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
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Welcome to the Spring edition of the Gander!

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LETTER FROM THE CHAPEL

Dear Friends

As you read this letter we are in the middle of Lent which began on Ash Wednesday. In the past Christians began to fast on Ash Wednesday. Lent is still a significant time for Christians as we think about the way Jesus overcame temptation at the beginning of his ministry and then suffered and died at the end of it.

However, this year there was something different about Ash Wednesday. On Ash Wednesday 2024 a number of people weren't fasting or feeling particularly sombre. Instead, they were gorging themselves on chocolates. That's because this year Ash Wednesday was the 14th February and so coincided with St Valentine's Day.

Who was St Valentine? He was an Italian clergyman who lived in the third century and became a martyr. But there are a lot of different legends about him and it's hard to know now whether any of them are true. One story says that just before he was martyred St Valentine sent a letter to a girl called Julia, who he had cured of blindness, and signed it "from your Valentine." This is said to be where the idea of St Valentine's Day cards came from. Another story says that St Valentine ministered to persecuted Christians and used to give them hearts cut out of parchment to remind them of God's love. According to a third story St Valentine conducted secret weddings for Roman soldiers who were forbidden at that time to get married. Whatever the truth about St Valentine, he has become the patron saint of lovers.

Some people think that Ash Wednesday and St Valentine's Day are so opposite that it's difficult to celebrate them on the same day. However, if you think about it, there are connections between the season of Lent and St Valentine. In Lent we think about the suffering and death of Jesus. St Valentine suffered and died because of his faith in Jesus.

Jesus suffered and died because of his great love for people. There is a well-known Bible verse, John 3:16 which says, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."

During the course of Lent we are constantly reminded of all that Jesus suffered because of his love for others.

How appropriate it is that this year we marked the beginning of Lent by celebrating the feast of the patron saint of lovers! I wish you all a blessed Lent and pray that you will be aware of God's great love for you during this special season.



THE BARTON HERITAGE PROJECT Celebrating the rich history of Barton upon Humber

The Barton Heritage Project started in 2018 with a partnership between The Ropewalk, Wilderspin & National School Museum and North Lincolnshire Council to shout about the fantastic wealth of heritage sites in the town and promote and celebrate Barton's culture and heritage and increase tourism to the area. The Heritage Open Days in 2018 and 2019 had talks, walks and open buildings enjoyed by thousands of people from around the region, but the project was mothballed as Covid hit.

The Barton Heritage Project was re-launched in late 2023 thanks to funding from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund, a Levelling Up programme, The Ropewalk, and the Barton

Partnership. This funding is being used in Barton Upon Humber to not only increase local knowledge of the town's heritage, but to also draw in visitors from out of town to celebrate

and learn more about the town. A team led by officers from The Ropewalk and Wilderspin now has a Volunteer Coordinator, Marketing Officer, Community Engagement Officer and an Education Outreach Officer. This new team has been formed to work with partners and stakeholders within the town and surrounding areas to put plans in place and extend local and regional knowledge of our heritage.



As part of the project, the partners have been looking at ways to restore and reopen Baysgarth House. Work has been going on behind the scenes with The Ropewalk and North Lincolnshire Council exploring all possibilities for the last two years. The Ropewalk with North Lincolnshire Council's support was successful with a £250,000 grant application to the Community Ownership Fund. The news, received a few days before Christmas, was a fantastic end to the year. We would like to add a note of caution as there is still some way to go before we reach the required level of funds to make this happen, but it is looking a lot more positive. Fingers crossed the results due from other funders in the spring will mean work can begin in the summer. You might however not recognise the 1925 building that welcomed Goxhill villagers inside its walls.

The original building looked so small and quaint with its trellis fencing and Tyrolean roof vents. The extra room provided by the side wings were a 1970's addition. Some villagers might remember that not long after that, children from the Primary School could be seen trooping up the road each day in a disciplined crocodile, on their way to the Hall for their lunch.

After 90 years of sterling service, the damp and crumbling front section was cheerfully demolished and rebuilt a mere 6/7 years ago while the kitchen was gutted and reinstalled more recently (2021). This all tells you that maintaining a building that's 100 years old is a full time job. That aside, to celebrate our anniversary we hope to put on an exhibition showcasing how the hall building has evolved and how it was used over the last 100 years and to hold one or two events from those early days. Exciting times ahead...

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
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GOXHILL PARISH COUNCIL

Councillor Mike Gathercole

Regardless of anything that the Parish Council may have done in the last three months, the overriding memory will be the very sad and unexpected death of Councillor Mike Gathercole. Only hours earlier Mike had been sat in the Parish Room discussing Council business like he had at virtually every Council meeting since he joined GPC in 2001. After 23 years as a Parish Councillor he will be sorely missed.

2024/25 Precept

December is the month where we set our budget (known as the Precept) for the next council year. Councils do not carry forward any funds from the previous year unless there are outstanding invoices from work undertaken prior to 1st April. Therefore, we have to cover every known and anticipated spend for the next 12 months as well as including funding for maintenance activities and any projects that the Council plan to undertake in the next 12 months. To this end the Council's planned expenditure for 2024/5 is £99,532 with expected income of £26,182 making a total of £73,350. However, we will have some surplus left in the current account on 31st March so we have been able to reduce the Precept requirement to £60,350. This is an 18.5% reduction on last year's Precept requirement.

South End Traffic Issues

The Council has been working with North Lincs Council officers, South End residents and the Police trying to identify a solution to the traffic issues being experienced in this area. Whilst GPC is unable to actually implement any changes to traffic movements we have been able to bring people together to discuss the issues and that has led to a public meeting that was held on 25th January 2024. At that meeting over 200 Goxhill residents came to speak to NLC Director Lesley Potts and her team. In addition Ms Potts was presented with over 300 written comments on the traffic issues in Goxhill. It is my understanding that all this information, along with reports from a Humberside Police safety officer, NLC Highways and her own observations, will be taken into account before she produces a report. I have been assured by Ms Potts and Cllr R Hannigan that there will be another public meeting where the report will be presented to the village.

Land to the rear of Hawthorn Gardens

As mentioned in the last Gander, Keigar Homes Ltd are looking at options for a community area on the land next to the playing field. We have provided a number of suggestions for them to consider and it is hoped that a reply from Keigar will be available for discussion at the February meeting.

Mary Denness Blue Plaque

The Council were asked to consider erecting a blue

plaque in the village to recognise Mary Denness, one of the 4 Headscarf Revolutionaries (Yvonne Blenkinsop, Lillian Bilocca, Mary Denness and Christine Smallbone.) who changed the safety of the fishing industry for everyone. She lived in Goxhill from 1971 to 2017. GPC supported this request and after speaking to her family we have spoken to the Methodist Chapel with a view to placing the plaque at the chapel. This will now go to Goxhill Methodist Church Council for their input.

Parish Clerk - Hannah Hepworth

I am pleased to say that our new clerk, Hannah Hepworth, is settling in well to her role. The Personnel Committee (during the recruitment process) and the Council (on appointment) have made some adjustments to working hours and contact methods.

and will connect to her mobile if not answered within 10 rings. The Clerk will also be working from the Parish Room every Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday 0900-1200.

Best Kept Village

The Council have applied for a grant from NLC for the purchase of perennial plants and shrubs. If we are successful these will be shared between the village planters, Millennium Green and a new planted area at North End next to the notice board. If you would like to help or were one of the Lifestyle

group that did the original planting please get in touch with me or the Clerk. Any young people and their adult representatives wanting ideas for a Lifestyle Challenge this year are welcome to contact our Clerk who has a wealth of experience in supporting winning teams and can suggest ideas which combine with the Council's objectives and village priorities.

Community Cafe

The Chairman's allowance sponsored a Community Cafe at the Memorial Hall just before Christmas. It was well supported by members of the public and Councillors and gave us an opportunity to listen to parishioners.



Stage 1 of the consultation will be undertaken between Monday 12 February 2024 and Friday 11 April 2024.

During this consultation, NLC will be seeking views and/or proposals about existing parish boundaries, numbers of councillors and if any new parishes should be created or existing parishes abolished or merged and where these should be.

Before making any recommendations or publishing final proposals, **NLC will take full account of the views of local people in the Parishes being reviewed** and will comply with the statutory consultative requirements by –

- · Consulting local government electors in the Parishes.
- Consulting any other person or body (including other relevant local authorities and parish councils) which appears to the council to have an interest in the review.

NLC is encouraging any individual, business or organisation that has an interest in the governance of their parish to complete a short questionnaire, which can be accessed at Community Governance Review - have your say (Page 1 of 5) (office.com)

In the autumn a lot of the jobs were completed including scarifying and work to help drainage, with the latter being very beneficial given the exceptionally wet weather we have had in recent months. Top dressings of sand, fertilizer, and a product to aid water retention during a (hopefully) sunny and dry summer will help ensure that our members, and opponents, enjoy a good playing surface throughout the season.

Having spent quite a lot of volunteer time and money on our facilities we reckon we offer some of the best playing and viewing for spectators in North Lincolnshire and beyond. Quite a few Goxhill residents now attend our matches just to watch so, if you have never been before, make time this year visit us whether your intention is to play or watch. There is no need to be a member or to pay anything at all to spectate.

Ideally, we want to tempt people to try their hand at lawn bowling and perhaps take it up as a regular sport. If you think that might be of interest to you then April is the best time to start. Learning the basics early on means you can get maximum value from

membership of our club if you decide to join. Lawn bowling is an inexpensive sport that most people can enjoy at pretty much any age so it is a great pastime for involving the whole family. Even if you have not been active in other sports in the past, you should find bowling well within your physical capabilities and very enjoyable.

At Goxhill Bowling Club you can try out lawn bowling entirely free. With footwear that will not damage the green reasonably flat-soled shoes, sandals or trainers - you are good to go. We can lend everything else required, with free basic coaching and support offered by experienced bowlers. Lawn bowls are available to borrow without charge and when you want to buy your own bowls, they are usually available second-hand and easily affordable if you do not want to buy new.

If you come along to watch our matches then we are confident that you will find it a pleasant way to enjoy a summer evening and we are always happy to welcome spectators. Bench seats with cushions at the front of our pavilion and a viewing shelter provide good views and protection if there is a bit of a breeze or an unexpected shower. Scoreboards show how games are progressing on each rink and if the scoring or rules are unclear then there will usually be somebody watching who can explain what is happening. We aim to play our matches competitively but in a polite and sporting manner. All we ask of spectators is that they support us in the same fashion.

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
Welcome to Goxhill sign

It's the Prince of Wales (who later became King Edward VII) to thank for our Welcome to Goxhill sign. In the early 20th century, he commissioned four signs on his Sandringham Estate in Norfolk to "foster community spirit, and identify".

Indeed, Goxhill stands proud as it keeps this tradition

going, with many thanks to Paul, the Parish Council, Tony, Steve, Rob, Roger, Bruce and Bob.

The original sign was commissioned by the Parish Council in, or around, 1996. It was made by **Thompson Industries**, then based in Goxhill. There is a plaque dedicated to Thompson Industries at the back of the post. The post is made from Iroko wood, which is native to West Africa.



Goxhill's farming heritage to our unique involvement in WW2. The propeller in the middle represents the old airfield at Goxhill and the silver leaf finish is in recognition of the P-38 lightnings used by the Americans in WW2. This is surrounded by poppies and wheat, our lovely All Saints church, and the geese. Why geese, you might say? Apparently they used to gather on the hill (next to what is now the Parish Rooms) when the Humber tide was in. It became known as 'Goosehill'. The beautiful blossom is self explanatory. The separate picture located to the left of the sign, is in recognition of our farming community.

project was organised by Paul Weeks, and funded by the Parish Council. **Steve Scrivener** helped with the dismantling, and reassembling. One of our residents, Tony Ruddy, kindly donated £100 towards the cost of restoration. The 'acorn' situated at the top of the post was rotten, and had to be completely replaced.

Roger Arnott, a woodturner from Barton, had the pleasure of turning a very large & heavy piece of Iroko into a beautiful finial. The bracket was sand blasted by Rob Robertson, (Blasted Ltd) who is located in Goxhill, and the actual post was stripped, sanded and oiled with double boiled linseed, to its

original wood by Paul Weeks.

Now for the pièce de résistance, the actual sign. This was lovingly restored by Bruce Margetson (BFM Painting Services), who stated: "I had always admired the original design of the sign and felt that a repainted sign should closely simulate the original layout. On getting the go-ahead, I decided to get the best possible finish prior to the repainting with the help of Bob Vessey (AutoCosmetix), in which I was confident of achieving the best possible outcome in terms of surface preparation and finish. On the original sign, indications of paint fade and corrosion due to exposure to the elements were clearly visible and most of the pictorial elements had lost their definition. I proposed the option of making the propeller



image more metallic in appearance than the original and while doing so, to also do the lettering in the same kind of finish. For this, I decided to use a genuine silver leaf technique, whereas the rest of the sign was hand painted with sign enamel. Bob kindly lacquered the finished sign for protection. Here's hoping the renewed sign will be an attractive and pleasing feature at the entrance to the village, backed up by our beautiful line of cherry trees".

Well said Bruce! and well done everyone! Community Spirit, and having pride in our village is what Goxhill is all about.



Goxhill Gander Grant Scheme

Over the last few years, the Gander has helped with the printing costs for the Goxhill Community Calendar and also for publicity material and maps for Goxhill Open Gardens.

It has been decided to make this grant scheme available to anyone in Goxhill.

Who will it be open to?

Any Goxhill resident or group over the age of 13 years (with their parents permission) and any other person over the age of 18 years. The award of a grant will not take into account gender, race, disability etc.

The scheme is aimed mainly at persons (not exclusive to) who do not have the chance of applying to other grant organisation. The maximum grant will be £500.

The grant will need evidence of how it will be spent and how deliverable the award will be achieved by

the applicant. All records of the expenditure must be shown to the Gander Team and the Team reserve the right to ask for repayment should it be felt necessary.

The application to the fund can only be made on the official grant application form by the applicant. If the person is under 18 years old then the application should be counter signed by a responsible person ie parent, guardian etc.

An applicant must be aware, under General Data Protection Regulation legislation, their application will be stored on a computer for a duration as determined necessary by the Gander Team.

Who decides on the awarding of the grant? Members of Goxhill Gander Editorial Team will decide whether to agree the application and their decision will be final.

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Mike Gathercole 7/2/1954 - 5/1/2024

It was a huge shock and with great sadness that we heard that Mike Gathercole had died suddenly on Friday 5th January 2024.

Mike and his family have lived in Goxhill for over 34 years and for a great number of those he had been involved in village community activities.

When I say involved, that is a real understatement of Mike's commitment to so much in Goxhill, so much progress and achievement. How he fitted it all in is truly amazing.

In 1992, Mike became a governor at Goxhill School and was actively involved for 19 years, including Chair of Governors for several years. He resigned in 2011 and later continued as a governor at the Grange Primary School in Scunthorpe and Kirton Lindsey Primary School.

In 1996 he became involved with the Gander, stepping in to join a new committee, when it was in danger of folding, and

continued for 27 years. He did 8 years as coordinator/editor's assistant and managed 2 editions as editor on his own, taking over when Richard Owen had to retire. Mike was relieved when Adam Ellis took over from him, as it

was too much for one person to do at the time. But he continued on the Gander Team to the end.

In 2001, Mike became a Parish Councillor. He was co-opted onto the Parish Council in November 2001. However Mike was a Police Officer and he had to take the Chief Constable of Humberside Police to court, as he refused Mike permission to take on the role. The Chief Constable believed that regulations stated that 'police officers may not take an active part in politics'. His interpretation was over ruled in court, as their view was that serving on a Parish Council

During his service he was Parish Council Chairman for 16 years, from 2004 until 2016 and again from 2019 until 2023. Mike served for a total of 23 years on the council until his untimely death on 5th January 2024. Less than 24 hours earlier he had sat with other Councillors and members of the public in the Parish Rooms, discussing council business as usual on the first Thursday of

In 2007 he became Chairman of the Barton Cleethorpes Community Rail Partnership; a role he was to continue with for 16 years, striving to put the Partnership on a secure footing whilst making sure that Goxhill Station was well looked after.

From 2008, Mike was a regular at the Goxhill Allotments, overseeing them on behalf of the Parish Council, before taking on his own allotment in 2010. During his 16-year association with the allotments he was involved with fundraising, building and providing facilities on the site. So, in 2022 when the Allotment Association was re-formed, Mike was a natural for the role of Chairman.





We are writing to introduce ourselves as your **Neighbourhood Policing Team** in Humberside Police, covering the **Ferry Ward**. The ward which includes Goxhill is covered by **Sergeant Jamie Allen**, **PC Lewis Call and PCSO Richard Lawson**.

PC Call has 7 years' experience as a police officer and **PCSO Richard Lawson** has been in the position for 16 years. We have already built-up strong relationships with Goxhill Primary School, and we also attend the Memorial Hall on regular occasions for monthly police drop-ins. We work out of **Barton Police station** and can be contacted on the phone via **101** or by email from the **Humberside Police website, Ferry Ward webpage**.

We are also operating a community alert system, called **My Community Alert.** This is a free messaging system operated by Humberside Police, Humberside Fire & Rescue Service, and Humberside Office of the Police & Crime Commissioner, giving you live information about incidents happening in your area. This operates via emails which can help to make you aware of any issues that could affect you, such as burglaries in your area or prolific offences affecting your community.

We are also conducting a **short survey** which I hope you can take a few minutes to complete, which will help us to better understand our community and identify any issues which we can work together to resolve. Your feedback will help us to improve our services and better help the community.

A 'CONVERSATION' WITH NLC ON TRAFFIC PROBLEMS AT GOXHILL

It was very good to see such a large and vociferous gathering in the Memorial Hall on 25th January, to have a 'conversation' with Lesley Potts, Assistant Director Place, North Lincolnshire Council and other experts from NLC.

Ward councillors and our MP were also present, plus members of our Parish Council.

The traffic problem is caused by the increasing numbers of HGVs to and from the old airfield, by

Salfina and other companies on our limited country road network.

A proposed one-way system round the roads on the Marsh, to avoid the bottle neck at South End, has been withdrawn, for the time being. It met with so much opposition from the whole of the village, as it shifts the problem to

Thornton Road, Ferry Road at North End and on to the narrow country lanes on the Marsh.

Over 225 attended the meeting, including residents from all parts of the village, representatives of transport companies and businesses on the marsh, farmers and a number of children showing an interest in the future.

Heated debates with NLC experts, went on around

each of the tables, spread with maps of the area. By the end they were covered with post it notes of all the concerns, suggestions and ideas for a solution. Angela Weeks, one of Goxhill's residents fighting to find a solution to the traffic problems, said "Goxhill did us proud with over 300 signatures. I hope NLC (and the Parish) got the message. I am gearing myself up for another fight if need be. One thing I found on the 'conversation' day, was the passion

conversation day, was the passion and community spirit of all the village."

For the Gas pipeline, constructed a few years ago, a by-pass at South End was a temporary solution and could not become permanent.

But this is no longer a temporary problem and could get worse if more use of the old airfield increases the amount of HGVs in and around Goxhill.

The police have said the current traffic arrangement at South End is not safe.

And the other roads involved are not suitable, as they are, for more and more heavy vehicles.

NLC have advised it will consider all the feedback from the 'conversation' and come back with their proposed solution in about 6 weeks.

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HISTORY OF HORTICULTURE IN GOXHILL - Article 8

The Short Family - The last Goxhill man killed on the field of battle and his brother the Market Gardener Part 2 of 2

In my last article I provided details of the first and second generations of the Short family who lived in Goxhill. William Short (1843-1930) was head of the first generation of the Short family; William's surviving son Charles (1870-1957) was head of a branch of the second generation of the Short Family. I will concentrate in this article on Charles Short and, in particular, his two older sons, William Short (b. 1894), who is named on the village World War 1 memorial plaque and in the church too, and Charles Short (junior) (b. 1898) who was a Market Gardener.

Charles Short senior, who in 1891 was recorded working as a farm servant at Goxhill Hall, married Mary Ann Robinson (b. 1874) in Goxhill Church on 27 September 1893. Mary Ann Robinson was a servant working for Robert and Jane Fulstow. The Fulstows had lived at Goxhill Hall but after retirement lived in the village at, I believe, Spring Garth which stands today opposite the Memorial Hall.

Charles Short senior had become a Railway Signalman

just prior to his marriage and he and Mary Ann Short (nee Robinson) lived initially in Frodingham, Scunthorpe. Their eldest child William was born there, a year to the day after their marriage. The family moved then to Thornton Curtis where their second child Charles (1898) was born. The following year a third son Harold was born in Goxhill. In the 1901 village census Charles senior's occupation was given as a 'Carrier of Farm Goods'. In the 1901 Glanford Brigg Valuation List Charles Short senior's home comprised 'House, Outbuildings and Garden, Farm Buildings and Land' in Buttersfield (an area of College Road) and is recorded being owned by 'Samuel Roe's Representatives'.

Samuel Roe, a Carpenter of The Square, Goxhill, had died in 1895 (he was the grandfather of Frederick Roe (Gander Spring 2019)). Samuel Roe's widow, Elizabeth,

which was purchased by Mr Short, Goxhill £360°. I believe that this is the property now named Summerfield Farm on College Road and that Charles Short had purchased the home that he was living in. Charles and Mary Ann lived on College Road until the 1940s, when they moved to Station Road in Thornton Curtis.

A 1948 map of Goxhill shows evidence of the United States Army Air Force (USAAF) sites in the village. One of these sites lies just to the east of the house at

Summerfield Farm. I wonder if this was the reason that Charles Short (senior) made the decision to move from Goxhill to Thornton Curtis?

Third generation of the Short family in Goxhill. Charles and Mary Ann Short had seven children. Their seventh and youngest child and sixth son, George, was born on 31 December 1911. He lived for just three days and was buried in Goxhill on 3 January 1912.

Their sixth child, Arthur, was born in Goxhill in 1907.


Arthur married in Barton in 1929 and his two sons William (b. 1930) and Peter (b. 1933) were born in Goxhill. The 1939 census lists Arthur as a 'Small Holder, Own Account' on the East Marsh Road. *Can anyone state where this was?* Arthur and his wife Muriel lived eventually, I believe, in Scunthorpe. I certainly remember Arthur and Muriel's granddaughter Wendy, who was Peter's daughter. Wendy married Jim Brennan. The Brennan family lived in Abbeygarth Villas and Jim's younger brother Terry worked for my dad as a delivery boy at London House. I remember that Terry joined the Royal Marines; his father had served as a Colour Sergeant in the Royal Marines and Terry was

keen to emulate him.

Charles and Mary Ann Short's fifth child and only daughter was Ivy Elizabeth (b. 1904). Ivy married Charles Rhodes of East Halton in 1930. Charles and Ivy Elizabeth Rhodes (nee Short) farmed on the Barrow end of College Road. Ivy died in 1958 and her probate states that she was 'of Thornton Road, Goxhill'. *Again, can anyone tell me where she lived?* The Short's fourth child, son Alfred (b. 1903), married Alice Grace Espin in Barton in 1925 and lived, I believe in Scunthorpe where he was a Locomotive Driver at the Steel Works.

The Short's third son Harold, their first child to be born in Goxhill, was listed in the 1921 census working as a 'Horseman on Farm' for Charles Hill who was the Farm Foreman for Francis Cavill who farmed at College Farm near Thornton Abbey. This farm stands alongside the railway line and is between Soff Lane, South End and College Road near Thornton Abbey. Harold Short married Annie Lusby Grey (formerly Abey) in 1926. Annie was a widow with a young daughter. Harold, Annie and her daughter made their home on the Beckside at Thornton Abbey, close to the Abey family farm, known as Top Farm (now demolished). They moved later to live on Station Road in Thornton Curtis. Annie was a member of the Goxhill Methodist Sisterhood and the Women's Institiute.

An interesting familial connection between the Short and Abey families is that an uncle of Annie Short (nee Abey),

Albert Abey was also a Market Gardener. In the 1921 census Albert Abey is recorded, with his young family, living in three rooms

with his young family, living in three rooms close to the Butterswood railway crossing but by 1939 the Abey family are living at Foxhill Farm which stands on College Road, looking towards the Re-cycling Centre and before Summerfield Farm where, I believe, the Short family were living.

Market Gardener: Charles Short (b. 1898), Charles and Mary Ann Short's second son, had been born in Thornton Curtis on 14 March 1898. He was admitted into Goxhill School on 6 April 1902 shortly after his fourth birthday. The Admissions Register states that Charles left Goxhill School on 14 March 1911, on his thirteenth birthday, receiving an age exemption because he was to be employed in an Agricultural role. When enlisting into the Royal Navy in May 1918, Charles was recorded being a Plate Layer's

Labourer. He worked on the Railway. In the Royal Navy he served as a Stoker, in the Ship's Engine Room. After completing his service, by 1921, Charles was recorded living with his parents at Summerfield Farm, working as a Carrier on his 'Own Account'. He appears to have taken over this role from his father. Charles Short (senior) is




Marriage of Charles Short and Nora Thompson in Goxhill on 20 July 1921 reported in The Hull Daily Mail 30 July 1921. recorded now as a 'Farmer'.
Charles junior married Nora Thompson
(b. 1899 Goxhill) in Goxhill Church on 20 July
1921. Their attendants were Charles Short's
sister Ivy (later Rhodes) and Emily Taylor, his
cousin. Harold, his brother, was the best
man. Charlie Guilliatt believes that, when
first married, Charles and Nora lived near to
Charlie's grandparents, the Beswicks, who
lived at No 1 Council Villas, Thornton Road.

No specific address is given in a newspaper report on 27 November 1928 in the Hull Daily Mail for Charles Short, but the article states that, at the Barton and District Horticultural Society's Annual Show 'C. Short, Goxhill' won 1st prize in the competitions for 'Cauliflowers' and 'Carrots (stumps rooted)'. It seems that Charles had found his calling in Market Gardening.

This seems to be an appropriate place to explain other familial links between Charles

Short junior and other Goxhill Market Gardeners who I have covered in previous Gander articles.

See the table below showing relationships between Charles Short and other village Market Gardeners and bullet points added to support the table.



Frederick Dunn (b. 1871), married Fanny Short and was Charles Short's uncle. Frederick is recorded being a
Market Gardener at Perran Cottage in Willow Lane, North End between 1911 (possibly as early as 1908 when William
Austin Allitt died) and 1926 when the property was advertised for sale (Gander Autumn 2022)

John Robinson husband of Fanny and father of Mary Ann and Ada is not relation to Alan Robinson

- Frederick and Fanny Dunn (nee Short)'s brother and sister George and Eliza Dunn (nee Short) were the parents of Mildred Dunn who married Bill Palmer. Bill was employed as a Market Gardener by Hawthorne Gardens (Goxhill) Ltd from 1928 until his death in 1967
- Charles Short's aunt, Ada Robinson (his mother's sister) married Herbert Plaskett (b. 1881). Herbert is recorded being a Market Gardener at Perran Cottage most probably between 1926 when Frederick Dunn left and until just after 1945. His sons Harold and Ernie worked alongside him (Gander Autumn 2022)
- Herbert Plaskett's sister Ellen was Alan Robinson's mother in law. Alan (b. 1907) established a Market Garden at Staveley House on Ruards Road shortly after his marriage. His best man when he married was Harold Plaskett, son of Herbert and Ada Plaskett (nee Robinson), who was his bride's cousin.



By the time of the 1939 census Charles and Nora Short were living at Homefield, Mill Lane where Charles was a 'Market Gardener, Own Account'. I haven't been able to ascertain whether this had been his grandfather, William Short's (b. 1865) home but Homefield stands in the same area of the village where Charles Short junior's grandfather had lived.

What we do know, from recollections in Ron Parker's Goxhill at War, is that Mr and Mrs Short, like many growers in the area, took their produce on the train to New Holland and then on the ferry, across the river, to sell at the market in Hull.

Charles Short's wife Nora died in the South Ferriby Nursing Home in 1985 and Charles died the following year in Scunthorpe General Hospital. His probate states that he was 'of Homefield, Mill Lane, North End, Goxhill. In Charles Short's will he bequeathed £300 to the Goxhill Memorial Hall.

The 'Short' Award'* was established in Charles Short's name, as a community award to recognise individuals who do something special for the village. It was presented for the first time in 1988. The first recipient of the award was C. G. van den Bos: Charles Gilbert, who was better known to everyone as Sam. Sam was the youngest child of Jacob van den Bos and grandson of Herbert Tyson. Jacob van den Bos and Herbert Tyson established the Market Garden, Hawthorne Gardens (Goxhill) Ltd in the village. In my Summer 2024 article, I will start to tell the story of the Tyson and van den Bos families and the impact of Hawthorne Gardens on the village.

The Short family story concludes below with Charles Short's older brother, William Short, who is commemorated on the village World War 1 memorials.

William SHORT, Lance Corporal 15173, 1st Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment. Killed in Action 6 November 1918. Aged 24 years. Born 27 September 1894, Frodingham, Scunthorpe. Son of Charles and Mary Ann Short of Goxhill. Buried Berlaimont Communal Cemetery Extension, France. Also commemorated on Scunthorpe War Memorial.



There is no reference to where this photograph was taken but it was, I believe, taken in front of St Nicholas' church, Haxey. Haxey is on the Isle of Axholme across the River Trent from East Stockwith where William was recorded living in the 1911 census.

William Short was the older brother of Market Gardener Charles Short jnr. He was the oldest child of Charles and Mary Ann Short who lived, I believe, at Summerfield Farm, College Road, Goxhill and then on Station Road in Thornton Curtis.

William was born whilst his parents were living in Scunthorpe. He was baptised in St John's Church, Scunthorpe on 29 October 1894. The baptismal register records that the Short home was on Ravendale Street which is close to Scunthorpe Railway Station. On 23rd April 1900 William's father, Charles Short, enrolled William into Goxhill School (the family had lived for a short time in Thornton Curtis after moving from Scunthorpe). William's date of birth is recorded incorrectly as 17 September 1895 in the Admissions Register (making his age four and a half years when he was actually almost five and a half years old). By the 1911 census William, aged 17, was working for farmer Frank Gordon Williams as a 2nd Waggoner on the Farm which was at East Stockwith which lies close to the east bank of the River Trent, to the north west of Gainsborough.

William enlisted in Grimsby (date not known) and is named on the Goxhill Roll of Honour serving with the 9th Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment. He transferred to the 1st Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment; his medal record card shows him being in the 1st Battalion and states that he was in receipt of the 1915 Star as well as the Victory and British War medals. William had

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

William had entered the French Theatre of War on 11 August 1915. I have used various online sources to track what may have been William's experiences of battle. The first fighting encounter recorded for the 1st Lincolns is for 4 July 1916 (The Battle of Albert (1-13 July) and then at Bazentan Ridge (14-17 July)) where they were dug in at Mametz, a village which had lain behind the German defensive position of the Somme battlefield. The fighting continued through 1916 which included the capture of Gueudecourt which lies roughly halfway between Albert and Cambrai. The First and Third Battles of the Scarpe at Arras followed in April and May 1917.

William Short married Rose Annie Broom, in Goxhill Church, on 18 August 1917. The marriage register records him being a Private in the 1st Battalion, Lincolnshire Regiment. His brother Charles, his sister Ivy Elizabeth Short (later Rhodes) and his uncle Alfred Dunn (husband of Annie, formerly Short) witnessed the ceremony. Rose was from the market town of Stafford. William would have undergone training on Cannock Chase which is near Stafford. I have presumed that this is where William and Rose met.

The 1st Lincolns were involved in further engagements from the second half of September 1917 through to the middle of November, resuming again in March 1918. The Battle of St Quentin (21-23 March 1918), was the first in the series of the Second Battles of the Somme during 1918. The Second Battle of Kemmel (25-26 April) followed.

A series of battles took place during the final 100 days of the war, in order to regain ground lost to the German forces. The allies moved east and reached Le Quesnoy on 27 October 1918. The website The Long, Long, Tail records that the 1st Lincolnshire Battalion were part of the 62nd Brigade and that the 62nd Brigade were part of the 21st Division in the organisation of the British army. The website states that 'When the Armistice came into effect at 11am on 11 November 1918 the

units of the (21st) Division were halted around Berlaimont'. A local newspaper the Lincolnshire Star, reported village news throughout November and December 1918. This included the devastating effect of the deaths caused by the influenza epidemic sweeping the country. It also reported on the return of prisoners of war of whom families had received no news for, in some cases, two years. It was reported that Private Spalding Jackson of Goxhill (known affectionately, I believe, as 'Spud') who lived in part of the house now named Rudsdale, North End, had been 'wounded in both legs and is now in hospital in France'. On 16 November 1918 under the heading 'Naval Funeral' the report stated that 'on Monday (11th November, Armistice Day) afternoon the remains of Mr Herbert Moore (who had died in Newhaven of Pneumonia on 9 November 1918) were interred in the churchyard'. A memorial service was held for Herbert Moore (Gander, Winter 2019) and Private John William Foulston (Gander, Autumn 2020) (who had died in France of Broncho Pneumonia on 26 October 1918) in Goxhill Church on the morning of Sunday 17th November and repeated in the Primitive Methodist Chapel on Chapel Street on Sunday 24th

For some the wait to hear about the whereabouts of loved ones went on. Mr and Mrs Charles Short of College Road, William Short's parents, had, according to a report in the Lincolnshire Star on Saturday 21 December 1918, 'lately received intelligence that their eldest son Lance Corporal W. Short was killed in action on Nov. 6th by a piece of burning shell striking him on the head and killing him instantaneously'. William's widow Rose appears to have continued to live in Stafford after her marriage.

Rose subsequently re-married, in Staffordshire on 2 August 1919. Her second husband had served in World War 1 and they went on to have six children. Two of their sons were killed in World War 2.

Lance Corporal William Short's death is recorded on 6 Nov 1918. He is buried in the Berlaimont Communal Cemetery Extension alongside three other soldiers of the 1st Battalion. Lincolnshire Regiment. Berlaimont lies to the north east of Amiens, France and close to the border with Belgium.

In this series of articles I have provided details of the family histories and the service of those men commemorated on the village World War 1 Memorial Plaques. I have also recounted the stories of some of the men who fought and returned. I will conclude the series with the lives and experiences of more village men who survived and who will be remembered by many Gander readers. **Elizabeth Fincham**



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

Local traffic plans

As we settle into 2024 Goxhill, yet again, seems to be a divided village over the long running saga of increasing HGV traffic. Whilst everyone agrees the infrastructure is not in place to cope with the increase and size of the lorries which already struggle on the roads that are not fit for purpose, there is no obvious solution to make everyone happy.

Prior to the building of the gas pipeline under the Humber a survey was carried out and the roads were identified as unsuitable then. This resulted in a temporary road being built. Because it was temporary it was not built to the standard of a permanent road and had to be removed once the pipeline work was complete.

With the new threat of a permanent increase in HGV traffic being proposed a meeting, which originally described as a consultation was renamed "a conversation", was held on the 25th January at the Memorial Hall. An excellent turn out in excess of 200 residents attended. In preparation for the meeting a small army of residents had distributed a form for signatures stating they were currently not in favour of the proposal of a one-way system for HGVs through the village. These forms were presented to North Lincs Council at the meeting. The meeting room was set out with maps of Goxhill and employees of North Lincs Council at the ready to answer to questions. Post-it notes were available and widely used by residents to write ideas, concerns and comments. For me, I couldn't make out where the roads were to follow any suggestions. Not only did maps not have the names of the roads on but the postits obliterated any chance of seeing possible landmarks. Ms Potts (Director of Communities for North Lincs Council) was present along with councillors from both parish and districts councils. Martin Vickers MP was also present to answer questions. A suggested resolution is expected in approximately six weeks (March) so watch the notice boards and social media. We should then have a consultation before anything is implemented. I hope even more people will attend the consultation so we can be sure of getting the best possible solution for the village.

Local Events

The usual annual events will be taking place this year. Best Kept Village usually smartens the village up but we could do much to improve the general look as a whole. I would ask that residents look outside their property and try to clear the grass and weeds growing on the perimeter. To run a shovel down and sweep up takes minutes but makes a huge difference. The sooner we, as a community, start considering the areas that need improvement the better.

Open Gardens is planned for three dates this year. Saturday 4th May ("May the forth be with you", for those Star Wars fans), Saturday 22nd and Sunday 23rd June. The allotments will be on show, but more volunteer gardens are needed as well as prizes for the raffle. Please see the separate article in this edition for all details (page 25).

At the time of writing, it has not been possible to secure the funds required to initiate a new Goxhill Horse Show for 2024. Those trying to get this event off the ground are still working hard, so hopefully it will be announced for 2025.

Sad farewells

The funeral of Mike Gathercole took place on 31st January at the crematorium in Hull. It was well attended by family and friends, many of whom got to know Mike through his commitment on the Parish council since 2001. A collection was made with the proceeds going to Jerry Greens Dog Rescue.

John Hankinson has sadly also passed away. He was a larger than life character and known locally as the "goat man", as he was quite an authority on them and he did much to help keep dying blood lines going. He took part in many activities, too numerous to mention so it was no surprise that Goxhill church was full and many went to his home after the service to show their respects with a buffet organised by friends and neighbours. A collection in aid of Kids for Kids took place. This charity provides kid goats for children in Darfur, Sudan, where there is much unrest and poverty. The charity, amongst other things provides the goats, which are then able to provide milk and the villagers can then breed them for more stock and eventually meat. They also provide donkeys, which are used to work and carry goods. The total donated was £460 which has been topped up to £500. I'm sure John would be proud.

Roads and wild animals

The last edition of the Gander had a beautiful photo of a roe deer (the ones with a white bottom). What would you do if a car hit a deer and it was left alive on the side of the road. This unfortunately recently happened to me one evening. I switched on my hazard lights and donned my Hi-Viz and went to investigate. The deer was hurt and frightened. I was joined by a young lady, who had also witnessed the event. She contacted the police, but they didn't want to know. She then tried a wildlife rescue centre and was directed back to the police. By this time, I had removed my coat and covered it's head and as much of it's body as I could. I was dressed to go out for the evening and without my coat, in only a thin sleeveless top I was shivering. After about an hour the police arrived and informed me they were waiting for a firearms officer to shoot the deer. There are more and more deer around as they have no natural predators. It stands to reason as we encroach more and more on the countryside the more contact we will have with wild animals. I know farmers do not like deer as they are destructive but what ever anyone thinks about their place in the world, I hope never to be in that position again. Although, I am glad I was able to do a little something to help ease her suffering. If ignored and left all alone it would have been a long and painful death. At one point I considered trying to take her home and put her in a stable as I am aware it is stress that is the main killer. I was told that it was not allowed and I know I would not have been able to lift her on my own. I also know that they kick out when they panic and could go berserk in the car. They would need restricting.

If in the same situation again I know now to call Wild Things Rescue on 01526 578579 or the RSPCA 0300 **1234999**. This is also a situation where the app 'what3words' would be useful to pinpoint your location.
