

I've been thinking quite a bit about babies recently. Spring is in the air and that always makes me think of new life, one of my friends and his wife had a daughter in February, and Troy, who many of you will know has lived with us for 13 years, becomes a father himself in early June - indeed his son may already have been born by the time you are reading this.

Though Troy isn't my brother, I consider the baby to be as close to being my nephew as possible without being my blood, and that goes for my whole family. Because he came to us aged seven, my parents were building on foundations that were already in place, and as the Jesuits' famous saying tells us, much about him was already set before his arrival in Goxhill, but they should feel proud of what they have done, as he should of himself, as he moves into the next stage of his life.

I have also been thinking quite a bit about babies recently because it is usually the metaphor I call on to describe the Gander. At job interviews or in career-related conversations I produce copies to show not just what I can do but where I come from and what contributed to making me who I am. Though I say the newsletter is "my baby", perhaps it is actually more like Troy is to my mum and dad - in my foster care. Other people are responsible for the existence and appearance of the Gander, have laid down the template, set the example which I build on. And like him, it has to stand on its own two feet, pay its own way - and has now produced a baby of its own.

The Gander team did not sit down and decide to launch the website just for ourselves. The suggestion came out of our AGM over a year ago, and coincidentally launched about nine months after we had decided to go ahead with it. Though I hope many of you have taken a look and were pleased with what you saw, it is still a work in progress. When the website cries, we are still learning if it needs changing or more food; and the technical language of its construction is to me like the goo-goo ga-ga-s many say to newborns. After a few teething problems (yes, I know I have moved on several months, but it is only a metaphor) it is up and running - links are established, I can upload news and features, and receive feedback messages from visitors.

Now I'd like to hear some of that feedback, as well as receiving stories, photos and ideas. Like any new parent, the newsletter itself cannot be responsible for everything the website does. We need you, so speak to us and we can make it grow into a part of the village everyone can feel proud of. From now on when you see Troy, he will look slightly different - as a father he will be - even though much will stay the same. For that reason we have changed the outer appearance of the Gander too. The new cover is a sign we have moved forward, even if essentially the same. We have added significant long-term responsibility - but we cannot, will not, do it alone.

Indeed we are proud to be able to share with you a selection of the many activities and events that make our local primary school a very busy and exciting place.

Highlights from the end of the Spring term

Some of the activities that were crammed into the final part of the Spring Term included:

Decorated Easter Egg Competition

Pupils from all classes entered this competition by decorating a hard-boiled egg and placing it within a scene. The judges had a very difficult time deciding upon winners, but eventually a first place and runner up were awarded. A range of prizes were given out in recognition of the tremendous thought and hard work that had gone into each and every one of the cleverly designed settings.



Pupils will reflect on their life at primary school and provide their parents with a poignant and entertaining evening.

Further Enrichment / Other Activities

Within school there is a strong, positive, community ethos. To encourage our pupils to be active participants in society, we like to hold community focused events and activities. External speakers and theatre groups also bring the wider world into the classroom hence adding extra relevance to the learning experiences on offer.

Music- As part of their music education, pupils in a variety of year groups will take part in the much acclaimed 'Wider Opportunities in Music' scheme.

Cookery- Pupils from a number of year groups will experience cookery from a historical perspective. This involves a visiting cook helping pupils to prepare dishes from across the ages.

Summer fayre- On Saturday 12th July, we will hold our annual Summer Fayre. As usual, there will be lots of games and attractions, providing a fun day out for all the family.

Goxhill Station- Our adoption of Goxhill railway station in partnership with Northern Rail has continued to stimulate positive interest. Pupils make weekly visits in small groups to take care of the station, keep it free from rubbish and report any damage.

Open Afternoon- On July 24th we will hold our termly afternoon for pre-school pupils. Parents of registered 'Goxhill pupils of the future' will receive a personal invitation to this important event.

Garden Area- As part of a drive to raise awareness of healthy eating and a variety of environmental issues, our school wildlife and gardening area has developed into a well-established and very valuable resource. As well as having an allotment to tend, the children also maintain a pond.

French- Pupils in Years 3 to 6 take part in French lessons every week taught by Mr Pitois, a native speaker. From 2010 it will be compulsory for all primary schools to teach a modern foreign language in Years 3 to 6.

English- after successful work in the Spring term, the whole school is looking forward to a return visit from performance poet Dave Webb who will be leading assemblies and poetry workshops.

Other issues of interest

Extended school provision

Goxhill School is an 'extended school' that provides Childcare from 7.50am – 6.00pm daily.

Children can take part in a range of play, craft and sporting activities at the Goxhill Out of School Club. The club is affiliated to the school and opens daily from 7.50am to 8.55am and from 3.30pm to 6.00pm. During the school holidays it runs from 8am to 6pm. Simply ring the school to reserve a place.

We also host a range of extra curricular activities such as boxing, netball, football, athletics, choir, music tuition, Dance, Brownies, Rainbows, Cycle Training, and pedestrian training.

Become a Home-Start Volunteer

Home-Start North Lincs. offers support, friendship and practical help to parents with children under 5 via its unique home-visiting service. We help with illness, disability, bereavement, relationship breakdown and loneliness; and increasingly support teenage mothers, single fathers, and those affected by poverty, abuse, violence, drugs and social isolation. Every family is special and we respond to the needs of each differently through a combination of home-visiting and social events.

Home-Start needs volunteers who understand the needs of the rural community. They would be prepared for home-visiting by an accredited training course at the Barton office usually one morning a week for 10 weeks, though volunteers are welcome with or without this accreditation. There are no minimum expectations regarding time to be given. Because of the rural aspect of many clients' lives, it would help if volunteers were able to provide their own transport. On-going training is available and travelling expenses will be paid. Benefits would not be affected. Volunteers come from all walks of life and both sexes. All have one thing in common - the desire to help others. Friendliness and a caring attitude are the only essentials, as well as an understanding of parenting.

Letters from the Churches

Four years ago in May our daughter and son-in-law flew to America. Their flight booking was the millionth received and, to acknowledge this, US Airways presented them with tickets upgraded to first class travel.

We may be wistfully thinking ‘dream on’ when it comes to ourselves being one in a million, but I have good news because that is how God views each of us. We are precious to Him and He loves you and me as if we were the only one. That makes us one in millions!

Tora and David did not go on holiday they emigrated with Ellie the dog; all three set off to start a new life. Many of us will not travel so far in our quest for new opportunities and challenges, or to leave behind the old and have a fresh start, however we can all experience a new life this very moment without physically moving an inch.

What life in the States would bring was of course unknown, but what life in the Lord Jesus Christ brings is peace, the knowledge of going to heaven when we die, a love that accepts us as we are and a power to weather the storms we all experience. Our ticket to all this is found in the Gospel of John Chapter 3 verse 16, ‘For God loved the world so much that He gave His only Son, so that *(insert your name)* who believes in Him may not die but have eternal life’. Who ‘G.W.’ was is now lost in history, but G.W. himself has certainly left his mark. In the year 1785 he (I’m assuming it was a man) carved his initials into the stonework of the porch at All Saints Church, Goxhill. I note this historical act of petty vandalism virtually every time I unlock the church. It is also difficult to imagine that the interior of All Saints, now so light and dignified, was itself once the target of ‘official’ vandalism.

Centuries ago, few ordinary people could read and write, and the Bible itself was only available in a Latin translation. Pictures, therefore, played a big part in people acquiring an understanding of Christianity and the walls of most of our churches were ablaze with images from the Bible and pictures of Saints. When the great wave of religious reformation came in the 16th century, all this was declared superstitious nonsense and bands of enthusiastic puritans white-washed or scrubbed out an irreplaceable part of our religious and cultural heritage. Some pictures escaped obliteration and in All Saints some artwork in a porch was overlooked and traces of a unique painting remain to this day.

Some people might bemoan the fact that the Christian foundation of our nation has also been eroded over the centuries and only small traces remain. I’m not sure this is the case. What may well be happening is that the traditional way in which we have worshipped and met has changed and the old ways are not reaching the contemporary generation in the way they did. The simple result is not that people stop believing – they stop attending.

Nationally the church is investing much thought and energy into developing and experimenting with alternative services and new ways that people can meet to explore and express the spiritual dimension of life, without which we are all diminished. If you feel that there is something missing in your life and you haven’t been to church recently (or even if you haven’t been to church at all), why not come along on Sunday morning and give it a try.

OFF THE HOOF



"He's no failure. He's not dead yet"
Gwilym Lloyd George. 1894 – 1967

I have just finished watching the Badminton Horse Trials at which Great Britain attained 2nd and 3rd place. It certainly looked hard work and one has to be dedicated to put that much hard work and commitment in. Those fences do not fall down on the cross country.

In the last edition of "Off the Hoof" I reported that Joanne Burns had qualified two horses for the Blue Chip Winter Championships. Joanne, on Mr. and Mrs. Wilson's, *Swallow* won the class and came 4th in another event so is doing extremely well. Congratulations. Joanne is now working for the Summer Qualifiers and has seven horses to compete towards them - so more hard work.

Andrew Sater has returned to the village after working in Germany and is busy both competing as well as producing horses for both competing and selling on.

The BSJA have recognised there is a big gap in classes. To allow youngsters and young horses coming through they have introduced a new Qualifier for the Horse of the Year Show which is a 1.2 metre height. (4 feet). This gives a better chance for the one horse rider to progress and opportunities for all.

One up and coming rider is Chloe Foulston with *Billy Whizz* who seems to be going from strength to strength. They now go to the Pony Club which offers so much to encourage young riders of all disciplines. At their second rally Chloe was off the lead rein and on Sunday 4th May they went to their first show of the season at Messingham where they came 3rd in the Nursery Stakes. We will

certainly keep watching them.

We all know Foot and Mouth, Bird Flu and Blue Tongue are notifiable diseases to Defra. They have an alert service which advises subscribers of any outbreaks. Did you know that Strangles is still a notifiable disease? Well it is and when I phoned Defra they said it was not on the list as no one ever reports it! How scary is that. We had an outbreak in the village a few years ago, so if you hear of it again or get it in your yard please report it and maybe it can go on the Alert system.

In a previous issue of "Off the Hoof" the question of a special licence for towing caravans and trailers was highlighted. The latest is a "Certificate of Competence." This applies to all persons transporting horses for reward or as part of a business or vehicles sporting a logo. I am a bit sketchy on it but for further information the Defra Website: www.defra.gov.uk or for information regarding training for the certificate www.haddontraining.co.uk/transport.



At the time of writing the weather has just started to improve but with typical Goxhill soil which has horses on; it is wet in some parts, rock hard or poached in others which makes it difficult to get on. The fertilizer is now due to go on, and at £300 a ton, it does not bode well for future expenditure on hay and grain foods.

As always, this time of year brings with it Laminitis, particularly for ponies. Sweet Itch from the bites of midges and allergies from the rape fields. With Laminetic ponies reduce the intake of grass, which does not mean starving them. Perhaps a muzzle should be considered.

Sweet Itch – keep a good fly repellent handy or turn out in a fly sheet. Keep them away from muck heaps or ponds where insect activity is at its worst and remember to remove droppings off the fields. If possible, bring in the stable and put a fly curtain up at the door.

Allergies – seek advice from the vet but it could help to ride early morning and watch the pollen count on the weather report.

Remember, this is the time we must all be vigilant in pulling out Ragwort in a bid to stop it spreading. A bright yellow daisy like flower with crinkly leaves. To be dug out and burnt.

Now for the tips of the issue. What I am finding most useful are cable ties. Apart from keeping cables together I am using them to suspend bird feeders and fat balls. Using them as a tie up point in both the stable and in the trailer. They can be extended by joining them together as a temporary repair to fencing. I have even been known to lace the back of a rubber/plastic curry comb with one to extend its life. Wherever you are tempted to use string a cable tie is neater.

I had some sharp edges in the stable, so I used a water pipe protector which I just opened up and snapped on. This can also be used as a stable guard. A length of rope or chain with a clip either end. Cover with pipe protector and put across the stable door, handy if you wish to leave the door open.

I still do not have a date for Barton Show but East Halton Show is Sunday 10th August and Goxhill Show Sunday 27th July.





It is one thing to write an article for circulation in the village magazine but to discover that your efforts are on view to the whole world takes a little getting used to. Something that began in a very amateurish fashion with type writers and a duplicator has gradually become a very technical and accomplished publication. Now it is part of the World Wide Web. It would be unbelievable for me to suggest that I do not derive pleasure from the publication of my writing and so, in appreciation but with great apprehension, thank you very much to the Gander team.

I was very surprised to see the presentation and the way that it all worked. There are plenty of people to tell you that viewing things on the screen is not as good as seeing them for real. Sitting here in comfort and looking at the report of the council meeting is a lot better than standing in front of the notice board on a cold day with rain in the air. You can be a little too real. With an advertisement list from Accountancy to Window Cleaning included on line the whole world can find the best of services and supplies here in Goxhill.

The front cover of the Gander often has very good black and white pictures of a part of the village but these cannot do justice to the colour photographs from which they are taken. The small illustrations that have been included on the web site are very good and I hope that we shall have more pictures from the village photographers.

There was a blank page which I found when I tried to look at Village Tales. I cannot believe that there are no tales but think that the people with the best ones may not be confident that they can write them down. If you have something that you would like to send to the Gander if you tell me about it I will

write it for you and you can have your piece with your name in the Gander.

We have looked at a very modern development but there have been many changes during my lifetime and the pace of change seems to increase with every passing year. Many people are unhappy about this but I feel that I have been most fortunate to live in a time when so much has happened to improve the way in which we live. Although I was not here to see it, during my lifetime many roads in the village were first treated with tar and stones. Piped water, sewers, electricity and telephones are all "recent" arrivals here.

If we go back much further the comparative wealth of the people living in the village has changed completely. There was very little other than sleep and work in most people's lives. Commuting to work involved walking from the village to the fields and back again. When you arrived home there was work to be done to grow food in the Home Close. Wives had a full day of work but at certain times and seasons they had a change from cooking washing cleaning. At Hay time and Harvest they went out into the fields with their husbands.

There is another piece of information there. Ezabell was working at the Hay in August, now late July is the time of the Barley Harvest and Hay time or Silage

time is over. Times have certainly changed.

There has also been a change in the harvest field. When I first helped on the farm wheat grew waist high. The straw when cut by scythe reaper or binder could be used for thatching, providing that it was not broken by thrashing. Now there is so little straw that only specially grown wheat straw is long enough for thatching houses and because of the bad weather last year the thatchers have no material to work with.

I have made a list of the names of the people who worked for Thomas and Joseph Hardy and of their annual wages. The names change regularly. The rate of pay for each person usually increased year by year but then there was a newcomer to take the place and start again at a lower rate. I have a bit of a problem in deciding where Goxhill servants lived. In Barrow and in Barton there are many houses with three floors where servants could live in the garret rooms but in Goxhill there are only about two of these. Has anyone a suggestion? It is always interesting to look at the old deeds and Copyhold documents of Goxhill houses; they often tell us where people lived. From these it seems that many people built small houses called Tenements close to their houses where their workers lived. It is always a pleasure to read old deeds and to make a Modern English translation of their content.

Change does not necessarily take a long time. I notice that nowadays as I move about the village I seem to look at puddles in the road, where the drain gullies are, and matters of that nature. I hope that like me North Lincs council will soon Have a Gander¹ at the puddles and drains in the streets of Goxhill.

GNeWs from Goxhill Neighbourhood Watch

It has been a while since I wrote anything for the Gander with news about Goxhill's Neighbourhood Watch. Largely that has been because, after about 10 years, it was beginning to feel a bit repetitive and forced. However, there have been some developments of late that I would like to tell you about, so here I am once again.

During March and April about 300 houses in the village were posted with flyers about SmartWater - a new development in property marking.

- SmartWater is a liquid that you dab on to your property. It is virtually invisible except under strong ultra-violet light - when it glows.
- It has been described as DNA code in a bottle of nail varnish - though I expect its inventors might feel a little insulted by that.
- A bottle is uniquely registered to you and all you do is paint it on to your property. If you move house you just notify SmartWater of your new address and they update their database.
- The bottles are normally quite expensive to buy (we were told £40 at the presentation I attended), with an annual administration fee.
- Safer Neighbourhoods North Lincolnshire obtained a grant so that it could be supplied free (with no ongoing fees) in our county - but only whilst stocks last.

Sorry that we were not able to cover more houses but it is not just a matter of posting flyers. Each bottle needs to be registered and signed for, plus any questions about its use answered. Even at just 5 minutes each, plus abortive visits when recipients are out, it can take quite a while. Many thanks to Roz Abbott, Martin D'Alessandro, Dave & Penny Carnell, Denise Holtby, Don Noble, and Stan Robertson for all their help with that. At the time of writing about 90 households have taken up the

offer and the first batch of 50 bottles issued. Once all the outstanding registration forms from those are back I should receive the second batch for the remaining 40.

If you would like SmartWater but were not amongst those 300 homes canvassed - or even if you were but failed to take up the offer originally - then please get in touch. If there are still some bottles available then I will do my best to obtain one for you.

This all takes us a big step forward from where we were a few years ago: marking up items with our postcode and house name/number using a marker pen or engraver. Nevertheless, if you want to visibly and permanently mark bikes, mowers, tools, et cetera then you can still borrow GNeW's engraver for a week or so at a time.

Talking of steps forward, another one has been the creation of a GNeW website at: <http://beehive.thisiscunthorpe.co.uk/GNeW-Goxhill>

My main aim has been to provide help, advice and useful information, so do not expect anything very flash. Why not give it a visit and let me know if you find it helpful - and especially if there is anything else that you would like to see on it? For those of you who do not use the internet and would prefer to stick with the printed word, I have put much of the same information into a GNeWletter. It is printed on bright orange paper and copies have been left at Goxhill Library; I will call in every now and then to top them up if they run out. If anyone has a problem reading it because of the fonts used or the orange paper then just let me know what the problem is and I will print it out differently for you.

Global Warming And the Wildlife

We are constantly hearing of this global warming every day and every time a so-called rarity in the wild bird world appears it is due to this Global Warming, well one has only to read in the natural history books of 200 years or so ago on the British Resident and Migratory Birds due to the fact they were food for the nation on a commercial basis, anything in those days which had flesh on its bones was good for the table, and when reduced in numbers by this trade they became a rarity and were then pursued by collectors for both bird and eggs until they were driven out of the country or made extinct within it, I now quote from the book, Lincolnshire and the Fens, chapter "The Wealth of Wild Life."

"Those who like Eels and look in vain for them in fishmonger's Shops, will regret the passing of the days when rents paid in the Manor of Ely (the name means "eel-district") included 3,036 sticks of eels, and a further 14,500 eels in Lent, The Monks of Ramsey, before the Conquest, were receiving each year 60,000 eels from one fenland manor, and the other rivers of Lincolnshire and of the Isle of Axholme were no less fruitful.

The meres and dikes were also the home of water-birds in numbers that the twentieth century can scarcely conceive, In the Middle Ages they must of formed part of the diet of common folk, as well as finding their way by purchase and gift, or as customary, to the tables of the rich, In the sixteenth century the household of the Earl of Northumberland in East Yorkshire consumed not only wild fowl such as Mallard, Teal and Widgeon, but also Seagulls and Terns, and a great variety of birds of the seashore and marsh, Plovers, Curlews, Bustards, Cranes, Reeves, Bitterns, Knots, Dotterels, Stints, Seapyes (Oyster-catchers) Redshanks and Shollards (Spoonbills) birds that some of us have never seen and none have eaten, some of the supplies consumed at Wressle and Leconfield may of come from the Isle of Axholme and the Humber side.

In Elizabeth's reign, the corporation of Lincoln presented the Lord Treasurer with one dozen Godwits, five dozen Knots and a dozen Pewits. In the past two centuries so much destruction of wildlife has gone on in Europe and North America, and to a lesser extent in the other continents, that it has reduced some species to extinction, and others to a rarity that makes observing and photographing them an esoteric sport. In no part of the world has man reduced wildlife more drastically than in the Fens. The Ruff was already so rare in the 17th century that it was taken young and fattened in captivity. It fetched a high price, commercial

exploitation reached a peak in the 17th and 18th centuries, nearly all the 40 or so Decoys which once existed in this area date from that time. The best known is that at Borough Fen near Peterborough which was made in about 1670, but the greatest number was in the Friskney neighbourhood between Skegness and Boston.

The ten decoys there in the eighteenth century, before the enclosure and draining of the East Fen, are said to have sent as many as 31,000 Mallard, Widgeon and Teal to the London Market. There was a famous family of decoy-men at Friskney named Skelton. George, born about 1760, built decoys in Norfolk, Thomas his grandson died in 1918 at the age of 85. All that remains of the decoys there now are the clump of trees which surround the sites, an unexpected break in the expanse of ploughed land.

The management of a decoy, with its six or so pipes down, which the wild birds were led by decoy-ducks and driven by terriers, required a subtle skill, unlike the stupid practice of driving meres with boats in the moulting season, or in the nesting season before young birds could fly, The drainage of the Meres put a stop to the source of the supply, as it did to many other occupations."

As well as these decoys for ducks, there must have been a large number of men who made a living netting the Waders such as the above mentioned, Plovers, Godwits and Knots to supply them in the quantity required by the markets. For the Plovers this went on until around 1950 in Lincolnshire, and of course the shotgun came into its own rights about 200 years ago which helped to increase the supply, but not the quality of the netted birds due to wounds and flesh damage incurred. Also the noise of the gun gave alarm to the birds which weren't killed, making them wary in the future, unlike the nets which were silent and could make a larger number captured with one pull than one shot could kill from a gun. Also, I doubt there was any closed season for protection of breeding stock, and their eggs were collected on a commercial scale for markets and household use by country folk. The birds are now returning to the areas and habitats of their ancestors which were persecuted and became a rarity or extinct in this country almost 2 centuries ago because they are now protected and not because as some persons would like us to believe Global Warming.

As for the birds returning to Goxhill, the Marsh Harrier has nested successfully for the last 6 years, within the Parish, it had not been known to nest at Goxhill in



living memory, and on the 29th of May last year 07 I counted 26 Avocets on the Out-marsh, one incubating eggs, though 2 days later they had vanished with the eggs becoming a first class breakfast for the Carrion Crows, their arrival was said to be due to the colony which was washed out at Reads Island when the Tide broke through the bank, they first nested at the Island about 5 years ago, their short stay at Goxhill was maybe prompted by the Public Footpath which runs on the Humber Bank top, only yards from their habitat and nest, In mid July I saw 5 Little Egrets on the Goxhill side of Skitter Haven feeding in the pool of water there, a few weeks later one lived on the Out-marsh for a week where the Avocets had been seen, for the last five years or so we have had around a thousand Black-tailed Godwits spending the winter with us on the foreshore and marshes, whereas before it was a rare sight to see any other than the odd one, along with increased flocks of both Green and Golden Plovers, which at times must total approximately 3,000 each, again all due to the protection they are now given, and the Green Plover is now attempting to nest here as they did 50 years or so ago, while the flocks of wintering Curlew have increased in numbers..

We now have another invader, or aliens which hasn't been seen in the UK until recent years, that is infesting the countryside, whether one travels to Lands End or John of Grotts, they can be seen all along the wayside, a parasite or fungus taking root on the hedge-rows and trees, Witches Knickers, we have always had the Witches Brooms, (an abnormal bunch of twigs growing on trees, mostly on the Silver Birch and Lime that looks like a Magpies Nest)) and I have a Witch Stone from days beyond recall that was hung over the stable doors to keep evil spirits away by the Superstitious ones, these Witches Knickers grow in every colour and shape, fluttering in the breeze, The Plastic Bags and Packaging which escape from captivity, and colonise themselves, multiplying faster than the local Rabbits, while the Super Markets get the blame for introducing them, it is not they who lets the Witches Knickers escape into the environment.

Save the Honey Bee

I was reminded to write this article by the Mayor of London. Not personally but, when I switched on the radio to hear whether Boris or Ken had won the election, I caught the end of Farming Today and heard a Defra spokesman talking about honey bees. It reminded me that I had promised Adam an article on that very subject.

Honey bees are under threat as never before from viruses and diseases. In the UK much beekeeping is by individuals on a hobby rather than commercial basis – so if such diseases are to be effectively combated it will need to be led and funded by government. Bees do more than produce honey; they play a vital role in pollinating food crops, making an estimated contribution of £165M annually to the agricultural economy. Bees also have an important environmental role: by pollinating wild plants, they help provide seeds and fruits on which our wild birds and animals depend. So a decline in honey bees arguably threatens what we eat, the colour in the meadows around us and the range wildlife we encounter.

Strictly speaking Defra's spokesman was not talking about bees as much as arguing that it was duly concerned about the disease threats to UK bees. As the Gander aims to keep political debate out of its pages I will say no more than that. The British Beekeepers Association was also on the radio as part of their campaign to instigate a programme of increased research costing £8M over five years (during which time our honey bees will contribute over £800 million to agriculture). It seems a large sum but I understand it is less than 15% of Defra's contingency fund.

Thanks to everyone who has signed the petition on this subject, and to Colin & Christine Creasy for hosting it in their shop. I have written to tell Shona McIsaac MP of my concerns and if you wish to do likewise then there is a sample letter on the Gander and Goxhill Trader websites.

On a related topic, if you are concerned about a swarm of bees that has settled near you then ring John for assistance: either John Guggiari on 530363 or John Hankinson on 531029. As members of the British Beekeepers' Association we only charge to cover our expenses (primarily mileage) but otherwise we offer our services free. We are covered by the BBKA Public Liability Insurance policy.

It helps us to know the following information when you contact us:

- That the creatures are indeed honey bees. We cannot collect wasps or hornets and most other bees are relatively solitary and harmless – but we would still need to charge mileage if we attended.
- The position of the swarm or cluster of bees - e.g. whether on the ground, the height if in a tree or bush, how accessible it is.
- When the swarm arrived.
- The size of the cluster – e.g. tennis ball, football, (spacehopper!).
- Address/location of the swarm and telephone number of the owner/occupier.
