So I sincerely thank Aileen too, for her dedication and time given to her unique role and contribution to the Gander.

John Guggiari has also been putting pen to paper since 1996, on a wide range of topics from home made wine to Neighbourhood Watch, and more recently Lives, the Library, Bowls and Goxhill Events, which he also organises. He too deserves our thanks. My first article was in 2000, so I am a relative lightweight.

There have been many more who have written fascinating stories and informed readers of village events and news. All regular contributors and new ones, are so vital for the continuing success of the Gander. So I don't want to hear any more talk of retirement. LETTER FROM THE CHAPEL

Dear Friends. What do you make of the news recently? Does watching the news (or listening to it or reading it) fill you with encouragement and delight? Probably not.. If you were to gauge our happiness or sense of wellbeing from the news it would be most deceptive!

Some 'news' is of deep concern and drives us to strive harder for a better world where there is justice for all. Some 'news' shakes us to the core and makes us weep. But other 'news' brings great and deep rejoicing - though usually not the kind we see on TV or hear on the radio or read in the papers.

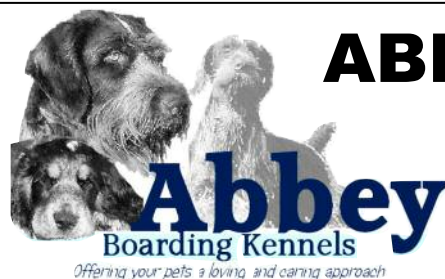

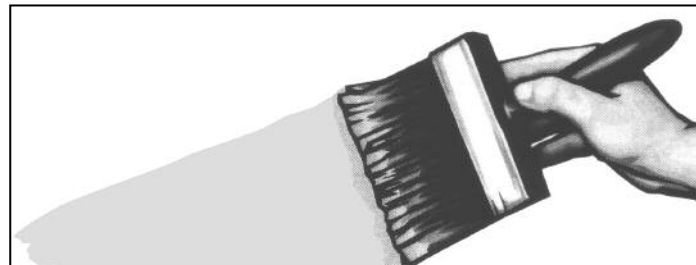

The future of Goxhill Village... TBC?

Fellow residents of Goxhill, many of you will be aware of the current situation

concerning proposed building plans for our village.

But for those who do not access Facebook and the relevant group pages, we would like to give you a brief summary of the latest news, at the time of writing.

On Wednesday 13 February, parishioners headed to North Lincolnshire Council's Civic Centre in Scunthorpe to attend the monthly Planning Committee Meeting.

It was at this meeting that the fate of the 4 hectares of land behind Hawthorne Gardens and Howe Lane would be decided – or so we thought!

Five parishioners spoke passionately for five minutes each on why the proposed Hawthorne Gardens development (PA/2018/1581) is not the most sustainable or sensible option for Goxhill. This was followed by a 25 minute counter-presentation by Gary Whall of Keigar Homes Ltd.

A motion was submitted by our Ward Councillor Peter Clark who asked that committee members visit the site before a final decision was made.

This was seconded by Ward Councillor David Wells who painted a picture of the potential impacts that large-scale development could have on Goxhill. He focused in particular on the village's narrow roads and lanes and the problems with parking, as well as Goxhill's unique position regarding flood-risk.

The committee voted unanimously in favour of a site visit so that they could make a more informed final decision.

In the run-up to the meeting, we were very disappointed to read that the planning officer responsible for the application had recommended the proposal, subject to conditions. To quote an excerpt from the report:

'The adverse impacts of the development are considered to not significantly and demonstrably outweigh the benefits and as such...the development must be considered acceptable and should be approved'.

Many of the 'adverse impacts' were acknowledged in the report, but 'the benefits' still remain sketchy. Although the developers will be expected to pay contributions to the primary school, the overall benefits of the development remained shrouded in mystery. For example, the school contribution would not go far enough to provide the resources necessary to accommodate many more children. The contributions for play areas are not earmarked for specific projects, except for £45.5k to be spent on gym equipment in Barton.

The land that the developers had originally offered to the community is now being treated as a separate matter entirely and now does not form part of this application.

According to the developers, they have been advised by

the planning officer to put in a separate planning application for the land. So again, we're left asking – **what exactly IS the plan?**

The same day the officer's report was published, we were made aware of the possibility of 71 properties being built on land behind the houses on Thornton Road. At the time of writing, a planning application hadn't been submitted, but we believe it's imminent. There is also a new application to build nine dwellings on land next to the Co-op. These follow hot on the heels of three other planning applications (totalling 27 new dwellings) which have since been turned down.

Where will it end? Is Goxhill on the verge of losing, once and for all, what it has left of village life and character? Are we on the verge of becoming a mini-town but with an infrastructure that won't cope? If so, what can we do about it?

Since last June, GRAG has advocated a Neighbourhood Plan because we want all parishioners to have a say on Goxhill's future. We have been working with parish councillors and others to move the process forwards and we're delighted to report that good progress is being made.

The well-attended Visioning Day held in January showed that many other parishioners are getting behind the idea too. But it will take time. Neighbourhood Planning is a community-led process and those who are hoping to make it happen will be giving their time voluntarily.

Until such day that Goxhill Parish has a Neighbourhood Plan in place, we ask you to keep sharing your questions, ideas, knowledge and concerns. If there is anything you'd like to discuss, please get in touch.

Alternatively, you can contact the Neighbourhood Planning Steering Committee (to be officially formed end of March) **see page 23**, our parish council, our ward councillors or Martin Vickers, MP. Email us and we'll point you in the right direction. GRAG will also keep you updated through Facebook and future issues of The Gander.

We'd like to thank everyone who has given their support to the cause during the past 12 months. There are many of you who share not only our concerns but also our dreams for peaceful, rural village life. But to everyone who has an interest in the future of Goxhill, there's just one message:

Isn't it time we shaped Goxhill's future, TOGETHER?

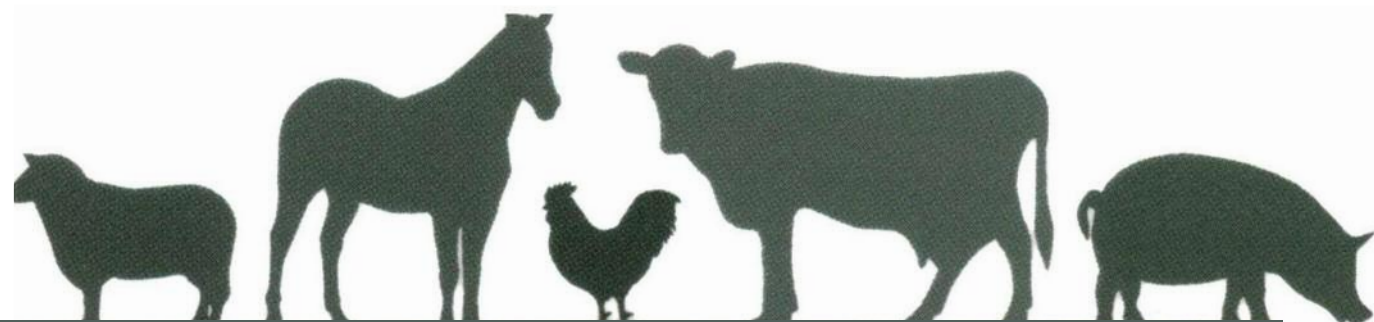

GOXHILL'S AVENUES OF TREES

Heather Jacques has supplied two old newspaper cuttings containing reports of her Grandad and Grandma's funerals. They died on 6 Nov 1959 and 8 June 1976.

As you can see they both mention the trees that were planted in the village, it said they were all planted after the war, I know that the Cherry Trees were planted in 1953 and there is in one our garden (at Luibeg, south End,) that was planted at the same time. (Apparently it had a hole and no one thought it would grow so my father brought it home and planted on the property he had just bought).

The Lime trees down Horsegate Field road may have been planted first, there was also an Avenue of Elm Trees down Barrow Road, unfortunately these were affected by Dutch Elm disease in the 1970's and they all had to be felled.

The last trees planted in Goxhill, as far as I am aware, were down the road leading from Gate House crossing to South End. I remember helping my father plant these with Norman Chapman.

I hope this helps clear some of the confusion around the planting of trees in and around Goxhill.

GOXHILL'S GOOD FRIEND WAS MR J. VAN DEN BOS

GOXHILL HAS LOST a worthy resident by the death of Mr Jacob van den Bos, who was a prominent figure in horticultural and fruit trading circles.

He came to live in Goxhill just before World War I and joined Mr Herbert Tyson in his wholesale fruit business in Humber-st. and later became a partner in the firm.

After his marriage to Mr Tyson's only daughter, he started and developed the horticultural department of the firm in Goxhill at Hawthorn Gardens.

Mr van den Bos took a great interest in many facets of village life and for many years was secretary of the Memorial Hall. He helped with many war-time activities and efforts for charities, but the thing outstanding in all his services is the work he did in connection with the village tree planting. Funds were raised to plant well over 400 trees in avenues and roadsides, and Mr van den Bos assisted with the planting of nearly every one of them.

He did many kind acts without ostentation and was held in the highest regard in the village. Many associates in the Hull fruit trade attended the funeral.

The funeral service took place at Goxhill Methodist Church when the Rev F. Sidaway officiated, assisted by the Rev C. H. Evison, vicar of Goxhill. The organist was Mrs H. Greenfield.

OBITUARY. — The death has occurred of Mrs F. M. Van den Bos at the age of 84 years. Mrs Van den Bos worked hard for Goxhill throughout all her life, and did an enormous amount of good in a quiet and unassuming way. Together with her late husband she keenly supported the Memorial Hall, in addition to the Methodist Chapel, and during the war she was actively involved in the Goxhill Food Production Society. The village also owes a debt of gratitude to Mrs Van den Bos and her family for the beautiful trees which now line the roads into the village, and which were planted just after the war. A man's home is his Castle, or is it?

Who was it that once said: "A man's home is his castle"?

The phrase is often attributed to King Henry VIII, upon his return to his throne after the execution of his wife Ann Boleyn. However, there are a number of ways in which our actions in our 'castles' may, quite inadvertently, result in what may well be classed as criminal behaviour and bring us into conflict with the authorities.

As our thoughts turn towards Spring, and a new season of gardening activities, here are a number of issues we may need to bear in mind.

1. Overhanging branches

If a tree's branches overhang your property from a neighbour's, you are permitted to trim them, but only up to the property line. Leaning into a neighbour's garden to trim the trees is not permissible, as this constitutes trespass. If a tree is covered by a Tree Preservation Order you can't cut the branches, so it is wise to check this with your local authority first.

2. Planting hedges

If you want to plant a hedge in your garden, while you don't normally require planning permission to do so, it's best to check with the local planning authority first, as you will be responsible for maintaining it, so that it doesn't cause a nuisance to others.

3. Fruit and flowers

While cutting branches which overhang into your garden up to the property line is allowed, they do still belong to the neighbour – as do any fruit or flowers on them. As such, your neighbour is legally entitled to demand them back. But do not just throw any windfallen fruit and flowers back into their garden, as this could constitute garden waste fly tipping.

4. Boundary fences

If you want to put up a new fence, gate or garden wall which is more than two metres in height you will need planning permission to do so. If the fence or wall borders or adjoins a public highway used for vehicles, you may need planning permission if it's higher than one metre. You will also need to seek permission if your property is a listed building, or if the proposed fence forms a boundary with a neighbour's listed building. It is also wise to check the property deeds to ensure you aren't breaching any existing agreement between your property and those neighbouring it, or check the Land Registry for general boundary guidelines. If a fence already exists the house deeds should indicate who is responsible for boundaries, although there is no legal responsibility to keep boundaries well maintained, unless the deeds state otherwise.

5. Sweeping fallen leaves

Tree owners are not responsible for sweeping up any fallen leaves that might land on your property – that burden falls to you.

6. Garden sheds

Installing a garden shed, log cabin or summerhouse in your garden requires certain planning criteria to be met, with the building required to have a height no more than 2.5 metres from existing ground level, a maximum overall height of 4 metres with a dual-pitched roof, or 3 metres for any other roof. In terms of space, the ground area covered by the outbuilding and any other buildings within the boundary of the property (excluding the original house) should not be more than half the total area of the property.

7. Hot tubs

If you're lucky enough to have your own outdoor hot tub, you should be mindful that heating the tub could actually constitute a nuisance due to noise. If you're installing a hot tub in an outbuilding, then the same rules for outbuildings (above) will apply.

8. Trees blocking light

Under the Rights of Light Act, if a window has received natural light for 20 years or more, neighbours cannot legally block it with a new tree.

9. Boundary hedges

If a hedge grows along the boundary between two gardens, both neighbours are responsible for trimming. If a hedge belonging to a neighbour grows into your garden, you are permitted to trim it but, as with tree branches, you must, technically, ask if they want the trimmings returned.

10. Washing lines

Should you intend to attach a washing line, garden hose, or even hanging baskets to your neighbour's outside wall or fence, be sure to obtain their consent before doing so.

11. Garden bonfires

While there is no law against a garden bonfire, the rules state that you can't burn any household waste that "will cause pollution or harm people's health". Equally, you could be fined if you light a fire and you allow the smoke to drift across the road and become a danger to traffic. If you have regular garden bonfires, they can be deemed a nuisance to neighbours.

12. Smoke

Whether it's from a barbecue or a chiminea, smoke can also be a nuisance to your neighbours and could put you on the wrong side of the law, so try to make sure it's not drifting into your neighbour's garden, particularly if their washing's out.

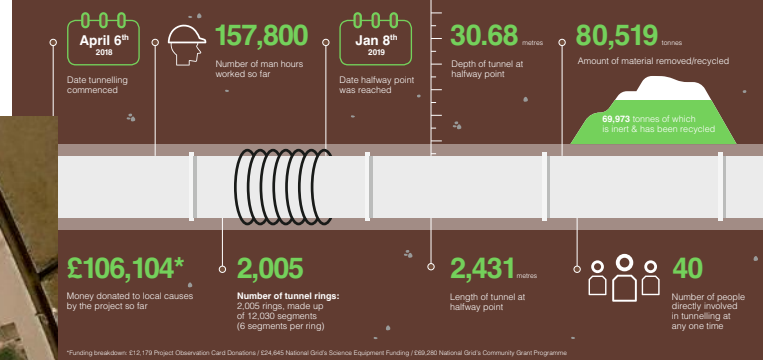

Memories of Wartime Goxhill

I am Eric Jarvill and was born in 1928, I recall in the 1930s Goxhill was a medium sized village with a population of about 1200 residents, it had 10 Shops, a Church, 3 Chapels and 2 Pubs, most of its residents were employed or being educated within a ten-mile radius, In the previous decade before the war we had seen two national Events, namely, the Silver Jubilee & the Coronation and these had resulted in the commemorative planting of trees on the approach road from Thornton Curtis and the Cemetery, now mature specimens, After the Munich Affair in 1938, a degree of change began to develop and the Military Projects were soon making their presence felt locally, the final year of the decade saw a mammoth change in all our lives, namely, the fitting of Gasmasks, new personal Identification Cards, A census preparing our village community to receive an influx of Evacuees from the Urban Districts, mainly Hull, in the event of hostilities breaking out, The Military appeared amongst us, mainly Army Personnel who were about to commission a permanent 4.7 Anti-Aircraft site, which had recently been built at Dawson City and mobile Searchlight units were installed at selective points in the village, the sight of these with their mobile Generators being moved by formidable Military Tractor Units, caused a certain degree of alarm for our older residents had developed their own rules of the road as they rode around on their cycles.

By September 1939 we were being told about Blackout Precautions, the impending Rationing System for food and the formation of Air-raid Wardens, Familiarity with the Tone and duration of the Sirens and being directed to familiarise ourselves with the Gasmasks which for some years were to become inseparable from us. Sunday, September the 3rd, brought the Official Declaration of War and within hours we were being directed to take in Evacuees, who were often Confused, Home-Sick and temporarily Homeless, some found the radical change in their life, intolerable and subsequently returned home, whilst a number stay on, Integrated in the local lifestyle and became permanent residents, The war meant that some of our locals of Military Age were conscripted into the Armed Forces and left, their places were taken by the Soldiers & Airmen who were to appear in ever increasing numbers in those early years.

Nineteen forty and the forced Evacuation of the B.E.F from Dunkirk, with some of the Soldiers arriving here, October saw the start in the building of an airfield on what had been historically the Goxhill Grange Farmland, in forty one culminating to increase the

volume of vehicles using the quite locals lanes as the transport fleet of CA & EC Howard toiled with their loads of chalk and other materials up Garness Hill to supply the building needs of this new project.

The short summer nights of May 41 saw air-raids on the port of Hull, and during a 3 night operation we were to witness at close range the destruction of seven miles of dockland across the river, by Fire & H. E. Bombs, together with a large section of the city, even the Rural areas like Goxhill didn't escape and at various isolated times we had received random sticks of bombs, the first two dropping onto farmland close to the embryo airfield and the L.N.E.R railway line towards the Beck.

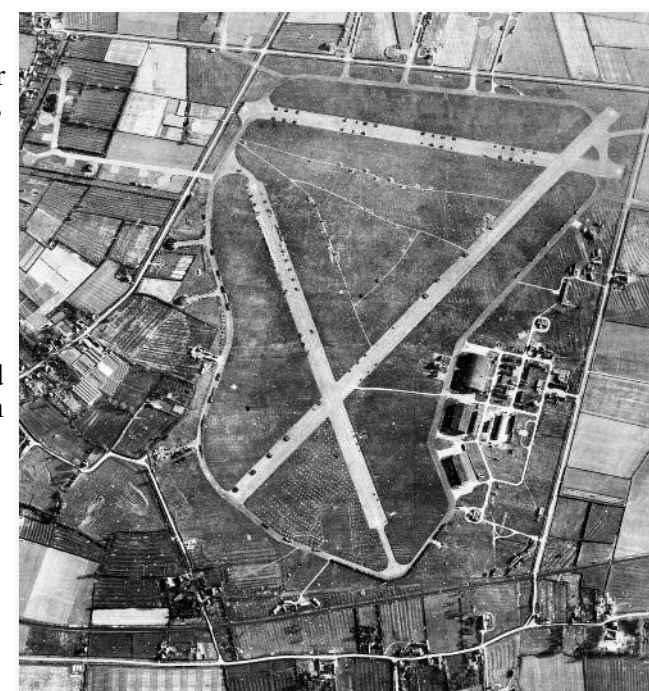
As a family we lived through these times close to the Haven and took cover under a bridge into the farmyard of Klondyke Farm, whenever the rumble of Aircraft passed overhead to carry out their mission and our local battery of Guns shook the ground as they leased off their shells, feeling safe in our improvised Dug-out, we moved away and lived at East Marsh Farm, but within 3 weeks of this migration a massive parachute mine fell on our bridge refuge, leaving mass destruction in its wake and demolishing the farmstead and small Chapel in an adjacent field, Alan Robinson witnessed at first hand the imminent destruction of his House & Glasshouses as another of these massive Parachute Mines down on him out of a dappled moonlit sky, which had been directed towards our local airfield, now well advanced in construction, Ron Parker and I found that spent military hardware became a full-time pursuit and we spent hours seeking out a Bewildering Arsenal of Souvenirs, after these raids.

We now had been joined by the Scottish Horse Regiment with some ancient Howitzers, the Kings Own Light Infantry and small contingents of Royal Artillery, RAF Regiment and even a few veteran Royal Marines who manned the Decoy Site.

By mid 1941 the airfield was almost completed and for some-time we saw the advanced RAF trainers, namely the Tiger Moth, Airspeed Oxford, Miles Master and later the Harvard, soaring into the air from our new runways.

We were soon to see our first transatlantic Visitors in the form of the US Army Air Force, moving in with us and introducing us to the social habits of their native country, they were from the farmlands of Iowa, the Southern States of Alabama and Tennessee, the industrial areas of Illinois and the Lakes, the Golden

States of Florida and California, not forgetting the tall Texans, all whom swelled our ranks with their clean-cut uniforms, whether as Officers or other Ranks.

The glossy American cigarette packets with the names like Pall Mall, Philip Morris, Chesterfield and Lucky Strike became as familiar as our own British makes.



P-38 Lockheed Lightning

The Aircraft which they brought into our midst was the Bell Airacobra, the unorthodox P-38 Lockheed Lightning with its highly tuned engines, flashing

across our Agricultural Landscape in their twin-boomed planes and rocketing into the air in tight formations.

Down on the ground they used the Willy's Jeep for everything imaginable, the massive GMC Jimmy's and Studebaker trucks became more familiar than the local haulage companies Bedford lorries.

Fortunately, these military units Discipline was in the hands of their respective Police, but the civilian population now outnumbered on a 3 to 1 basis was in the hands of PC Cook and the veteran PC Blowman.

The Memorial Hall was the Social Venue for Dancing and the Brocklesby Hunt and Generous Briton pubs continued to sell the liquid refreshments needed to

sustain what remained of the thirsty workers who vied with the various visitors for the ever-decreasing supplies, the local Grocers juggled with their meagre supplies in order to allocate the basic food ration, and our US Personnel did wonders for the local children by giving Christmas Parties at the Camp, in what is known as Soff Lane.

We had some Local Characters around including George Parker, our local Blacksmith who had built his own car and could be seen on occasions in shirt sleeves driving it around the village in a series of muffled explosions.

There was Billy Button, a man of Refined Upbringing who had early decided to opt out of the social pressures, he lived in a potting shed in the village and could be seen at times warming his hands on a flickering candle.

Village life has changed, with new Characters, new Topics of Conversation, and we had our fair share of residents with an exaggerated tale to tell, one of these, of my acquaintance, had an infinite ability to tell a tale and on one occasion was relating the story of our Drogue-Towing Lysander which had been scuttled after losing a wheel stub, by the time this character had used the story it had become "That Danged Landslider" such was a mood of a Village at War – we all lived through dark days and changing times, but emerged at the end with a lot of nostalgia and five years of memories which many years later, we realise it changed most of our lives Forever.

It will soon be spring and we will all look forward to the trees coming into leaf and the grass growing (whoops maybe I shouldn't mention that it means getting the mower out again), but also in our village it means the fantastic greeting as we come home, of the blossom trees, not long lived I know, but so beautiful and it is 'our entrance'. I know that I have touched on this subject before, my only excuse is that it is extremely important, and it needs to be at the forefront of our minds. Development is a fact that we cannot ignore, large or small it is progress, but as we know it should never be at the expense of the good things that we already have. Our environment and the overall picture in our area should be protected and enhanced, not at any time diminished. Already several trees have been removed, completely unnecessarily, they only needed pruning, it was claimed by N. Lines that they were diseased; the trunks left on the highway verge seem perfectly healthy. We owe it to the kindness and generosity of past residents to take care of them, and cherish the gift that they gave to us, they raised the money and did the work so that we could see the results, not so that we would allow their vision to be destroyed, and discarded. We have that responsibility. Highways may now have control of the grass verges, when they deem to do any maintenance, most is done by kind and caring residents, but whatever they say, they do not have the right to destroy our trees for mere convenience. MORE OF GOXHILL'S WAR DEAD REMEMBERED

After the coincidence of unearthing information about Henry Roberts, listed in the 'unknown' names in the Goxhill World War 1 Roll of Honour (covered in my last article) I felt that I would like to see if I could find any information about the other 'unknowns'; others named on the First World War memorials and any others, connected with Goxhill, who had served. I followed the 1901 census, specifically Goxhill district 20, picking up with the Drinkall family at White Cottage where the fourteen year old Olive Roberts, sister of Henry Roberts (Gander Autumn 2018) lived and worked.

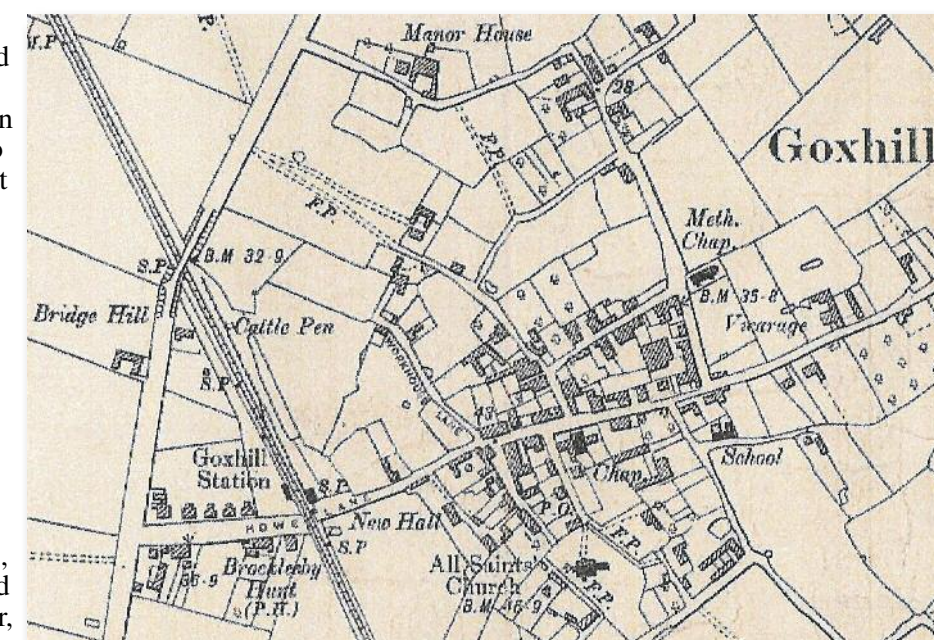
As I worked through the records more of the casualties emerged. William Roe, a carpenter, and his wife Charlotte, lived on the Square, just before Young Parker, the blacksmith, with six of their sons. The Roe family can easily be traced, living in Goxhill, back to the 1700s.

William and Charlotte would have, I believe, a total of twelve children, not all of whom survived beyond infancy. Of the six sons present in 1901, two were carpenters, two worked on the railway and the youngest were aged just eight and seven years. Eight year old Frederick (Fred) was, by 1911, a ship owner's clerk and living at 57 Lee Street, Hull with his closest sibling Alfred and Alfred's new wife. His home address in his will was listed as 213 Durban Road, Grimsby. Margaret Hatfield, spinster, is recorded in his will and on some of his military documents, she was his fiancée. Fred's father, was widowed in 1915 and also, at a later point moved to live on Brigg Road, Barrow on Humber. Fred Roe was Killed in Action on 28th April 1917.

After the Roes and Parkers are the Wilford family. Jumping forward, John William Wilford features on the 1939 census living between Glenora on The Square and Belmont Villa around the corner in Westfield Road. His son, Henry William, a grocer is also listed and Henry's son, Harry, assisted his father. Some may remember Harry's shop, where Holtby's Garage now stands on the corner of Westfield Road and Howe Lane. Next, returning to the 1901 census is John Tong Northen (at the Westfield Road shop (Gander Spring 2018)) and further down, in Stothards Lane, Edward Smith, his children and

his mother in law, Dinah Stothard, whose late husband's family gave their name to this lane. I'm reasonably confident of this because the 1891 census names Stothards Lane as the home of Edward, Dinah and her grandchildren. A map of Goxhill, dated 1890 shows buildings here. As many as six families lived there in the 1800s, according to census records, roughly where the house named Ashleigh now stands. These buildings appear to have been demolished by the map of 1908.

The next family listed after the Smiths, on the 1901 census, is that of William Atkin, a brickmaker. It is impossible to conclude exactly where the Atkins lived. The only certainly is that it is somewhere at the bottom of Westfield Road adjoining Greengate Lane. Maps show buildings where the homes named Westcombe House and Westcombe (both built by Jack and Vera Elwood nee Osgerby) and Hart Cottage now stand. William lived with his wife Maria and their seven children, five sons and two daughters. In 1901 Garnett is seven years old; the fourth of what would be their ten sons and the fourth of, by 1911, their fourteen surviving children. At the 1911 census Garnett is recorded as a butcher, living with his parents and nine younger siblings. Again, this doesn't specify where they live but the census records George Catley at Westfield House, Howe Lane (Gander Autumn 2018); three residences of four rooms each (possibly across the road from the library); five more residences; Mrs Broughton, a widow living with two adult daughters in a house of eight rooms (possibly The Briers, previously named Holme Lea); Robert Janney with his wife and adult son in a house of five rooms; the Atkin family in a house of eight rooms; Alfred Hilton, a pork butcher, living with his wife in a house of three rooms; Thomas Lamming, a farmer at (I think) Field Farm and then the Sergeant family at West Farm (where Greenfields is now) on Westfield Road. Garnett enlisted on 5th September 1914 and his record confirmed that he had completed an Apprenticeship of five years in Goxhill with William Raby, at the Butcher's shop, now Kings Well on Howe Lane (Gander Autumn 2017). Garnett Atkin Died of Wounds received on 16 February 1916.

Garnett ATKIN, Private 11136, 7th Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment. Died of Wounds 16 February 1916. Aged 21 years. Born 10 August 1894 at Thorganby (1911 census)/Thoresway (Enlistment record)). Resident of Goxhill. Enlisted Grimsby 5 September 1914. Son of William and Maria Atkin of Westfield Road, Goxhill. Buried in Lijssenthoek Military cemetery, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium

Returning to the 1901 census, next to the Atkin family is Edmund Border, a farmer, again possibly at Field Farm. His household includes Joseph Dunn, then aged eighteen years old and working on the farm. Joseph was the sixth of the seven sons of Mary (nee Marris) and the late George Dunn, both parents had been born in Goxhill. At the 1911 census Joseph, his widowed mother and his younger brother Thomas were living in Church Lane (now Street), in my estimation (using the number of rooms given and the census order), in part of the house now named Long Croft. Joseph is recorded now as a Ship's Plater. His mother was living here in the 1901 census, with three of her sons. Of Joseph's six brothers, five lived in Goxhill, including in the 1939 census, Frederick on Churchside and Thomas in Church Street, quite possibly in the same house. Joseph Dunn was Killed in Action on 21st March 1918.

Joseph DUNN, Sapper 164772, 509th Field Company, Royal Engineers. Killed in Action 21 March 1918. Aged 35 years. Born 10/11 1881 and lived in Goxhill. Enlisted Hull (date not know). Son of late George and Mary Dunn of Church Street, Goxhill. No known grave. Commemorated on Arras Memorial, Pas de Calais, France.

Again, returning to the 1901 census, after Border's farm is West Farm (where Greenfields now stands) returning, I believe, back up Westfield Road towards Howe Lane. William Blackburn, variously recorded on a number of records as a joiner, wheelwright and carpenter is listed next, possibly at Haynton. Walter Haldenby, a Sloop



owner's clerk is next, at Rose Cottage, connected possibly to where Rose Villa now stands? The enumerator then records Septimus Neave, a joiner and carpenter with his wife Elizabeth (Belmont Villa); Henry Royston, a gardener (Swiss Cottage) and finally William Stamp at the Royal Oak Inn on Westfield Road. I believe that

these homes are Belmont Villa (Neave), Swiss Cottage (Royston) and Oak Cottage (Stamp). Septimus Neave, joiner and carpenter lived with his wife Elizabeth and, at the 1901 census, three of his six children. John, his third son and fourth child was, by now, boarding in Sheffield, working in railway engine manufacture. Septimus and Elizabeth were, by 1905, living at Melbourne House on Station Road (now Howe Lane). John, by 1911, had married and was living with his wife Minnie, who had also been born in Goxhill, and their young son in Worlaby. John's occupation is recorded as 'independent'. Their son, named William Septimus, died later that year and at a later point John worked as a cattle dealer. John's older brother Arthur, a tailor, lived in Goxhill all his life. Some will remember Arthur's children Bette, Fitz and Jack who lived at Harcourt House on Chapel Street. His other son Sep lived with his wife and family at Ainslie opposite the shop on Westfield Road (family members live in the village to this day). John commenced his service on 15 September 1916. John Neave died on 23rd December 1917 when his ship HMS Torrent was one of three Royal Navy ship sunk by mines off the Dutch North Sea coast. A total of two hundred and fifty two seamen were lost in that one incident.

John NEAVE, Stoker 1st Class K/36517, HMS Torrent, Royal Navy. Died 23 December 1917. Aged 37 years. Born 29 September 1880 in Goxhill. Later a resident of Sheffield then Saxby and Worlaby. Enlisted 15 September 1916 (place not found). Son of Septimus and Elizabeth Neave of Melborne House, Goxhill. Husband of Minnie Neave of Worlaby. No known grave. Also commemorated on Portsmouth Naval Memorial, Southsea, Hampshire.

Another year has been and gone and no doubt any resolutions made have now been broken.

What none of us can escape is, dare I say it, BREXIT. When the politicians have finished their playground antics and pulled together for a solution to the situation perhaps things will become clearer. We are told our food prices will escalate as transportation will be problematic, delays will be inevitable which will impact getting fresh fruit and veg to the shops.

This also highlights delays in the transportation of livestock between UK and Europe. Animals sometimes travel in hot, overcrowded containers with little to no water. The withdrawal of the Shetland Pony Stud Book Society out of the Reading sales is of huge concern for the breed. This was following multiple complaints regarding welfare. The sales already attract big quantity buyers from abroad who pay top money for them. Their future is looking bleak as they may well be the ones being shipped abroad for meat. Please do not sit back and feel sorry for them. You have the power to influence a change. Politicians will, eventually, stand again for election. Write or email your MP to highlight the situation or just to lend your voice and concerns for all animal welfare in this situation. This could be your only chance to make a difference. If you love animals, please do take the time.

Parade of horses from all parts of the world that took place in London attracted 60 horses, I think the 25 from Goxhill speaks volumes. Well done to all involved.

To all those who kindly donated items for the Donkeys in the Gambia I can finally report that they have been sorted, oiled several times and made up. My niece and myself blinged up the browbands and made some extra ones. We finished up sending 32 bridles, 32 Snaffle bits and 65 headcollars. I also sent some medical supplies including Gamgee and surgical cotton wool.

The other quest for boots, jodhpurs and jackets for the Ebony Horse Club, which caters for underprivileged children in Brixton, London proved successful too. All the full size headcollars, which were donated for the donkeys and too big, were also sent here.

Both charities were very grateful, and I have been invited to go out the Gambia as a volunteer. Thank you to everyone who donated.

My most grateful thanks to Ann Lawtey, who very kindly delivered all the above items, which filled her car, firstly to Surrey and then Brixton. You're a star!!

Much debate is taking place in the governing bodies of horse clubs. Cushings disease in horses (and dogs) is as Parkinsons disease in humans and is a degenerative condition. In horses the drug Pergolide is used to replace dopamine in the brain. Under the drug rules it has been a banned substance in competition horses but the rules in the USA have now changed and it is allowed. Formerly anyone competing with a horse on this medication had to come off it in order to pass a drugs test. It now has to be decided if other disciplines will follow. I do hope so as it

does not enhance performance it just gives quality of life. I would assume coming off for competition and going back on may cause more damage or be detrimental.

In the last edition of the Gander I mentioned the need by law for micro-chipping of all equines and having a pop in session for this purpose. This would be at a greatly reduced price and would probably take place on a Saturday. To date I do not have enough interest to warrant a vet coming out, so if you missed my previous article and are interested please give me a call to go on the list.

For those people interested in carriage driving or leaning to drive a pony and trap it is hoped that The Poacher Harness Club will run another demonstration with a competition for their members. They will be on hand to answer questions and offer advice. If it goes ahead it will be around September, but a show of interest would be helpful to the organisers. If you want

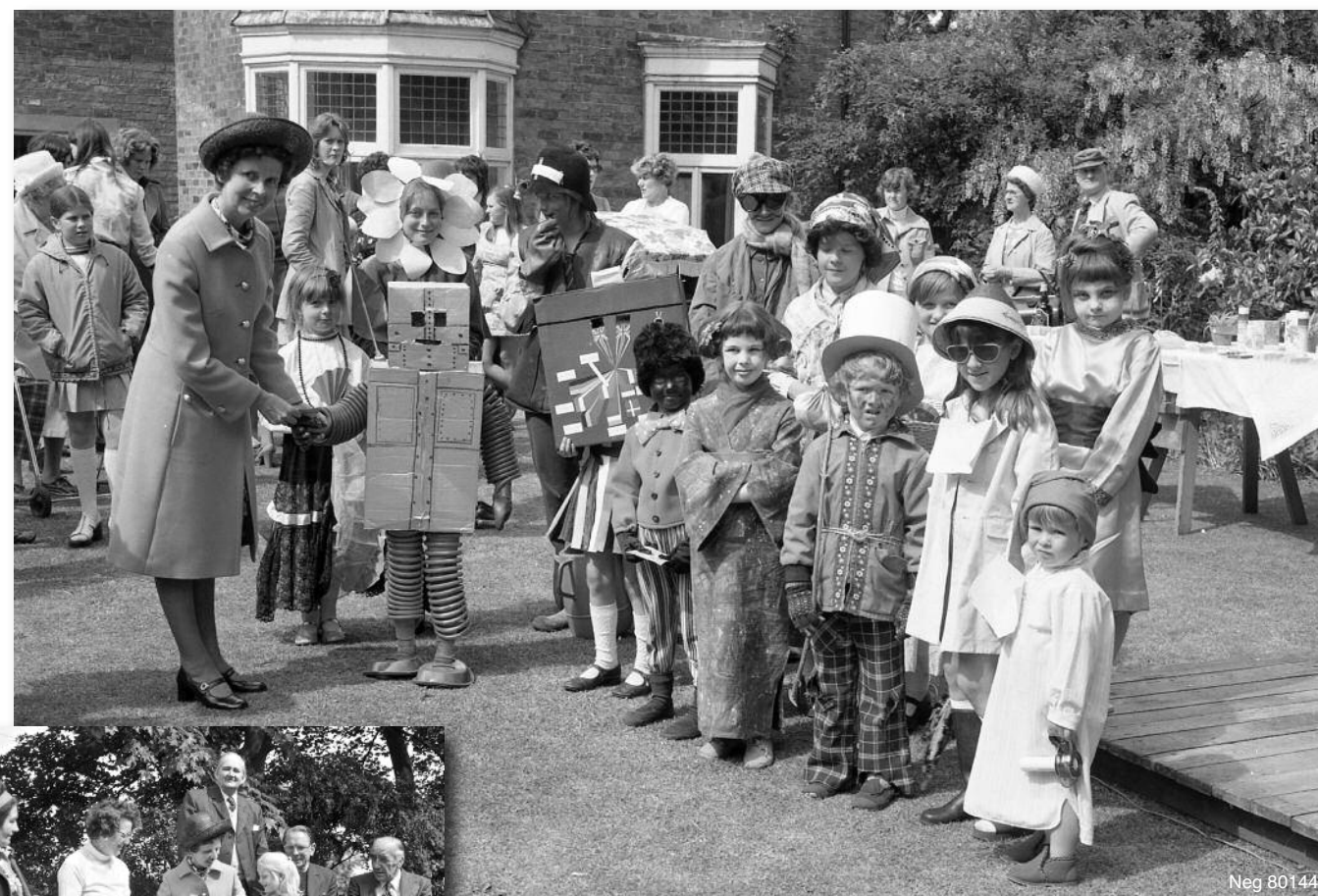
