brand new store. The Memorial Hall continues to put on some fantastic entertainments from Pantos to Films, from Live Shows to private parties and a long list of other activities. To name but a few of the good things happening already in Goxhill. See various articles throughout this issue for more information. Sadly, it is not all good news. There have been the sad deaths of a number of well known village characters already this year. Our condolences go out to all the families and friends affected. It is all the more reason to recognise the good that so many people do in our village, while we can. I said in the last issue, that we were trying to bring back the Short Award and that is exactly what we have done and it is now sponsored by the Gander. The Short Award is a Community Award to a resident of Goxhill who has done something outstanding for the village. Nominations will be reviewed at The Gander AGM on Wed 17th May and the Award will be announced in the next issue of the Gander. You only have to look at the display board in the Memorial Hall to see the distinguished names on there, who have all contributed so much to the quality of life in our village. It is a real honour to recognise such selfless work.

One major project in the village that is getting rather mixed opinions, is the Humber Pipeline. National Grid and their contractors are working hard to minimise the impact particularly of vehicle access to the site, see the information on page 31. However the Traffic Management Plan agreed by NLC Highways and the planning authority, leaves a lot to be desired on village roads and narrow country lanes on the marsh. On top of heavy traffic going to existing businesses down the marsh, the addition of the Pipeline traffic is bound to cause considerable extra difficulties. And the Pipeline Project is only just getting started preparing the access and site, so the problems are not going to go away and could get worse. The Off the Hoof article on page 37 expresses similar concerns especially for horse riders and walkers who traditionally enjoy our country lanes. Please use the numbers on National Grid's page 31, to let them know any concerns you have. There is also a facebook page www.facebook.com/saveferryroad set up by residents to your share concerns.

What constitutes greatness in terms of human achievement? Will Donald Trump be remembered as a great president? (will Obama?) Will Theresa May be remembered as a success (already she's being compared with another female politician who preceded her and whose legacy is still very much debated!) One of the most dramatic aspects of the Easter story that we celebrate this month is the behaviour of the Disciples. When we look at their actions before, during and after the Crucifixion I am certain we can all identify with at least some of their very human traits, especially if we try to assess them in terms of human achievement. Among the Disciples, the one who was most successful in worldly terms was Judas, and the one who gives the impression of being a failure was Peter. Judas was a success in the ways that most impress us: he was successful both financially and politically. He cleverly arranged to control the money of the group of Disciples – presumably convincing even Jesus that he could be trusted with this most important job. He also skilfully manipulated the political forces of the day and plotted with those in power to accomplish his personal goals. Peter, by comparison, was a failure in ways that we most dread: he was ineffective in a crisis and socially inept. He said the most embarrassingly inappropriate things. At the arrest of Jesus he caved in, a hapless, blustering coward, despite having earlier made protestations of eternal loyalty. When Jesus was being interrogated he denied he even knew him. Peter was probably not the kind of companion we would want with us in time of danger, and he was not the kind of person we would generally feel comfortable with at a social occasion. Time, of course, has reversed our judgments on the two men. Judas is now a byword for betrayal, and Peter is one of the most honoured names in the church. Judas is a villain; Peter is a saint. Yet the world continues to judge success as evidenced by the achievements of Judas: financial wealth, social status and political power, and to avoid at all costs the failures and faux pas of Peter.

Easter is a time when, as we enter once again into the great drama at the heart of our faith, we are forced to the conclusion that maybe the world hasn't got it right in assessing what constitutes true greatness, and what it is in my life I would like people to remember me by? **Rev. LETTER FROM THE CHAPEL

It's almost Easter and the glorious signs of Spring and new life are all around us and some of you will be seeking out the Real Easter Egg Company whose Fairtrade Belgian chocolate is the most delicious and comes with a fabulous booklet about Easter. And Christian churches will be proclaiming the resurrection of Jesus in every possible way! Why is the resurrection such a big deal? Did it just happen to Jesus but no one else? Well - the greatest thinker in the early church was quite clear about it – if Christ did not rise from the dead then Christian faith is utterly futile! So St Paul argues and at first we may think that Paul is exaggerating. After all, whether or not Jesus rose from the dead, he still left some pretty impressive teaching behind which all the world honours! The wonderful truths outlined in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7) would still be there for all history with the superb call for us to be peace makers and to learn to love our enemies. Those words ring down through the centuries and always will -but - ah - if the person who said them was actually deluded and his teaching flawed at the heart, then fairly soon even such magnificent words would fade into the dust of history. St Paul is crystal clear. Jesus was not yet another prophet with some bright things to say, nor was he another great teacher with especial skills in telling great parables. Jesus was the living truth of God, God's wisdom and love poured into one special human being. In particular he was God bearing our griefs and sorrows and sins and being victorious over all the powers ranged against him.

Jesus was God being crucified and then being raised from the grave because God is not restricted by death. God takes death into all his plans for us and the universe, then offers new life beyond it. Paul is emphatic about the evidence. Many, many people meet with the risen Christ. Many more did so at the first Pentecost when the early church was born. Many more do so later, Paul himself being one of them. To this day the evidence is decisive. Jesus rose!

Jesus' resurrection appearances are not an apparition, not a happy dream, nor a marvelous bit of wish fulfilment on the part of those first over-excited followers. Jesus rose and the church came about as a result – lives were changed and you and I and one billion people who are Christians today are a plain sign of all that marvellous truth. That is our core belief – that Christ dies for us and then is risen from death by God. That is what the worldwide church will celebrate with immense joy this Easter Day. The basic truth of Jesus Christ risen is what finally changes our lives for good, and for ever. Death does not have the final word - God does! Hold to that truth when your life feels it is going through the shadows of uncertainty and disbelief, when the storm clouds gather and dawn feels far away. God raised Jesus from death and he lives for you and me and all the world Joy to you this Eastertide from **Revd Nichola Jones** today!





"Nothing is so beautiful as spring -- When weeds, in wheels, shoot long and lovely and lush" **G.M. Hopkins**

The above two lines are the first two in a poem about Spring by the English poet, Gerard Manley Hopkins. I love this poem and have done so since learning it by heart at the tender age of 15 in secondary school. Gerard Manley Hopkins is one of the three or four greatest poets of the Victorian era. He is regarded by different readers as the greatest Victorian poet of religion, of nature, or of melancholy. However, because his style was so radically different from that of his contemporaries, his best poems were not accepted for publication during his lifetime, and his achievement was not fully recognized until after World War I.

It's hard to believe that we are in the spring term of our academic year but yet winter is still forcing us to close our curtains well before 5 o' clock in the evening. I can't think that any of us enjoy arriving home from work in the dark and leaving in the dark the next morning. But already we can see signs of Spring in our gardens with the first snowdrops and in the fields, new signs of life.

I can't believe I have been part of Goxhill School for 8 years. The time has flown by and is filled with such happy and great memories of the children who have passed through our school and of those who still attend. This time last year, I remarked on the constant changes we go through as a school, with the coming and going of new faces. A lot truly happens in a year and our school community is ever growing.

During the winter term we had a number of very well attended events. The children delighted us all in their numerous Christmas performances and the term ended successfully with the largest gathering of parents and community members we have ever seen at our 'Carols around the Christmas Tree'.

We were really fortunate to have a day of hands on workshops in Science and Engineering, provided by



the National Grid. The key stage 2 children from East Halton joined us and the presenter brought science to life through a number of really stimulating and interactive workshops. One of the workshops was based around the science of bubbles and balloons. This workshop looked at forces and how our environment is governed by them.

The other was based around super heroes. Here the children were shown how being a scientist could make



them a superhero – they definitely caught the children's imagination!

The children have also taken part in a BBC Live Lesson. Years 3 to 6 took part, counting the number of taste buds that they had on their tongues. They used blue food colouring to count how many taste buds they had and then they used that information to decide whether they were Non-tasters, Tasters or Super Tasters! Some very interesting results!!

The staff covering the maternity leaves have been welcomed into our school community and are keen to make the transition for the children as seamless as possible. They are bringing with them a wide range of skills and personalities that will offer the children variety and enrichment: year 6 have been learning to knit with Mrs Dalton – they have knitted a lovely blanket for Miss Twidale and baby Harriet. Next, they will be learning to crochet.

Challenges such as these maternity leaves and the way that we deal with them are what make us stronger. Our school community and the growth and success of it continues to be our utmost priority.

NATIONAL GRID MAKES SCIENCE SIMPLE FOR GOXHILL AND EAST HALTON SCHOOLS' PUPILS

Science was made simple for Goxhill Primary and East Halton Primary School students when National Grid hosted two special workshops to show what real-life scientists and engineers do for a living.

Pupils took part in two interactive demonstrations involving volunteers from the audience. Key stage one pupils enjoyed 'Bubbles and Balloons', investigating how different

shapes of objects made from some materials can be changed by some processes, including forces such as squashing, bending, twisting and stretching. Key stage two pupils enjoyed 'Who Wants to be a Superhero?' exploring exactly what real-life scientists and engineers do, as well as learning more about gravity, forces, energy, light, space, and the environment.

CallConnect in Goxhill

CallConnect is a flexible Bus Service that launched in the Goxhill area in May 2016. This new service is different to a conventional bus service as it is You that decides where and when the bus operates. You book the journey you want and the bus timetable is fitted around this.

The bus can be used by anyone, just like a normal bus service. It is easily recognisable and, being smaller, it can reach areas larger sized buses can't. This means that anyone who would struggle to get to a main bus stop or main route can still use the bus as it will come to them.

Use of CallConnect has grown, with residents booking journeys on a regular basis. Popular journeys from Goxhill are to and from Brigg, Barton and Immingham. Residents are using the bus to do many different local journeys, including getting to the doctors, hairdressers, shopping or taking part in leisure activities. Once in Brigg, Barton or Immingham, connections can be made to travel onward to Scunthorpe, Grimsby, Cleethorpes or Hull.

If you can't use the normal bus service for whatever reason then why not give CallConnect a ring and see if we can help? Every request is considered on a case by case basis to see if we can help.

Why not get together with a few friends and neighbours and use the CallConnect bus to get to local events in the area? The WI, the Memorial Hall and the Church all have events on. Could you use the bus to get you there?





Why not ring and see? You can also use CallConnect to go to events held in other villages and residents from there can also come to events that you are holding.





SHOPS IN GOXHILL

With the opening of a new store in Goxhill, it seems an appropriate time to look back at what shops and services there were in Goxhill in the past.

This extract from the White's Directory of 1872, opposite, shows a wide range of shops and trades in a village that had to be more self sufficient in those days.

Colin Creasey has given me the benefit of his vast knowledge of village life and this is a list of old shops he remembers -

A Butchers Shop on Thornton Road, the Slaughter House is still there in Spence's Field. Later Herbert Atkin made ice cream in it. Pete Atkin had a Sweet Shop & repaired bicycles on Howe Lane, near the Parish Rooms.

Before Austin's (see photograph below) on Church Street, it was Gwen Atkin's Paper & Sweet Shop.

Further down Church Street, Percy Farrow had a shoe repair shop and was succeeded by his daughter Gladys Farrow. On the corner of Howe Lane and Westfield Road, Harry Wilford had a Grocers Shop, now Holtby's (see photo below).

Harry Wilford then had the Ice Cream kiosk on the corner of the Square (see photograph on page 27).

There was a Pork Butchers Shop in one of the houses on the Square and Mrs Parker had a Wool & Paper Shop on the Square. Across the Road was George Parker's Blacksmiths (see photo on page 27), next to that was Mr Turner's Joiner and Funerals. Round the corner, on the left going up Chapel Street, Arthur Gibson had a bakery.

Dales also had a Bakery in the house next to Meller's Garage on Howe Lane.


Past the Spar shop, Jim Fishwick had a Barbers. To the left of Spar was a Doctor's Surgery that later became a Bank.

Near there on the little lane that leads round to Elm Lane, was On Howe Lane just past Chapel Street, was Jackson's Solicitors a Pork Butcher and Slaughter House. Mick Atkin had a (Vera Elwood worked there). It too became a Bank later. Blacksmiths there too. There was also a Midland Bank in the Parish Rooms 1950-60.





During a normal year complaints, enquiries, requests and comments, even compliments, (rarely but very welcome) come our way, but the way that some are delivered makes it difficult or even impossible to deal with.

All enquiries /queries need, and yes deserve, a reply but if the query is anonymous how do we do that. One, we cannot even investigate the problem raised, and two, we obviously cannot reply! If at any time a person has a question be brave, put a name to it and someone will, certainly let you know what action has been taken.

Over many years, either working in Local Government, or in recent years serving with the Parish Council, in more than one area, it is evident that in general many people do not know what we do or in deed more importantly, what we are allowed to do, no more than I would understand exactly what other occupations or professions entailed. Maybe it's high time to try to make things a little clearer.

Every month members the Parish Council meet to discuss and decide upon items such as **planning applications** within our area, this is not done by personal preferences, but whether it is practical and correct, we can only object if the proposal falls outside the planning regulations or if there is an obvious practical problem. We would always put forward any objections from residents, together with our comments which must go to North Lincolnshire Council to the planning department, and for Council final decision. No matter how strong the feelings are, either yours, or our own, if the plans fall within the regulations they will be passed, that's how it is and only a change of rules by Government can alter this.

We discuss the state of the **highways and footways** within our area and if any action is needed on either repairs or damage, these concerns are passed on to the Highways department for their attention. These are checked during the following months to ensure that any necessary work is carried out, If concerns are raised by any member of the public to ourselves we do check and most certainly pass the details on and advise you of any action.

We can and do try to keep the village clean tidy, and endeavour to improve the area, maintaining, our green spaces. These include the **Playing Field**, with the continued care and maintenance of the equipment, the care of the football pitch, and of course the MUGA, and hopefully any future additions that we can add for the young people of Goxhill. Regular inspections and maintenance are carried out to the **Millennium Green**, taken into our hands in recent years.

The village **Cemetery** is another area in our care, and we try to keep this clean, well maintained and above all peaceful and respectful.

Hopefully in the future we will continue to add more trees and shrubs to additional spaces to make them more attractive places to relax.

We have overall responsibility for the **Memorial Hall**, although the running of this is carried out by a very hard working and very able committee, and over the last eighteen months many improvements have been completed, several of which were planned previously.

As many local residents will be aware, project work

has started in Goxhill, following approval of a local planning application and discharge of attached conditions from North Lincolnshire Council and the completion of archaeological investigations. We've been busy getting the site at Goxhill ready for construction and providing access to the site for construction vehicles and equipment. This has involved excavating topsoil, installing site security & staff offices, starting to improve local roads at passing places, and starting to build a temporary road at Soff Lane. These works are designed to make sure traffic runs more smoothly and form a key part of the Traffic Management Plan agreed with North Lincolnshire Council and the Highways Agency. In October when we met with Goxhill Parish Council, we explained that we were hoping to complete the passing places and the Soff Lane works by the end of December 2016, subject to the necessary highway approvals. It has taken a little longer than we'd hoped to get all that in place, but these works are now expected to be complete by the end of May 2017.

Local Archaeology makes National News

During the past year, Archaeology students from Sheffield University lead by Dr Hugh Willmott excavating at Thornton Abbey have uncovered a mass grave containing the bodies of 48 Black Death plague victims. This discovery was reported nationally, by the BBC and considerable surprise was expressed because few if any similar burials had been found in rural areas, only in large towns where people who died from the plague believed to have been buried in this way.

Perhaps the peaceful rural countryside which now surrounds the Abbey and its neighbouring villages has misled people into thinking that a similar quiet undisturbed situation existed in Medieval times but this was not so. Thornton Abbey was one of the wealthiest abbeys in the country. Founded by William le Gros as a priory in 1139 it became an Abbey in 1148. It Grew very quickly because its site had been well chosen to enable it to become a centre not only of religion but also of commerce. The medieval monasteries were selfsupporting, they did not rely upon contributions for their upkeep but generated their own income from the surrounding area. Some extracted iron ore and smelted it but many of them like Thornton Abbey relied upon their vast flocks of sheep to produce wool which was used both at home and exported to France. In the year 1313 the Stock Keeper's Account recorded that the Abbey had 8,000 sheep. The annual income of the Abbey was equivalent to that of a high-ranking nobleman. When the Abbey was suppressed by Henry 8th in addition to the Abbot there were 23 Cannons (Augustinian Monks) and it is thought that there had been more in earlier times. The cannons carried out their duties within the Abbey church but also went out into the surrounding village churches. As well as the religious members of the community there was a large supporting staff both at the Abbey and in the surrounding villages. 44 masons were employed to quarry 1,500 stones all of which were brought to the site by boat before work began on the construction

of the great church. The work was ongoing many other buildings were needed on the site. On the Abbey land and that of the surrounding landowners, some agricultural workers as well as many shepherds would be required to look after the sheep.

The land surrounding the Abbey has changed so much that today we can see few clues as to why this peaceful country site surrounded by fields was

The importance of this is that at a time when there were no roads, transport of goods and people was done on the rivers and the sea and the Abbey had access to both. The archaeologists working at Thornton Abbey discovered the Mass Grave. I prefer mass grave rather than plague pit because from the pictures they produced it can be seen that the bodies had been laid out in orderly fashion as in Christian burial before being covered not dropped haphazardly into a hole which was then filled. They tested the bones and found traces of Yersinia Pestis which confirmed that the people had been infected with the Black Death. They then went on to discover the hospital nearby, this of course was the significant reason for the large number of bodies that had been found. The Abbey was the place to which the people of the villages turned in time of trouble and illness this was the place to which they carried their children and their sick relatives

for the care of the Cannons in their hospital. There was also another burial ground by the hospital here were laid to rest the bodies of those who came to the hospital but could not be cured of their illness. Their bones carried the signs of their illness, of deformity and amputation and were placed in the ordered rows that we would expect of single burials in a graveyard.



IMPORTANT INFORMATION **ABOUT SWARMS OF HONEY BEES**

During the summer months, especially in May and June, honey bees may leave their hive and form a swarm. This is part of their normal life cycle as they split their colony and set off to find a new location to set up an additional colony. A swarm can be alarming, with a cloud of bees buzzing around making a loud sound that could be interpreted as anger. However, swarming bees are usually quite docile as long as they are not interfered with, being intent on finding a safe secure place where they and their leader, the queen, can set up home.

If this happens to be in your tree, on your fence or in part of your home, it can be a nuisance and most people would prefer they weren't there!

If you have a swarm, and it can be reached safely, a local beekeeper may be able to help by collecting and removing the bees, usually taking them to a hive that is part of an apiary.

However, beekeepers can only deal with swarms of honey bees and cannot help with wasps, bumble bees or other types of insects.

To help you decide whether you need to contact a beekeeper, the British Beekeepers Association has an excellent website which will help you to identify the insects as honey bees www.bbka.org.uk/swarm It also includes a link to local swarm collectors in case you need their help.

Lincolnshire Integrated Voluntary Emergency Service (LIVES)

Pleasant as it is to live in a rural location like Goxhill, it has some disadvantages when it comes to access and transport. It can take an ambulance guite a while to reach us, especially if it has to travel from Grimsby. At best the delay adds to the stress of waiting but in extreme cases, particularly cardiac arrest, every minute can tip the balance for a person's survival chances.

LIVES first responders are volunteers prepared to be on call to attend and provide emergency treatment when necessary or just generally help the patient be more comfortable until the ambulance arrives. Usually that arrival will be soon after, or even before, the first responder; but when it is not, they are on hand with equipment they are fully trained to use. Our local branch of LIVES covers Goxhill, Barrow and New Holland. If you are the type of person who wants to help others, have a car and are able to spare a few hours a week then perhaps you could be a First Responder? There is always a need for new recruits as existing responders move away or their circumstances change so that they are unable to continue.
