Goodbyes

'Goodbye', a word we may use often and in many different instances throughout our lives from childhood to being an adult, and with so many meanings and forms. Our own usage is not necessarily complex, but it could be layered and complicated.

As a young child, I remember being told to "Give your grandfather a kiss and tell him goodbye." Dutifully, I would give the kiss and say: "Bye Grandpa." But when I was outside and finished playing with the neighbourhood kids, my typical phrase would be: "Bye, gotta' go."

As a teenager [now that's been a day or two ago] there was the one word 'bye' but used in so many ways. There's the not paying attention and leaving house quickly 'bye' but it could've also been a very demonstrative 'BYE!!' due to a disagreement with Mom, as to when I would finished my chores. Then again, if you were speaking to someone you really liked, the word might have an incredibly soft and gentle sound to it. What slang did you use with your mates to communicate you were leaving? I remember the word: 'Whatever' was a catch phrase for many of my actions.

As an adult, we take all of the above and move into the world of 'forgetting' to say 'goodbye' and the ensuing accusations of "Yes, I did" and "No, you didn't." It seems appropriate to also include that, as adults, we may also intentionally NOT say 'goodbye.' In addition, the cynic in me at times would change a leaving goodbye phrase like "I've mixed emotions of sadness and joy" into "I've mixed emotions of joy and happiness."

In recent years, I have tried to work on having a 'good' goodbye because I've realized that in the past, I've chosen otherwise. That effort is still a work in-progress. Why have you said 'goodbye' recently? Not long ago the spouse of a special person in my life died. There was a compelling need to attend the thanksgiving service at church; that 'goodbye' was for the person and their spouse. It was emotional and soul searching; my presence was an attempt to help fill the void of one spouse for the other.

Goodbyes and loss are not only attributed to human beings. Mine is for a dog named Bobbie, the last of the family of four West Highland Terriers that moved with me from the US to the UK. There was at least one Westie in the house [up to 4] for 18 years. I was with Bobbie the second she was born and also when she died. At the moment, I'm grieving her loss and am slowly saying "Goodbye."

Our 'goodbyes' (and losses) begin by telling another "Goodbye" when we walk out a door and continue until the day when we finally grieve their passing and say a final "Goodbye."





Goxhill WI visit Far Ings National Nature Reserve

Back in February Leanne Smart from the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust, came to give us a fascinating talk on the History and Wildlife of Far Ings National Nature Reserve, on the South Bank of the River Humber at Barton upon Humber.

We heard how the pits at Far Ings were dug for their clay to feed a thriving brick and tile making industry along the banks of the Humber. As time went on the industry diminished, and by the 1950's clay was no longer dug there. Nature encroached on the clay pits; great swathes of reed beds developed at the sides of deep stretches of open water.

Back in 1983 Far Ings was purchased by the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust. My father, Sam van den Bos, was the Chairman of the local area group and was the driving force behind the purchase. He had visited these pits bird watching as a young man and knew their importance as a habitat for wildlife; especially the rare and elusive Bittern. He felt that they were at risk with the development of new industry all along the banks of the Humber.

He pushed for a visitors centre and the reserve is dedicated to his memory. Today, Far Ings is an extremely well managed National Nature Reserve, and, with careful management, is home to several pairs of nesting Bittern.

After our talk on Far Ings, some Goxhill WI members wanted to visit the reserve, so I volunteered to lead the visits, on two separate dates planned around people's work commitments, family life or hectic schedules. I am not an expert but have enough knowledge to make it enjoyable (I hope).

During our visit we were lucky enough to see Marsh Harrier, Common Tern, Great Crested Grebe feeding young and families of Canada geese, Mallard, Coot and Moorhen. We heard the

FRIENDS OF THE BARTON LINE

The Friends of the Barton Line congratulate outgoing secretary, Anthony Berridge on being awarded the annual Barton town award. That nominations were made from organisations across the town, including the Barton Civic Society, Barton Cleethorpes Community Rail Partnership, Barton Lions and ourselves is testament to the outstanding work he has done over the past 25 years.

Summer Sunday Barton Line trains are now in operation and will continue until 8th September. Monday - Saturday services continue to operate as before with minor timetable changes having occurred in May. Service reliability has improved, with a decline in the number of cancellations due to lack of drivers following the implementation of an interim rest day working agreement with the ASLEF union.

The first refurbished EMR regional train has made its debut on the Barton Line, with improvements including a dedicated cycle area, new seats, a new passenger information system and at seat electricity sockets to enable the charging of mobile telephones and laptop computers. Refurbished trains are now expected to enter service at a rate of one per month, so the enhanced facilities will be seen on the Barton Line more often as the project continues.

Transpennine Express have introduced new advance fares from the Barton Line to connect into their services at Habrough. These fares are subject to availability, must be used on the booked train and generally cheaper the further in advance you book. Sample single fares from Goxhill are:

Our friends at Barton Cleethorpes Community Rail Partnership have completed new artworks at Stallingborough, Great Coates, Grimsby Docks and in the booking office at Cleethorpes, so look out for those on your Barton Line journeys. They have also held a community action day at Goxhill station as part of Community Rail Week, with volunteers from BCCRP, EMR and FBL working together to repaint the fence at the station.

On the buses, the 260 Barton Villager service has moved from Stagecoach to 21 Transport, still running to the same timetable.

To celebrate the 200th anniversary of the modern railway in Britain and Heritage Open Days a talk on **British Transport**Films by Barry Coward at Joseph Wright Hall on Tuesday

16th September at 19:30. This ties in with the 17:34 train from Goxhill to Barton and the 22:05 train from Barton back to Goxhill. On the exact 200th anniversary, Saturday 27th September, there will be a guided walk around New Holland and around the riverbank to Barrow Haven. This will tie in with the 11:31 train from Goxhill to New Holland and the 15:56 from Barrow Haven back to Goxhill. There are likely to be further events to be announce so please do keep an eye on the Facebook and our website.

Local Patching Roundup for June 2025

As so often happens as we move into June and the summer months, things usually quieten down with regards to the birding scene, but things ticked over nicely on my four visits to the local patch during the month.

Saturday 7th June - Today I travelled along all the areas at East Halton, Winter's Pond, Marsh Lane, East Halton Village and the Skitter.

Highlights to the lovely sight of 3 Med Gulls together at the Skitter, a good record and a new species for my local patch year list. The trio was 2 1st summer and a 2nd summer bird, giving nice scope views as they fed along the shore with a flock of Black-headed Gulls.

The other highlight was a 1st summer Peregrine as it flew along Skitter Road, scattering local Corvids in all directions. The same immature female seen in the spring. Others seen included a Mistle Thrush on the edge of the marshes, 2 Little-ringed Plover and 2 pairs of Shelduck with 10 and 9 ducklings respectively.

Saturday 14th - A misty start at Goxhill today had the effect I hoped for, as it can disorientate seabirds at this time of year. It did the trick, with first an unseasonal Darkbellied Brent Goose flying west off the haven, followed later by the amazing sight of 31 Kittiwakes in a tight bunched flock, headed out along the estuary. Both sightings are good for the time of year, a species usually associated with October or November, not mid-June.

Another Med Gull seen today, as a spanking adult flew close inshore and later another flew west, such striking birds in summer plumage.

Other nice sightings consisted of 2 Yellow Wagtail, 4 Bearded Tit, 4 Marsh Harrier and 5 Teal. A lovely encounter with a buck Roe Deer gave great photos.

Sunday 22nd - A productive visit to East Halton today, saw autumn migration beginning, with 90 Lapwing, 25 Blacktailed Godwit, 2 Green Sandpiper and a male Ruff

seen on East Halton Marshes, with 6 Little-ringed Plover. Wildfowl numbers were also beginning to increase with 4 Pochard, 20 Teal, 93 Mallard, 190 Greylag and 17 Mute Swans seen on Winter's Pond.

Other sightings included 3 Marsh Harrier and 2 Greatspotted Woodpecker. **Sunday 29th** - A short visit to Goxhill today before the sweltering temperatures later in the day, with a respectable 59 species recorded between Dawson City and the Old Boatyard.

Highlight was my earliest returning juvenile Wheatear along the flood bank near Dawson City. I managed some

decent pics and video of this little cracker.

Other highlights along here included an adult Yellow-legged Gull sat on a lightship off the haven, 37 Black-tailed Godwit and a single Grey Partridge.

Best non-bird sighting went to a cracking Darkgreen Fritillary as it bombed past along the

shore while I was watching the Wheatear.

A decent month overall, now the autumn migration begins and we will see what it turns up!.

Fabulous Flamborough, Friday 11th July 2025

With the weather continuing hot and sunny, I finished work, picked Mrs R up and headed over to Flamborough for the afternoon and early evening.

First things first, and we had some lovely scoff in the Headlands Restaurant and then it was off exploring.

We spent the next 3 hours or so watching the Grey Seals and feeding flocks of Gannets and Kittiwakes off the headland, with many passing flocks of Auks heading back towards the seabird cliffs at Bempton to feed their chicks.

It was encouraging to see so many seabirds looking fit and

healthy, with lots of Kittiwake chicks on the nesting ledges, a change to a few years ago when avian influ broke out. We also managed to see a few Puffins, including one sleeping close to where we were sat.

JOYCE McDONALD'S STORY

From Bombs to Blessings: A Wartime Childhood Remembered

6 Hello. My name is Joyce McDonald and I have lived in Goxhill for 29 years. I am 94 years old and I was almost 9 when war was declared in 1939.

I lived in Hull and was bombed out four times as well has having traumatic experiences. This is my story of that time. **9**

Sitting in a quiet garden listening to a song thrush singing her beautiful tunes I am feeling so happy and safe. A new sound joins in. It is the church bells in our lovely village reminding us of other times 80 years ago. It is May 2025 and memories come flooding back of the early years long ago.

In a little terrace house in Hull, a big northern city, is a happy and contented little family consisting of three sons, all over 20 years of age, two of whom are married and one son aged around 20 years. There is also a very young spoilt little sister who thinks the world revolves around her. The family have very little but manage to enjoy life and each other.

Joyce is happy at school with friends playing outside, marbles, hopscotch, skipping and lots of fun made up games. Every evening, they all listen to the radio and play Ludo, Snakes and Ladders and some easy card games, around a roaring fire. And then after singing the Ovaltineys song, Joyce is taken to bed and it is story time. Feeling loved and safe she is full of happiness and secure in her comfortable world.

The weekends were another lovely treat. Saturday mornings are spent at a dance class learning tap dancing and ballet. In the afternoon mum took her to town to see the big shops. More games and the radio after tea and the enjoyable comfortable secure time went on.

Sunday morning was chapel time, calling first at Auntie Edna's for a penny for the collection box. We sang our hearts out and went back for a lovely Sunday dinner. Brother George was Auntie Edna's husband but too old to call her just Edna. Sunday afternoon was dad's turn. They got onto their bicycles and went a few miles into the country. Their destination was a little cafe with a slide and a few swings. After some pop and a bite to eat, more games and radio and ready for school on Monday. Such happiness.

On 3rd September 1939, everything suddenly changed. The second world war was declared. The priority of every caring parent was to get the children to a safer place out in the country. Joyce found herself at the railway station along with many other children with gas masks, cases and in Joyce's case, her beloved teddy bear too.

Loathe to loosen the grip of her mother's hand, eventually they were all on the way to North Yorkshire. Standing in a village hall and being looked over by potential land ladies was an uncomfortable feeling, but eventually a lady chose Joyce to be in her charge along with two other children.

It was not a big house, but as only for a while, it was to be our home. We were not shown any kindness but mainly ignored and left to our own devices. At the table they had to stand to eat tasteless food, clear away and wash up.

It was a long walk to school. Joyce was eight years old and the two other girls slightly older. They did as they were told and just

went along with the usual routine.

After a short while when nothing much seemed to be happening it was agreed that they would all be sent home to Hull to their families, as Hull seemed safe enough after all. Such joy for all the homesick children.

Back in the bosom of their loving families' life was wonderful again and the lovely secure happy life began again. There was a difference though...instead of the comfy bed, they slept in the air raid shelter. They heard bomber aircraft most evenings and when shrapnel fell on the roof it was more points for their war effort, to collect them the next morning.

Until they all saw flattened buildings the significance of it all gradually came into their understanding. There were fires and more and more evidence that this was not the place for the children after all.

Again, they were all taken to the railway station. Again gripping their mum's hand until the very last second and knowing that once they let go, there would be a new place to live, much safer than the badly bombed city of Hull.

This time Joyce fared much worse in the new place chosen for her to live. The farmhouse not far from York took on nine children of whom Joyce was the youngest at 9 years of age. The last in the dirty bath water on a Friday night.

Hair was infected and cut off. Some purple medication was applied making her a laughingstock at school and indeed everywhere she went.

They all stood up to eat around the table. Cleared the dishes, washed up and were sent to bed at 6pm. Looking out of the windows watching other children play. They had all to be up early to do all the household chores. Cleaning the black leaded Article continues on page 29

The Hull Blitz 1941

When letters from home arrived, they would not let us read them but blacked out what they did not want the children to know. When they replied they censored those letters too, so they did not know much at all.

There was an occasion when Joyce upset the homeowners. They locked her in a barn where there were dead birds along with meat on hooks overhead. Joyce wrapped herself in straw and hay in case there were droppings. This went on all day with no food or drink until it was dark. She collapsed in bed eventually and sometime in the early hours, made a decision.

Joyce packed her case, grabbed her gas mask and case, unlocked the back door and just set off walking, hopefully towards Hull and the security of home.

A lorry stopped after some time and the kind driver asked a few questions. He agreed to take her home and away from this dreadful place. A man of his word. Sometime later we arrived on the doorstep of sanity.

Wonderful as it was to be home with loved ones it was completely ruined by the many differences. It even smelt different. Smoke debris and strange sounds filled the air.

Within three days we were again without a home. Areas around us were flattened and our home was completely unliveable, with no windows, broken furniture and destruction everywhere.

Again, the church provided blankets and pillows, food and comfort. Obviously many people contributed to help in all sad situations and we were not the only sufferers. It was times many. Such a wonderful spirit that Hull, along with other cities, had.

This time my brave dad arranged for mum and me to be sent to safety together. Yorkshire was our destination. A farmhouse where Mum helped and enjoyed country life. I went to a nice little school and life was pleasant once more. This must have helped Mum in her grief, as all of my brothers were missing. She never showed any sign of being upset to me.

As it turned out, they would be prisoners of war. Harold in Italy, Eric in Germany and George was shipwrecked by torpedoes. They were just missing for a dreadful period of time and would be constantly on her mind.

Dad was an Air Raid Warden and had accommodation at Mona House district 12 on Beverly Road. He helped the fire watchers and kept checks on no lights anywhere. Everyone walked about in the dark. There were no road signs (Oh for a sat nav then. Beyond our wildest dreams).

In Scunthorpe some family friends lived. Auntie Vi and Uncle Peter. They had two children Grace two years younger than me and Peter seven years younger.

One night when they were waiting to get into a theatre at The Savoy, people were discussing the fact that a family had been wiped out in Hull at an Air Warden's headquarters. They immediately went to Hull to check this fact. I cannot imagine how. Not many people had a car in those days so they must have thought it was imperative.

Luckily at that time, my mother and I were on a short visit to see my dear Dad. We were safe and not the family who had been wiped out. However, amazement all round. Auntie Vi and Uncle Peter invited Mum and me to live with them safely in Scunthorpe.

What a lovely place. They had a modern house with an indoor toilet and bathroom. Such luxury was unknown by us. There was even hot water and we had never known that anywhere. I was 11 and a half by this time, so Grace, their daughter, and I enjoyed dance classes and cinema and really appreciated this new wonderful life.

One day after school I was setting the table for tea. Auntie Violet said that it was the wrong way. I answered that is what my mum says is right.

She shouted, "Your mum, she is not your mum. I AM YOUR MUM!" AT THAT MOMENT, MY WORLD CAME CRASHING DOWN.

My lovely mum was not related to me. It seems Violet had me at 20 years of age. She put me in Dr Barnardo's home until I was legally adopted as Violet handed me over at 10 months, to begin my life with so much love in the Pearson household. No one wanted me. I felt bereft and devoid of any family.

Somehow life went on, living in Scunthorpe. The bonus was I had a sister and brother. And to me, my Mum would always be my Mum, not Auntie Vi. I left school at 14 with no qualifications and little knowledge of anything.

On 8th May 1945, the end to the terrible war in Europe was declared. Grace and I danced the evening and night away celebrating with everyone. Trestle tables were laden with food. Everyone was singing and dancing. A major celebration that must prevent anything like this ever happening again.

After the war we stayed in Scunthorpe. Our house in Hull had been flattened so we couldn't go back there? In 1947 Mum and Dad bought a house in Ashby. I happily lived with them there until my marriage in 1952. We moved to Goxhill in 1996.

HISTORY OF HORTICULTURE IN GOXHILL - Article 13

Hawthorne Gardens (Goxhill) Ltd, WW2 - Harry van den Bos

t In my last article about 'The Gardens' I concentrated on the initial changes in the village at the outbreak of World War 2 and on three Gardens' employees, named on the Goxhill Roll of Honour. A further name on the Roll of Honour for World War 2 which hangs in Goxhill Church, is that of Harry van den Bos.

HARRY VAN DEN BOS was born on 14 November 1920 at, I presume, Nut Villa on Howe Lane where the family are recorded living in the 1921 census. Harry was the second child of Jacob and Florence, who was known as Florrie, van den Bos, who had married in Goxhill in 1916. Florrie was Herbert Tyson's only daughter. Herbert Tyson

Salesman. Jacob and Florrie's oldest son Bert had joined his father and grandfather, on Humber Street, by the outbreak of World War 2. Harry van den Bos joined the Gardens' workforce, in Goxhill, on 7 Jan 1935, shortly after his fourteenth birthday.

As the village established its 'war footing' several organisations evolved to support the war effort. The Goxhill Food Production Society, made up of the village Pig Club, Rabbit Club and Gardening Club was established. The Secretary of the Pig Club was Jacob

van den Bos (Goxhill Tales, Gander, Winter 2009). The 2009 Gander article states that 'virtually every family in the village had a pig to fatten for food and the Pig Club organised the collection of pig food and its rationing...' The Pig Club continued certainly into the mid-1950s (meat rationing, established

during World War 2, didn't end until 1954).

Another organisation was the Goxhill Home Guard, which was formed in June 1940 by Harry Farrow. Harry van den Bos is the fifth name recorded in the list of members in Harry Farrow's notebook (shared by Pat Finch, nee Farrow, Harry's daughter). The first named are Section Leaders Alf Dent (of Field Farm, Chapelfield Road), George Henry Hutchinson (of Carlton, Chapel Street) and Tommy Thompson (of Melbourne House, Howe Lane),

followed by Mr Allison of Fir Tree Farm. Harry van den Bos, who gives his next of kin as his father, Jacob is the next man recorded in Harry Farrow's record. On 6 May 1941, two months before his sixteenth birthday, Jack van den Bos, Jacob van den Bos's third son, also Bert and Harry's younger brother, joined 'The

Gardens' workforce. Harry van den Bos's departure from the Garden's payroll is recorded on 26 July 1941. Harry joined the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve.

The next record I can find for Harry is nearly three years later, on 28 April 1944, when The Supplement to the London Gazette announced that Harry, a Sergeant, serving as a Mid-Upper Gunner in No 76 Squadron, Royal Air Force, on Halifax aircraft, was to be awarded the Distinguished Flying Medal (D.F.M.). Harry's aircraft, subsequent newspaper reports recounted, had been on a bombing raid over Nuremburg, Germany 'one night in March 1944'. After releasing their bombs, Harry's Halifax aircraft had been attacked by a German fighter plane. The newspaper reported that German cannon shell and machine gun bullets struck the aircraft, causing fires to break out in numerous areas of the plane, and one of their starboard engines was put out of action. Harry and his Flying Officer, the plane's Rear Gunner, fought off the German fighter as it made two further attacks on their Halifax; the German plane, the article reported, was 'seen to spiral towards the ground completely out of control'.

The plane's Flying Engineer, a Pilot Officer, used extinguishers to quell the flames in the aircraft before realising that the undercarriage would not release, to enable them to land safely. The Pilot Officer used an axe to hack through to the undercarriage and release the landing gear. The two officers commended alongside Harry. Flying Officer Arthur James Walker of Rugby and Pilot Officer John Albert Bate of Stourbridge, were awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross (D.F.C.). The citation for the three men reads 'In trying circumstances these officers and airman displayed great courage, determination and devotion to duty'. My online search for information revealed that the only raid on Nuremburg in March 1944 was overnight 30th and 31st March. 572 Lancaster bombers, 214 Halifax bombers and 9 Mosquito aircraft took part in 'The Nuremburg Raid'. The RAF Bomber Command suffered its heaviest losses of the war that night: 95 bombers were shot down by German forces and a further 10 aircraft were written off due to battle damage or they crashed on return (memorialflightclub.com/blog/). I knew about Harry's war service because it was one of the first pieces of information that my Dad shared with me. It was then that I realised that I needed to start

recording these snippets of village information that Dad was recalling. Dad said that Harry had been based at Elvington in Yorkshire. No 77 Squadron was based at Elvington. This base became operational in January 1943. No 76 Squadron, where, it was reported, Harry served, was based initially at Linton on Ouse and then at Holme on Spalding Moor, all in Yorkshire. I assume that Harry served at Elvington too at some point, because that was the name that Dad recalled.

Dad lived at London House on King Street, across the road from The Hawthorns where Harry's grandparents Herbert and Ada Tyson, and Harry's older brother Bert were living throughout World War 2. Dad recalled to me that Harry had flown 102 sorties during his service. He also knew that, on what should have been the 52nd sortie that Harry was due to fly, Harry was unwell and was left behind. The plane that Harry had been due to fly in, and all her crew, was lost. Heather Jaques (Harry's niece) recalled to me that her Granny, Harry's mother Florrie, always knew, by some means, when he had returned safely from combat.

The Supplement to the London Gazette reported, on 29 May 1945, that Flight Sergeant Harry van den Bos had received, from 29 March 1945, a Commission as a Pilot Officer in the Royal Air Force. I haven't been able to find any further service records for Harry but know that he returned to Holme on Spalding Moor (the base for No 76 Squadron) in 1992, alongside about 240 ex-Squadron members and friends. Harry donated and planted an oak sapling as part of a memorial ceremony to Group Captain Leonard Cheshire who had been, at one time, the Commander of No 76 Squadron. The Leonard Cheshire charity

website states that Group Captain Cheshire had, in 1948, taken a dying man, who had nowhere else to go, into his home. Word of this work spread and by 1955 there were five homes in the UK. By the 1970s, the website states, the Leonard Cheshire charity was 'a pioneering provider of care services'.


Harry van den Bos married Grace Adlard of Red House Farm, Elsham at Wrawby Church in September 1955. Grace was a keen amateur dramatist and a member of Wrawby Tennis Club. After their marriage Harry and Grace lived at the house now named Seven Acres.

Ferry Road. This house stands close to the then home of Harry's parents Jacob and Florrie who had, by June 1944, moved out of Nut Villa, HoweLane and into Millfield on Ferry Road.

Jacob van den Bos died 'suddenly' at Millfield on 6 November 1959. Florrie van den Bos moved later out of Millfield and into the house now named Hawthorne Cottage, close to her previous home Nut Villa, on

Howe Lane. Charlie Guilliatt told me that Hawthorne Cottage had been built by Edgar Booley and that Edgar had named the house Pomona Cottage. Edgar was the son of the Goxhill Stationmaster Fred Booley.

Harry and Grace van den Bos moved to live in Millfield after Florrie had moved out. Harry and Grace had one child, a son whose birth and death was registered in the final quarter of 1962. He is recorded as Jacob C. in the register; I understand from a family member that the C. stood for Christopher. They had no further children and were a devoted uncle and aunt to their van den Bos and Adlard nephews and nieces.

Harry established a Market Garden at Millfield. Millfield Nurseries, which was run independently to Hawthorne Gardens. Harry grew chrysanthemums which he supplied to Herbert Tyson (Fruit Merchants) on Humber Street. He also grew strawberries. I remember picking strawberries there, the ripe strawberry plants sat on a

bed of straw and grew in the fields close to the house. I often accompanied Dad to deliver groceries to Grace. There was always a long chat with Grace or Harry or both. They were both always interested in what we were doing and in events in the village; Grace served on

the Goxhill Parish Council. A particular pleasure for me was a 'run' which was perhaps 5' high with sides and a roof of chicken wire mesh, which was full of birds. I remember especially a beautiful Golden Pheasant. Harry was a keen ornithologist and, alongside Grace, took immense pride in his garden

By the time of Harry's death, in 1996, he and Lodge, the bungalow they

had built on Ferry Road between Millfield and Seven Acres. After Harry's death Grace moved into The Close, North End and then to Barton. She lived finally at Cross Hill House in Barrow, until her death in 2023.

In my next article, I will return to events and developments in the day to day running of 'The Gardens' during and after the war, and how the Market Garden business evolved further. **Elizabeth Fincham**



Houses 'Long Gone' in Goxhill:

The history of the cottages by the churchyard

In my last article we left the history of the cottages by the churchyard with Francis Watson, Tailor and Draper who, in 1875, had re-written his will. In his document entitled 'The Lordship of Goxhill', which included the history of these cottages, Mr Brawn didn't elaborate further on the history of the property, stating 'We have looked at the history of this little plot for more than 200 years and we are approaching the times of the Great Grandparents of people perhaps still living in Goxhill so perhaps we should leave it to them to decide if they wish us to know more'...I thought that it would be interesting to look a little further.

Francis Watson: was, by the time of the 1881 census, aged 85 and retired. He had moved out of his cottage next to the Churchyard and was recorded living with his niece Mary Ellen, his sister Ann's youngest daughter. Mary Ellen was married to Dunn Hoodlass who was the Blacksmith in North End.

The Blacksmith's home and Forge was on the piece of land which stands between the entrance to Willow Lane and Briton Lodge. A house named Three Gables stands on the plot today. The 1881 census records Dunn Hoodlass, his wife and young son and Francis Watson living in four rooms. (I will return to this area of North End in a later article).

1881 census: The village census records more detail than is usual, so the three cottages next to the churchyard are readily identified (they are recorded immediately after West View, the homes of George Martinson and Thomas Bennett). The first of the Churchyard cottages owned by Francis Watson is unoccupied. Alfred Asher, a Bricklayer, in recorded in the middle cottage. Alfred Asher had married in Goxhill on 16 June 1879; this cottage is his first home with his young wife and daughter. The Asher family lived later in various homes throughout the village. By 1911 Alfred was recorded living at the Generous Briton Public House (Briton Lodge) in North End. Israel Hoodlass is recorded living in in the third cottage next to the Churchyard.

HOODLASS FAMILY: Israel Hoodlass was the father of Dunn Hoodlass (the North End Blacksmith). Dunn had married in Goxhill in 1868. His wife was Mary Ellen Abbot, who was the youngest daughter of Ann Abbot (nee Watson), Francis Watson's sister. Francis Watson was living with his


niece and her husband Dunn Hoodlass and Israel Hoodlass, Dunn's father was living in Francis Watson's property next to the Churchyard.

Francis Watson, living with the Hoodlass family in North End, died on 14th December 1884. The Sole Executor of Francis Watson's will was his sister Ann Abbott, the mother in law of Dunn Hoodlass. Ann Abbott, Dunn Hoodlass's mother in law died in Goxhill on 24 November 1885. The sole executor of Ann Abbott's will was her son in law, Dunn Hoodlass. The Glanford Brigg Valuation Lists for Goxhill in the 1890s reveal that Dunn Hoodlass was now the owner of the three cottages which stood once on the Church car park, next to the Churchyard.

Alfred Asher had moved out of his cottage next to the Churchyard by 1891 but Israel Hoodlass, Dunn's father was still living in the Churchyard cottage where he had first been recorded living ten years previously. Israel Hoodlass had been joined by George Elm and widow Mary Franklin. Israel Hoodlass and Mary Franklin died in Goxhill in August and September 1892 respectively. By 1894 the occupants of the cottages were Charles Harrison, a gardener, George Elm and a William Stamp who later went on to run the Royal Oak

Public House on Westfield Road.

By 1897 Charles Harrison is living still in his cottage. His neighbour is 'Mrs Smith'. This is, I believe, Mary Jane Smith who was Dunn Hoodlass's widowed sister. Mary Jane Smith continues to be recorded living in her cottage next to the Churchyard, in the 1901 and 1911 census records. A Mrs Wilson is the third person recorded living in the cottages in 1897. I haven't been able to work out who Mrs Wilson was. In April 1901, Dunn Hoodlass's sister, Mary Jane Smith, had been joined living in the cottages by Harry Peacock. Harry was living in three rooms with his wife and their three children. Their youngest child, Sidney, was six months old at the

time of the census and had been born in Goxhill. The third cottage, next to the Churchyard was unoccupied. The Peacock family were living in Northumberland by April 1911. Mary Jane Smith is recorded living in her cottage in this 1911 census. One of her neighbours was Robert Coulson, a farm labourer. Robert Coulson was recorded in the 1921 census as an Inmate at the Glanford Brigg Union Workhouse and Infirmary which stood at 34 Wrawby Street, Brigg. The third cottage, in 1911 census, was Charles Dunn, a gardener.

DUNN FAMILY: Dunn Hoodlass is so named because Dunn was his mother Maria's maiden name. Maria Hoodlass (nee Dunn) was first recorded in Goxhill in the 1841 census, shortly after her marriage to Dunn's father Israel Hoodlass. Maria Hoodlass's sister Ann had a son, George Thompson Dunn, who was born in Goxhill in 1843. George Thompson Dunn was Dunn Hoodlass's cousin and the father of Charles Dunn who was living in one of the Churchyard cottages in 1911.

Charles Dunn was one of seven Dunn brothers; his brother Joseph is commemorated on the village World War 1 memorial plaques. By the time of the 1911 census Charles Dunn and his wife Ethel were the parents to three living children. A fourth child, William, had died in 1909 aged three weeks. By 1918 Charles Dunn and his daughter Phyllis were resident in the Glanford Brigg Union Workhouse on Wrawby Street, Brigg. The Workhouse was used as a hospital by those who couldn't afford to pay for medical care. Charles and his daughter Phyllis both died on 21st December 1918, exactly nine months after Charles's brother Joseph Dunn was Killed in Action in World War 1. Charles and Joseph Dunn's mother, a widow, lived in Church Street, with their younger brother Thomas.

Dunn Hoodlass had died in Goxhill on 6 December 1915. His probate names his sons Henry, who was a Joiner and living in Barnetby and Thomas, who was a Draper, living in 1911 in Cheshire. I don't know, after Dunn's death, who owned the cottages by the Churchyard. Neither son returned to live in Goxhill and their mother Mary Ellen (Frances Watson's niece) was, by 1921, living in Barnetby with her older son Henry and his family.

At the **1921 census** record sheets (from my calculation) show that Mary Jane Smith (Dunn Hoodlass's widowed sister) and Eliza Broughton were each living in two rooms in their separate cottages next to the Churchyard. I believe that it's


possible that Mary Jane Smith; Dunn Hoodlass's sister and Mary Hoodlass's sister in law, was buried in Barnetby in 1922, so she had perhaps moved from Goxhill to live with her nephew and his family. Mary Ellen Hoodlass, Dunn's widow, who was living in Barnetby in 1921, died on 12 August 1926.

A newspaper article dated 11 September 1937, states that Eliza Broughton 'lives a happy, contented life in her little cottage near the Church. (The journalist) found Mrs Broughton sat in the porch of her

home enjoying the sunshine...she is still able to do her housework and tend her tidy little garden...(and) is the head of four generations, having three children, eleven grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren'. As Mr Brawn suggested in his article, a great grandson (born shortly after his great grandmother's death in 1943) and his family, and great, great granddaughters of a separate family line, and their families, continue to live in Goxhill today.

Eliza Broughton was recorded, in the 1939 census, living alongside Joseph Proctor and George Hicks. In an article in Ron Parker's Goxhill Bygones, Geoff Coulam mentioned those, who in his memory, had lived in the cottages. He recorded that 'Mrs Broughton owned a green parrot' and he remembered Joseph (Joe) Proctor who was a single man and a road mender. Joe's uncle, also called Joseph, was living in this same census on Gatehouse Road. George Hicks is mentioned by Geoff. I know that George had moved to Goxhill from New Holland and that his daughter Alice Southwell was living on Gatehouse Road with her family, in this same census. Geoff also mentioned a Miss Bennett. She is, I believe, Miss Alice Bennett who was originally from North Killingholme. She had lived in East Halton and is shown living in North End in the 1939 census. Eliza Broughton died in Goxhill in 1943; Alice Bennett died in Goxhill on 12 March 1947, so moved presumably into the cottages sometime after 1939 and prior to her death. I know that George Hicks died in 1951 but don't know where and can't find any further records for Joe Proctor.

Can anyone help with further information?



Photographs dated 1955 and taken from the Church tower show that the cottages which had stood where the Church car park is today had been demolished. On a visit to the County Archive at Lincoln I found some correspondence, starting on 25 July 1955, from Glanford Brigg District Council addressed to the Vicar and Churchwardens of Goxhill Parish Church. Outline Planning Permission was agreed, on 11 August 1955, subject to approval of detail of siting, design, external appearance and means of access, to erect a Church Hall between Church and King Street. A stipulation of the planning was that the hall should have access from both Church and King Street enabling 'free movement of vehicles from one street to another'. For whatever reason, possibly due to the difficulties in enabling this free movement of vehicles, no further action was taken.

In my next article I will write about the cottages which stood on the corner of Howe Lane and Thorn Lane.

Wow!! And just like that another three months have passed by and its time for me to sit and reflect on my time for the 'Off the Hoof' article.

2025 is so not my year! My riding boots have been hung up....well temporarily anyway!! I will tell you for why but first I will need to introduce you to my horses, I'm not sure if I have previously introduced you to them. They are all geldings, and I have owned them all since they were weanlings (6 months old).

Tempting Business (Sunny) is the oldest at eighteen. We have had a colourful career of showjumping which has been blighted by injury of both parties. We now dabble in a spot of 'posh trot' (dressage) although we are both a bit too chubby and set in our ways to be any good at it. But it's the taking part that counts, isn't it??

Cullentown Boy, Freddie to his friends is the 'middle child', he has just turned eleven, he is rather a delinquent and is infamous for his extra curriculars moves. We were looking forward to an action packed 2025 with a calendar full of qualifiers and championships but as I wrote in the last article, I didn't feel he was firing on all cylinders and had him booked in for a lameness work up. Well, it wasn't good news, further investigations and x-rays showed that he has had arthritic changes in his pasterns which as they were developing will have left him feeling very uncomfortable. It is unlikely that we will return to competition, this is so hard to comprehend when he is so young but his health and well being always come first. I remain optimistic and never say never but for now we are ensuring he is comfortable and sound whilst following a varied but light exercise regime.

This leads me to the youngest Unique GB -Gerry, he has just turned four, he is my 'one last blast'. I really would like to get back jumping some of the bigger tracks again. I'm in no rush with him though, I'm all about longevity, his development will be slow and well structured. He is well ready to be ridden; he is mature in body and mind. He has already emptied my bank account when as a two-year-old he stood on the oldest rustiest nail and ran up a hefty vet's bill, he wasn't insured and me and my poor, hard done by husband are now used to living on a staple diet of beans on toast! The learnings from this were, get your fields checked over with metal detectors it's amazing what they find, and my husband is a saint but don't tell him I said that ③ Anyway I digress, with Gerry turning four he had entered the realms of being a ridden horse. We had had our first hack out in the big wide world, we had walked over some poles in the arena, and we had had our first trot although his paces are massive and he pinged me all over, my core obviously needs work! But if I didn't have bad luck, I wouldn't have any and last Tuesday as I was getting on, my brother unknowingly turned over the engine of his truck, he was busy on his phone so didn't witness the antics that unravelled but needless to say, I now have 3 broken ribs and a rather bruised butt! Thankfully, I didn't land on my head as the guarantee on my lovely new riding hat (purchased after my last acrobatics), literally ran out the week previously.

Now, I don't want you to think I fall off lot or I just get up to these escapades for content for my article because I promise you I don't! When I limped over to my parent's bungalow and asked for a ride to A&E my mum said, "is it not time you gave up love?", I just raised my eyebrow and pretended I hadn't heard what she said and besides what would I do with myself? If I took up tiddlywinks, I'm pretty sure I would probably be taking an eye out with one of the discs, so horses it is for a little while longer, just not for the next seven to eight weeks!

Haven't we had a warm summer? It lovely to lay on a lounger in the hot sun but it isn't fun to work with horses in it. People have been concerned whether it's been too hot to ride or too hot to travel horses or which rugs to put on with all the flies. Predominantly all our horses wear fly masks, well as long as their field companions don't remove them, some wear fly rugs and fly spray, some just wear spray. My horses have been kept ridden, to be fair they have acclimatised well, we just don't ride at the hottest times of day and they are always hosed off after, provided with clean water as well as a mash with electrolytes in, you can give electrolytes in the water but we use Saracen's Recovery Mash or Premier Performance's Fibre Hydration Mash, as the names suggest these make into a sloppy mash and provide much needed hydration along with the electrolytes.

The constant hot weather has left the grazing a bit wanting this year, we have been feeding hay in many of our fields. Luckily at the yard we have the luxury of the feed company Dengie coming 2-3 times a year to weigh the horses and discuss their diets. They were with us this weekend just gone and surprisingly, despite the poor grazing some had still put on weight. Freddie, like me only has to look at food to put on weight and this time he had gained 20kg, we will both be reducing our portion sizes!! All the JJ horses are fed on fibre-based diets, so as well as their hay and haylage they have alfa A or grass from the extensive Dengie range, the have alfa beet which is soaked to create a mash and a balancer to provide necessary vitamins and minerals relevant to their workload. It's a very simple system that's works with the variety of horses we look after. We have Dengie back with us in October if anyone would like to book an appointment for your horse to be weighed or to have their dietary requirements discussed.

As I write this article, the children are breaking up for their summer holidays but when it actually goes to print many of them will have returned, either to a new school year or to college. In one of my other roles, I am a coach for Stubbing Court Training who are one of the leading specialist providers of world class equestrian apprenticeship programmes in East Midlands and Yorkshire. AN UP DATE ON THE HUMBER CARBON CAPTURE PIPELINE AT GOXHILL

In the last edition I provided an update on the Humber **Hydrogen** pipeline. This time it is the latest news about the **Carbon Capture** pipeline. Northern Endurance Partnership are submitting a planning application for their proposal for a method of 'Horizontal Directional Drilling', the same as the proposed Hydrogen pipeline. It should be a quicker method than a tunnel, have a reduced environmental impact, and generate less construction traffic on the local highway network. Apparently the Humber could be at the limit of what is possible by this method and this initial application is for a trial drill from both sides of the Humber. They are conscious of the impact on Goxhill from the previous tunnel

They propose construction HGVs would typically use a one-way system (applicable to their vehicles only), arriving via the B1206, then Ferry Road and East Marsh Road in Goxhill and leaving via Skitter Road, Station Road and Townside in East Halton. Other light vehicles (cars and vans) would be able to use either route. They expect, on average, 12 HGVs a day, with more on a handful of days when bringing in equipment. They are proposing putting in new passing places on the route, which 'may' be left permanently. The work is expected to start Spring 2026.


