been easy to follow advice of other horse owners to put side reins on or "whack" her to make her canter but thank goodness I didn't. At this time Jean Fowler came to fit a show saddle. What a sales woman! I ended up with a beautiful "general purpose" but it fits both Rosie and myself perfectly. My six-year-old great niece is comfortable on it too.. Still no show saddle!

It was Jean who confirmed Rosie's back and shoulder were "not right" and recommended Barbara Hughes who is an Equine Therapist.

Barbara duly came out and was appalled at Rosie's condition. I must say at this point it was nothing that I had done as we had had her October/November time and gave her time to build up and only started on her at Easter very slowly. I know who had her as a yearling and they later put her in foal. The people I have her from have done nothing at all with her so it is the period in between when she had some form of breaking in when the damage was done. She had been broken in very badly.

Barbara left me with some massaging to do on Rosie and I will call her back possibly once a month until she is back on track. Meanwhile she cannot be ridden. If anyone needs an Equine Therapist please contact me and it would make her visit worthwhile and help keep costs down.

I hope this information will make people more aware that if there is a problem in training it is worth getting the horse checked over. They cannot tell us if they are in pain and sometimes they are physically incapable of doing what is asked of them and they are not just being naughty.

It does not matter if an equine is a miniature, a thoroughbred or a heavy horse they can all have problems from falling in the field, being badly broken or just from the type of work they have done particularly in the case of ex racehorses. The first thing I will do from now on if I get a new horse is to get it checked out. Had I done this when I first acquired Rosie I could have saved the first six months being wasted as she would have been right by now. She has done one show where she was a respectable 5<sup>th</sup>, two Pony Club rallies and Pony Club camp. She was taken on a year loan agreement so for what we have done with her plus the new saddle and various rugs and bits and pieces it has been an expensive exercise. Will I renew the loan? Of course I will she is a lovely pony. Next I will have her and my others teeth done so if anyone is in need of a Qualified Horse Dental Technician please let me know.

Worming is next on the agenda for all my girls and Fort Dodge Animal Health are offering a quick easy guide in the form of a jigsaw puzzle (4 pieces!) featuring Equest and Equest Paramox wormers and there is also a free wall chart to help keep track of a worming programme. Another wormer on the market comes in a palatable apple flavour tablet called Equimax. This sounds nice and easy but I am not sure which worms it targets, so may have to be considered as part of a worming regime. We keep hoping for a bit more sun but since it is now August there is not much time left. Should it become really hot do be aware that horses get sunburn too. Particularly horses with white muzzles and socks. Use a high factor sunscreen or bring them in during the day and put them out again at night where possible. This may also help to alleviate the midges biting and the awful sores of "sweet itch".

Possible Laminetic horses and ponies would also benefit from being brought in, with non-edible bedding and water. I hear of more and more horses getting it and the onset can be so quick. There are now more things on the market as there is a better understanding of the disease. Ready mixed feed for laminetics is ready available along with supplements. A new one on the market called Lamin Tec 5-HT sounds interesting and for more information contact Battles www.battles.co.uk

Goxhill Show was once again a great success with many of our local riders having a really good day. Eva Border won the Ridden Hunter on Teresa Leaning's horse *Sebastian*. Well done Eva!

Jill Fisher was placed with her horse in the Veterans and *Billy Wizz* with Chloe Foulston was also in the ribbons.

As always, it takes months of preparation by the Committee to organise the show and without the kind permission of Mr and Mrs Faulding for the use of their land it would not be possible. They are desperately short of helpers the night before the show in the setting up of rings and jumps and the night after the show in taking it all apart again and clear the field. I spoke to lovely young men who said they would be willing to assist next year and possibly gather some of their friends. I do hope they will and I will remind them in the spring edition. Or knock on doors!

It is important we safeguard our smaller shows for all sorts of reasons. Both Ulceby and Barton Shows have stopped so we only have Goxhill and East Halton and East Halton is in danger.

When most of the local shows started the dates fell in between haymaking and harvest. As the weather pattern is all over the place the two now coincide.

At East Halton the whole family is involved. It then becomes economically not viable if two tractors and two men are playing with ropes and jump poles when harvest is ready to be done or they are playing catch up on hay making so decisions have to be made year by year.

Now, just a quick word on bridleways. I know people can get quite cross with horses leaving droppings on the roads but it does not carry disease like dog poo. Green Ramper is still within the 30 mile hour limit and doggie doos should be picked up. Our horses tread in it and we continue our ride with flies buzzing all around us so please have a bit of consideration. I was riding through one day with a friend when a man (he knows who he is) picked up his dogs leavings. We both commented how good he was when he proceeded to swing the little bag round his head and catapult it over the hedge! I believe there are bins at either end so no excuses.

I know it doesn't bear thinking about but winter is nearly upon us. Time to get all the rugs out washed, repaired and reproofed. I have someone collect mine and returned the following week and they are very competitive. If you have some and would like the number or alternatively you could leave them with me please contact me.

A few months ago I had some people from London staying with me and I left a copy of the "Gander" by their bed. Over breakfast I asked if they had read it. They replied, "Yes, but cor blimey you don't arf bang on about 'orses". I think they missed the point!

I cannot close this edition without the mention of the death of Julie Portess who died in hospital last month. Julie was well known amongst the farming community in Goxhill. Her husband, Eric kept Shire horses, which he loved. They farmed down the Marsh for many years until Eric became ill. Julie moved into Barton and continued to keep active particularly on the Country and Western front helping every month at Barnetby and joining in the odd line dance. She will be well remembered and greatly missed.

That about wraps it up for now so until the next time.



# BAYSGARTH NEWS



Welcome to the next update from Baysgarth School. Much has happened since the last edition of the Goxhill Gander, so here is a taste of what has been going on.

Yet again Baysgarth has built upon the sports success of previous years and these are some of the highlights of our sporting prowess over this summer term. Athletics has been traditionally a strong activity at Baysgarth, this year being no exception with some strong performances both individually and as a school. Back in May we had a record of 7 athletes for the County Athletics Championships. They were: Kate Ward (Javelin), James Caldwell (Long Jump), Jake Williams (Javelin), Rachel Stoney (Shot Putt), Ben Shoebridge (Sprinting & Relay), Alec Russell (Hammer & Discus), Bradley Gubbins (High Jump). The summer of 2009 has been unique in Baysgarth sporting history as not just one athlete, but two, qualified for the All English Schools Finals at Sheffield. This was a televised athletics competition to which only the elite performers in the country can qualify. To illustrate this, previous winners have included Paula Radcliffe and Phillips Idowu. So our congratulations go to Rachel Stoney (Shot Putt) who finished 10<sup>th</sup> with a throw of 9.70m & Alec Russell (Hammer) who threw a personal best of 42.07m to finish 8<sup>th</sup>. In the Scunthorpe & District Athletics competition Rachel got us off to a great start by winning the shot putt & discus. Building on that success Kate Ward won the Javelin and Stacey Heseltine was champion in the 100m. These successes, alongside solid performances from the rest of the Year 9 girls, resulted in them winning the team competition. Some outstanding individual performances by the other Baysgarth students resulted in wins by Richard Hamilton in Javelin and Long Jump. Alec Russell in shot. Tom Bowes in the Javelin. Jack Bowskin in the 400m and Maria Goodley in the discus.

Sports Day As part of the schools aim to involve everybody in sport and physical activity we held our 30th annual sports day here at Baysgarth. Even the weather part way through the morning couldn't dampen the spirits of those involved. We were delighted with the whole day and impressed as 4 more new records were set. These were: Laura Bartup (Yr8), Triple Jump. 7.51m, Chelsea Timmis (Yr8), 400m, 80.9s, Jasmine McNaught (Yr 9), Triple Jump, 8m, Rachel Stoney (Yr 9), Shot Putt, 9.70m. As an ex Baysgarth student still holds the national junior 1500metre record we like to honour this by rewarding the fastest 1500m boy and girl who were Jack Bowskin and Sophie Vicary. Bardney house were the overall winners – well done to them and everybody who took part!

Volleyball In a brand new competition set up by Mr Sprakes and Mrs Hodge, Baysgarth hosted the inaugural Humberside and Lincolnshire volleyball competition. 14 teams entered including 3 from Baysgarth. In a tense final against the number 4 team



in the country, St Marys from Hull, the Baysgarth 'A' team came through to win, making them the area champions.

**Rounders:** Baysgarth's strength in depth showed yet again with Year 7, 9 & 10 teams all reaching the semi-finals of district tournaments.

Author Alan Gibbons visits Baysgarth to welcome the prestigious author, Alan Gibbons to Baysgarth School on 15<sup>th</sup> May. Whilst with us, he delighted audiences of year 7 and 8 students with an assembly before delivering three workshops to pupils in year 7, 8 and 9. Pupils were wowed by his descriptive story telling and his mesmerising teaching showing them how to create and write their own stories. Pupils were skillfully led through all the stages needed to create an exciting piece of fictional writing and were encouraged further by a competition organised by Mrs Codd and members of the English department to write their own short story.
