

LETTER FROM THE VICARAGE

In the year 1785 GW carved his (I'm assuming it was a man, women usually have better things to do!) initials into the stonework of the porch at All Saints Church. In the year 2010 visitors to the church will have noticed the results of sustained and regular attacks on the church's notice board.

The basic message of the church is not however, 'when the next service is' or 'what's on in the Parish' but the Gospel. The message of what God has done in this world through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ is a message that has changed millions of lives, has initiated countless social reforms and has provided the spiritual 'glue' for our nation for over a thousand years.

This is a message that some have found difficult or have rejected. We are a free country and rejoice in recognising a multiplicity of faith and belief systems but some are now concerned that the Christian foundation of our nation has also been eroded over the centuries and only small traces remain. Some local authorities have started calling their town centre Christmas lights "winter lights" and you get the occasional reported refusal to advertise a carol service in case it offends those of other faiths!

I think it's all too easy to become over defensive about this because the message of the Gospel is simply too big to be suppressed by attacks on the public image of the church (or even on its notice boards!) It's a message that is either vitally important or is of no value at all. At Easter a small group of defeatist, rather self absorbed followers of a supposedly executed Messiah turned into powerful advocates for the transforming, saving power of God. Their fear of death was overcome by the evidence that Jesus had defeated it, offering a share in his eternal life to those who are open to his redeeming power. This Gospel message cannot be moderately important – it's an 'all or nothing' event, a permanent challenge to people down through history!

SCHOOL REPORT

Out of every challenging experience there comes a positive. When I look back over the year to this time last year we have achieved such a lot and I don't feel so much like the 'new' person anymore but someone who is enjoying very much the challenges each term brings. Over the weekend when I was looking through the newspaper one of the headlines stated that one good thing to come out of the harsh winter was the fact that this year is one of the best for the blossoms on the trees. I think we can rightfully agree with that as we drive along Thornton Road into Ferry Road. Goxhill most definitely looks stunning.

We have had a number of events during the course of the spring term ranging from really interesting trips out, visitors in and a number of enrichment activities all linked to the curriculum for all the year groups. The children enjoyed the Valentine's disco and the Easter bingo for children and parents before the term ended, was also an enjoyable experience. One of our many highlights was the success from our involvement at the Brigg Festival. We had successes with our children playing the violin, those reciting poetry and our choir. We are all so proud!

Our children have also enjoyed the experience of



learning to play the steel drums and participating in the puppet making and puppet shows, a competition which saw a record number of children decorating Easter hats and eggs. All of this was topped off by another spectacular performance from Year 5 presenting 'Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs'.

We were supported by the Children's centre at Barton in being able to offer Sensory Sessions for babies and toddlers. This was a massive success and we hope to continue with these when the new integrated services building opens in the autumn term – more about that later! Proving equally successful this term are the 'Our time' sessions for

the younger members of the community. They have been running over the first half of this term.

Our new school garden which is located towards the back of the football field is really taking shape and thanks to the excellent direction from Mrs Kell



and the support of parents, grandparents, other staff members and the children we are now at the stage of planting.

Currently, we are waiting to find out if we have been successful in achieving an Arts Mark accreditation. This is awarded to schools who emphasize the importance of the Arts in the curriculum. This includes everything from creative arts (dance, drama, music) to practical art so fingers crossed that we get this positive recognition soon.

Our school has also been successful in securing our Healthy School's status for another 3 years and this has been down to the hard work and coordination of Mrs Brown who amazingly can juggle so many tasks at one time. SHELTER BOXES - UPDATE

The total of Rotary ShelterBoxes sent from Barton and the surrounding villages following the appeal for the victims of the Haiti earthquake, is fourteen. The original target was three but with massive help from the general public and local Junior Schools (including Goxhill) the quantity of the £490 boxes quickly increased.

Four young people from Goxhill and Thornton, did a sponsored walk from Goxhill to Barton, followed by bag-packing at Tesco, raising an amazing £1,250 for ShelterBox. They were Emma Branford, Georgia Robertson, Caitlin Anderson and Matthew Finch.

There are now around 13,000 ShelterBox ten-person tents in Haiti. The boxes also include sleeping bags, mosquito nets, a cooker and pans, water treatment equipment and even a bag of children's colouring books and crayons, etc.

Humber Bridge Half Marathon. On June 27th over 2,000 runners will take part in the Rotary Humber Bridge Half Marathon, expected to raise over £70,000 for charity. The main charities are "When You Wish Upon a Star", Dove House Hospice and "Cash for Kids". The runners will arrive on Ferriby Road

in Barton at about 10.45 and travel through the town, along Holydyke and Barrow Road, down Falkland Way, Butts Road, Far Ings Road, Gravel Pit Road and back over the bridge. This event is well worth watching on any part of the route, although the runners are more bunched together in the earlier stages. Please check on any road closures or diversions before driving through Barton during the morning and early afternoon. The event is organised by the Rotary Clubs of Hull and Barton.



NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH



In the past GNeW has bought various items of security equipment to lend out to residents when they go on holiday. These were mainly timer switches, light & sound sensitive lighting fitments to make it less obvious that a house was unoccupied. For whatever reason people have stopped borrowing - so we are offering them to anyone who would like them. There would be no charge, though a small donation to GNeW funds would be appreciated. As the warmer weather has arrived (or at least it was creating that illusion when this was written) please be careful about leaving doors and windows open. Every year our local police report a spate of sneak in thefts where a burglar just walks in and takes anything readily to hand. Sometimes they may hunt in pairs: one attracts your attention at the front door while their accomplice goes in at the back door. Goxhill has been lucky in recent years but once a village is targeted there tend to be numerous thefts in rapid succession before the culprits move on.

If you are unlucky enough to suffer a theft or to otherwise need to contact the police then here is a reminder of the options available to you:

☎ **999** only if you need to report an emergency e.g.: life at risk, crime in progress, public disorder, violence used or threatened, serious danger or fear.

☎ **0845 6060 222** to report or pass on information about a crime or incident that has happened – it could fit in with other people's reports.

💻 **Email** for non-emergencies – contact your local Police Community Support Officer via email the police website at **www.humberside.police.uk**.

☎ **0800 555 111** to speak to someone at CRIMESTOPPERS if you have information about a crime but are unwilling to identify yourself.

LIVES

Could an ambulance find you easily?

When somebody calls 999 for an ambulance there is obviously a time issue. It is vital that the ambulance reaches the patient as soon as possible. How easy would it be for them to find your home?

Next time that you are driving home, especially if it is at night and/or raining, ask yourself how easy it would be for an ambulance to find you. Perhaps it would be worth repainting that house name sign or even fitting another one in a more visible position?

If you do ever have to call an emergency ambulance then it can be a good idea to do whatever you can to help your house stand out. Even something as simple as switching on all the front room lights could help the ambulance to spot you at night.

Time is especially important in cases like cardiac arrest, where every minute can be the difference between life and death. Volunteers from LIVES, being more familiar with local addresses, can often be there quickly to offer emergency care until the ambulance arrives. Frequently we are told that the visibility of the LIVES sign on our vehicle was helpful for an ambulance driver trying to locate a house.

LIVES stands for the Lincolnshire Integrated Voluntary Emergency Service, a registered charity number 1098364. LIVES consists of trained volunteers with a car and able to spare a few hours a week to be on call to attend local emergency calls. Often the ambulance arrives soon after, or even before, us – but in those exceptions we are on hand with equipment that can help.

Locally LIVES covers Goxhill, Barrow and New Holland with several volunteers from each village regularly on call. We urgently need more volunteers to enable us to provide as much cover as possible at all times. No previous medical experience is necessary: you receive full initial training, regular refreshers and support from fellow volunteers. All equipment, except your car, is provided and you only commit to being on call when you can fit it in. Even when on-call you can continue to do many of the things you already do and just break off if you respond to an emergency.

Goxhill the place where it all began

In an idle moment as I sat before my computer I entered Goxhill Lincolnshire into Google Search. I was confronted as the second item on the list with “The Descendants of Thomas Hardy and Susannah Wares”. I decided to take a look at this site and I encounter more people with the family name Hardy than have ever had that name in Goxhill. (And the family are recorded here from 1604 and perhaps before that.) All of the people on this list are or were residents in Canada.

These people trace their origin and family name to Thomas Hardy and the village of Goxhill. Not however to Thomas the Gentleman Farmer but to Thomas Hardy Labourer.

Thomas the gentleman farmer was a very important man in the village he was a farmer of 175 Acres of arable and meadow land. As a leading member of the vestry committee he carried out many duties including that of Dyke Reeve when he superintended the rebuilding of part of the Humber Bank.

Thomas the labourer was not part of village society and we should probably know nothing of him were it not for some fortunate information in the Award of the Enclosure. Thomas lived on a small plot of land (big by today's standards) and had a house but he did not have title to it other than by occupation. There were several people in this situation and the Act of Inclosure gave them the award of their home and the surrounding plot of land so Thomas the labourer is to be found in the list of the small awards. By a further fortunate coincidence we know exactly where he lived because he lived at the end of an existing piece of the town street where a new public road began.

One Public Highway to extend from the town of Goxhill afs^d at the South East corner of the Ancient Inclosure of Thomas Hardy Labourer Southward along the Town Side of Goxhill afs^d to the South West corner of an Ancient Homestead there belonging to Charles Marshal and from thence in a South Direction over the said Mill Field and Hallands Field to the Lordship of Thornton afs^d and herein called the Thornton Road.

The names of the roads have changed a little since they were laid out in the award. Ferry road ran from the North End of the village to the Haven and Thornton road ran from the Thornton boundary right up to where the houses are, opposite Nan Brigham on the West side of the present Ferry road. The junction between the

existing village street and the new road is still visible because the new road was sixty feet wide which was wider than the old street and the change in the hedge line can still be seen.

There is an interesting little anomaly in the hand written village copy of the award. Whilst the parchment roll in the Lincoln Archive reads quite clearly Thomas Hardy, the village copy says Paul Hardy. Paul does not seem to be a name used by the Hardy family. Did the scrivener who wrote the village book feel that the terms Gentleman and Labourer did not sufficiently differentiate between the two Thomas's?

Mary Susannah Wares was born in Barrow and married Thomas, they lived in their house in Goxhill and several children were born there, Mary 1766, Thomas 1768, Esther 1769, Anne 1773, Catherine 1775, and John 1777. They then left Goxhill and went to live in Barrow where George the last child was born in 1779. The family then moved to Hessle. (The Canadian researcher has given the birth place of George as Barrow and Hessle, what a ferry crossing that must have been.) George was married to Mary Saunders who was born in Hessle. In 1817 they went to Canada in the ship Valiant which was owned by Mary's father and they settled in Prince Edward Island and founded the Hardy family dynasty in Canada.

It is quite remarkable that the award of the plot of land upon which Thomas's house stood was the beginning of the improvement in the family's fortunes. Thomas like several people in the village who received small awards, was able to sell his property and move on and his son George could then marry into a wealthy family in Hessle. There was a row of ten other plots of land along the west side of Ferry road beside the one awarded to Thomas. They were all awarded at the same time. (If you live upon one of these plots of land then you can find the name of the person to whom it was awarded in 1775 in the Award of the Act of Inclosure.) Some people who received awards of land found the expense of fencing etc to be too great and they sold their land and became engaged in trade. Others bought up more land and established farming families. At the other end of the row from Thomas lived Widow Raby whose plot was of similar size to his. There is no other mention of the Raby family in the award so we know that they had no farmland. Was this also the beginning of another family's prosperity?

PARISH COUNCIL

I only have a couple of topics to share with you this edition. The first is Unfortunately a warning from the Police and the second is about the Parish Council Committee.

The Police have advised the Parish Council that the incidents of theft in the neighbourhood are on the increase. Two main areas have been identified and concern horses and lead. It appears that horses are being stolen to order and all horse owners in the village and indeed all village members are advised to be vigilant and report any sightings of anyone behaving suspiciously in the vicinity of their livestock. It appears the thieves have a way to identify/mark the horses (knots in the horse's mane) they wish to steal and do this in daylight then return during the hours of darkness to steal the horses. I am sure the many horse owners in the village are aware of this but a timely reminder does no harm. The second problem is to do with the theft of lead from buildings. At one time this act was restricted to Church roofs but the increased rise in the price being paid for scrap lead has convinced the thieves to be more prolific in identifying targets. Recently all of the lead was removed from a bus shelter in Barrow and once again you are asked to remain vigilant about anybody you perceive to be surveying your property or indeed asking to inspect your property. Many of the houses in the village have low level extensions and it would be no effort for the thief to gain access and remove the lead flashings if given the opportunity. If we all remain aware we can help in combating these thefts.

Finally, there are two vacancies on the Parish Council. If you feel you would like to contribute to the council and can afford the time to attend the monthly meetings (1st Thurs evening of every month) then please contact the Parish Clerk. The duties of the Parish Council are not onerous and can make a difference to all aspects of the village.

FLOODING

Are you one of the many residents of Goxhill who are concerned about flooding in the village of Goxhill?

After the floods of June 2007 North Lincolnshire Council gave assurances that remedial action would be taken to avoid a reoccurrence and subsequently place a moratorium on all new builds until the flooding issue could be rectified. He we are in 2010 and yet the route cause of the issue has not been rectified, an inadequate sewerage system which needs updating to the 21st century.

It is somewhat strange therefore that North Lincolnshire Council although the moratorium is still in place have now started granting applications even in areas which indeed where under water. Namely Stothards Lane approval in Feb 2010 for a single property with North Lincolnshire Council stating the lane did not flood. Your parish council leader Mike Gathercole attended their meeting in March 2010 Stating that the council should take account of villagers concerns and pend approvals until the two authorities namely Anglian Water and the Environment agency update the sewerage system to the satisfaction of North Lincolnshire Council.

Regrettably it appears the Council took little notice since on May 5th they again approved another development outside the school in Northend, another area subjected to severe flooding in 2007.

If like Goxhill Parish Council you have serious concerns about approvals of this nature the parish council urge you to write to North Lincolnshire Council Chief Executive outlining your concerning.

Additionally if the village is subjected to flooding and again it is attributed to the sewerage system unable to cope like the experts state then you are urged when making your insurance claim to bring the Councils inactions to their attention.

Goxhill Parish Council is committed to ensuring your voice is heard.

OFF THE HOOF

Perhaps people have read about it in the paper but no doubt some have not so here goes. Back in April a Miniature Horse was stolen from Wootton. If it were not for some quick thinking people heaven knows where she would have ended up. A local man was driving past a field where he saw a Transit van parked. He saw six men. Three were one side of the fence and they were passing a 28 inch pony over a fence to the three on the other side who promptly put it in the back of the van. Our quick thinking local captured it all on his mobile phone. He then flagged two girls from

Goxhill down and asked them to call the Police. They could not get through to Barton so called 999. Our local followed them and in the meantime the girls saw someone they knew and had horsey connections coming toward them so they flagged him down. They obviously have a ready market organised to move them on or even out of the country. If you see anything suspicious call 999 straight away. Minutes are precious in a situation like this. If possible get a license number. Do not put yourself in danger.

A notice which says – THESE HORSES ARE POLICE IDENTIFIABLE. IN CASE OF EMERGENCY PLEASE CONTACT ----- . So simple, but so effective.

Have your horse micro chipped. Call out on a Monday with Rase is free so take advantage. To safeguard your trailer a new device, which sounds really good, is a Zenlock. For more information, go to www.equine-secure.com. Apparently they can be leased, hired or bought. Now is the time of year to those horrid little midges to make an appearance bringing the misery of Sweet Itch to some animals. To down load the BHS leaflet "Advice on Sweet Itch" visit the Horse Care section or alternatively call the Welfare department on 01926707839.

In the last edition of the Gander I reported that my pony had been badly spooked by a dog and an irresponsible owner. Since then I have had several reports of horses being attacked by dogs and one being bitten. This has now been taken on board by Defra who are changing the Dangerous Dogs Act. At present it is at the Consultation stage but for



ASK THE CHEF? with Nigel Brown



In the world of demonstration chefs the last few months have seen the start of our 'silly season' with food festivals and roadshows up and down the country. I was thrilled that two of these events were right on our doorstep starting with the incredibly successful Hull

Truck Food Festival in March which was a 'first' for the theatre with James Martin and myself demonstrating to 3 sell out performances.

April saw me meet up with my mate Jean-Christophe Novelli at the Lincolnshire Fine Food and Drink Festival at

Meridian Park in Cleethorpes, it was great to catch up and swap ideas for both our cookery schools.

Breaking news for my cookery school is we're expanding! June sees us moving to The Ropewalk in Barton where we'll have the room to increase places from 4 to 8. It's a fantastic venue for us in a Grade 2 listed building with plenty of free parking, café and art gallery – try the hot chocolate in the café, it's 'to die for'! We'll be having an open day which will be advertised on our website, blog and facebook so be sure to keep checking and come and have a nosey around our new facilities.

Thanks to all those who sent in their culinary queries, we haven't got room to answer all of them but keep them coming and you may see yours in print next time.

Q Yorkshire Puddings

"This is my problem! How can I get my Yorkshire puddings to rise? Is there a foolproof way as mine are always a disaster more like Yorkshire biscuits? I have tried all ways of making the batter - by hand, in an electric mixer. Tried the batter thick and thin and I have the oven very hot."

A Ingredients:

3 medium free range eggs

6 heaped dessert spoons plain flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 pint full fat milk (or until the batter is of a milkshake consistency when mixed)

Method:

Combine the eggs, flour, milk and salt and mix by hand. Pass through a sieve to remove any lumps/ eggshell etc. Stand for 20 minutes.

Put a teaspoon of oil into each mini pudding tray. Get the tray really hot in the oven at 200°C until you see a blue haze over your tin.

Ladle or pour in the batter to the tray to two thirds full.

Bake in the oven for 20/25 minutes on the middle shelf and don't open the oven for the first 15 minutes. After 15 minutes turn the oven down to 180°C.

Q Ice Cream

"How can I make ice cream, without going to the expense of buying a machine?"

A Use any ice cream recipe you come across. The key factor is churning the ice cream. If you don't have an ice cream machine an alternative would be to churn the ice cream in your freezer, however this is a lengthy process as it will require you to churn the ice cream by hand every 5-10 minutes whereas an ice cream maker will usually complete this process in approximately 20 minutes based on a half litre ice cream recipe. My advice would be to buy an ice cream machine – sorry!

Q Crispy Crackling

"How to get crackling really crispy?"

A Firstly buy your loin of pork boned rolled and scored. Pre heat the oven to 200°C. Place the loin of pork on a bed of vegetables on a roasting tray.

Liberally pour either vegetable or rapeseed oil over the scored loin of pork and rub in by hand.

Apply liberal quantities of table salt and rub into the oiled scored pork.

Apply the principle of 20 minutes per pound plus 20 minutes to ensure thorough cooking. After the first 20 minutes of roasting turn the oven down to 180°C and baste regularly. Perfect crackling every time!

Q Fresh Salmon

"What do you suggest to do with a big piece of fresh salmon, ie a whole fish?"

A The perfect recipe for a whole side of salmon would be to make a classic salmon coulibiac which is like a fish version of beef wellington. When you've made one invite me round for dinner – it's fantastic.

Nigel's Classic Salmon Coulibiac recipe

Ingredients:

For the filling

100g/3½oz long grain rice, rinsed
½ fish stock cube
1 free-range egg, beaten
200g/7oz small prawns, boiled and peeled
1 tbsp chopped fresh dill
1 tbsp chopped fresh flatleaf parsley
1 tbsp chopped fresh chives
50g/2oz mushrooms, chopped
1 lemon, zest only, plus 1 tsp lemon juice
salt and freshly ground black pepper

For the salmon coulibiac

2 blocks ready-made puff pastry
100g/3½oz baby spinach leaves
1 x 400g centre-cut salmon fillet, cut in half lengthways, skin removed, pin bones removed
1 free-range egg, beaten, for glazing

Method:

1. Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4.
2. For the filling, place the rice and the crumbled stock cube into a saucepan and cook the rice according to the packet instructions. Drain well and cool.
3. Mix the cooled rice, beaten egg, cooked prawns, dill, parsley, chives, mushrooms, lemon zest and juice in a mixing bowl until well combined. Season to taste with salt and freshly ground black pepper.
4. To assemble the coulibiac, roll one of the blocks of puff pastry out to a rectangle 4cm/1½in bigger all round than the salmon fillets. Roll out the second block to make a rectangle 5cm/2in larger than the first one. (You may not need to use all the pastry.) Sprinkle half of the spinach leaves over the smaller sheet of puff pastry, leaving a 2cm/¾in gap around the edge of the pastry. Place one of the salmon fillets on
5. Brush the edges of the puff pastry with beaten egg and cover the salmon filling with the second, larger, sheet of puff pastry. Seal the edges of the pastry parcel together with your fingers, trimming off any excess. Carefully transfer the salmon coulibiac to a greased baking tray.
6. Using a knife, cut one or two small holes in the top of the salmon coulibiac, then brush all over with the remaining beaten egg. Transfer the salmon coulibiac to the oven and bake for 25-30 minutes, or until the pastry is crisp and golden-brown.

WHAT DO YOU KNOW ABOUT HONEY BEES?

Did you know?

- Bees have been around for over 70 million years.
- At its summer peak a thriving hive contains over 50,000 bees.
- Bees keep their hive/nest at a constant temperature of 33-34°C all year round.
- By vibrating their wing muscles 1,000 bees can generate 7 watts of heat energy.
- To collect a pound of honey, a bee might need to fly a distance equivalent to twice around the world.
- A bee's top flying speed is about 20mph (32 km/h).
- Bees travel approximately 7 million miles per gallon (2.5 million km per litre) of honey they consume.
- There are at least half a dozen active beekeepers living in Goxhill and several others who site hives in the fields around the village during the summer season.



FAMILY COOKED ON A COAL FIRE

I came to live in Goxhill when I was married to Dennis Percy of that village in 1949. I was Miss Ramona Parkin of Market Place, Barrow, and before that I lived at Barrow Haven.

We were able to rent a council house, which was newly built and situated in the estate called Abbey Garth Villas. Our house was number three and was in School Lane off Thorne Lane. The road was and still is an unadopted

road, which means it was and still is, as seen by my visits there, a road full of potholes.

When we moved in we had the joys of earth closets for about a year. We had a coal fire, which heated the water and so had 'modern' bathroom facilities. However, the only lavatory, as mentioned before, was outside.

The coal range was a 'Yorkist' model, which had an oven. For a long time we cooked on the open fire which was so usual for us all our lives that we demanded no other. It was quite a number of years before we acquired an electric oven.

We shopped in the village but food was still rationed due to the wartime and post wartime restrictions.

My husband, Dennis, worked on a farm for some years, which meant we had extra rations for his packed meals in times such as harvest. The rationing system made sure that your shopping was largely done with the grocer with whom you were 'registered', in our case Giles of London House, Howe Lane.

We attended All Saints Church as a family. Our son, Kevin was born in 1950 and Wendy in 1954. We were both campanologists under the expert guidance of Septimus Neave, a well known and well loved character.

It is regrettable that the rise of supermarkets has brought the closure of many village shops where one could meet friends while shopping. The loss of shops has helped to destroy the community spirit.

I taught in Goxhill School in 1958/9. The school on the

corner of Thorne Lane and School Lane, was just over the road. It is now used to accommodate some businesses.

In those days it was a happy school. The children had to walk to the Memorial Hall, where their meals were cooked by Gladys Osgerby.

We left Goxhill in 1967 to live in Ferriby Road, Barton. I had spent 19 years in Goxhill but Dennis was there for 40 years.

ALAN GOULD - FOUNDER, FOUNDERED

village was huge, even though his height was not!

Well-known in Esperanto circles, among his many talents he was a crossword compiler for the Observer. The Gnome of Southend, so called because of his beloved woolly hat, was a keen organic gardener and smallholder. He was an expert on organic growing, and later in life he wrote advice blogs alongside Charlie Dimmock and Alan Titchmarsh. In fact, Alan for many years did some very advanced work on computers, from the Amstrad at the beginning, to advanced publication programs later on. He was usually working on something at the forefront of technology, yet was quite behind the times in other ways – he was a keen member of the North Lincolnshire Local Economy Trading System (LETS – a barter system) because it didn't use cash, and he hated banks.

Alan was at the forefront of the Humber Against Nuclear Dumping (HAND) campaign, and a spokesman for those in the local community who were against the proposal to site a nuclear waste dump at South Killingholme. In fact, he gave a home to the HAND campaign caravan, which sat in his garden until recently. He was for many years an activist in the local Green Party.

Alan stood for election to Goxhill Parish Council. In fact the first outing of the Gander was a single sheet publicising all the candidates equally – no favouritism from the Gander! In 1988 he finally became a Parish Councillor, and became a particularly enthusiastic champion of trees, footpaths and other rural issues. He was always very good at putting his point across, despite being deaf, and he always stuck to his guns. In fact, his deafness sometimes helped him, as he did not hear the Chairman asking him to stop!

He will be remembered for the Footpaths of Goxhill booklet, which he wrote and which has recently been reprinted. This is the definitive work on walking routes around the village, which involved an awful lot of research collecting historical and geographical anecdotes to make his routes pleasurable for walkers. The footpath from Chapel Street to the school playing field was named Alan Gould Way in recognition of his tireless work, and we understand a sign will soon be erected to that effect.

“Gander” Founder, Parish Councillor and much, much more...

Often to be seen reading between trains as he manned the signal box at Goxhill, Alan Gould took a lot of subjects seriously and was very committed, though he usually also had a twinkle in his eye. Whatever he was involved in and whoever with, we usually came away full of his infectious enthusiasm. A pocket dynamo, his impact on the

Alan was instrumental in the extension of the Parish Room to its present glory. He served on the Parish Room committee which oversaw the library extension and formation of storage room, kitchen and indoor toilet (and central heating – what luxury!)

And so to the Gander. Alan was at the first meeting to discuss the founding of a village newsletter for Goxhill, and became a founder member and secretary. He was a staunch supporter for many years. He was involved in fundraising events including the Gander Walk, which raised money for charity by the team walking the bounds of the village, with one member always wearing the Gander costume. Later he had his luxuriant locks and beard shaved to replenish the funds depleted by the production of the village's first free Village Directory.

The early Gander was put together in a party atmosphere. Articles were edited by the team with several glasses of wine (which accounted for some of the daffy stories). Once typed up into suitably sized

columns, the pages were put together with scissors and glue – no computer cutting and pasting in those days! Early editions were run off by Alan on one of his many printing machines – stencil duplicator or printing press, but not the photocopier, which was too expensive! Later, as the number of pages grew, a

commercial printer was used, but the team still met as we had in the beginning to go round and round the Parish Room table, picking one page at a time from the stacks, then stapling the completed copy and starting again. Alan loved this, especially as we got further down the various bottles which lubricated the process.

Sometimes on the larger editions we broke into song!

Alan died in April. He will be greatly missed by all those who knew and worked with him.
