LETTER FROM THE CHAPEL

Hundreds and hundreds of birthday candles to you! We are about to celebrate Pentecost – or Whitsun as some folk call it. At first it sounds a bit mysterious – celebrating an event when a hurricane seems to blow through the house and tongues of fire dance upon heads. That, though, is bright poetic language for something utterly wonderful and stimulating – the vivid discovery that Jesus is present with us, alive in all his vitality. Now - life is spectacularly different. Now - we can start living life to the full. That's a good way of thinking about the Holy Spirit – Jesus with us, permanently, to help us live 'life to the full.'

It clearly means that Christians, as they start to enjoy life to the full, also want everyone else in the world to know that fullness of life: they want the world to be better for everyone. Christians urgently want an end to violence and war, to hunger and poverty, to loneliness and emptiness. We want all humanity to live life to the full with justice and mercy prevailing everywhere, otherwise there is no chance that the poor and the underdogs will even sniff the full life, let alone know it!

In the Hope that the Spirit brings, we want to see the hungry fed and the downtrodden given a totally new chance. Roll on any agency that can make those things happen in our day and age, in the here and now! (and three cheers for Christian Aid and All We Can and scores of other similar group at work today.)

The full, good life is never one in which we think, first and foremost, of ourselves. That is flat contrary to what the risen Christ teaches. The Holy Spirit is not given us to make us feel better than everyone else or to be smug about our faith. He/she is given us to open our whole being, our whole heart, to the world that Jesus loves.

If the wind of the holy spirit is to blow in our direction and the tongues of fire are to rest on our heads, then let them blow away any notion that we would consider first our own benefits and concerns! Let the holy spirit blow away all the self-concern and self-obsession that can plague us and which prevents us from living life to the full. Let the holy spirit also blow away any notion that the Church's first task is to look after herself. Not so. The church's first task is to help the whole world find the full life.

To that end let justice flow far and wide – locally, nationally, globally - and all in the power of the Spirit!

May you know a determined new work for God this Pentecost in your private life and in your church life! Happy Birthday Christian Church – time to help the world celebrate!

LETTER FROM THE VICARAGE

On our day off, my wife & I love to eat out and one of our regular venues is a well known restaurant just over the Humber Bridge. I usually have a beer with my meal, but Sue is likely to have a cola. The restaurant we favour offers 'unlimited free refills' to keep the diner refreshed! You pay for one glass - and then fill it up as much and as often as you wish!

As I reflected on this very pleasant offer, I was reminded that Jesus Christ came to give us a 'spiritual refill' or, if you like, a second chance for free. And not just a second, but a third or fourth ... unlimited chances at a new start in fact. When we invite him into our lives we are given new life. The Bible tells us that in Christ we can become 'new creations (2 Corinthians 5.17). As we live this new life we will, along the way, stumble and fall, or occasionally lose our way. Then, all we have to do is ask Jesus for a 'refill', or second chance, after we've acknowledged that our spiritual glass is getting low. And, who knows, we may even have enough to offer some others a taste of what we've received. So why not try Jesus Christ - like a famous brand of cola – he's the 'real thing'!

MEMORIAL HALL NEWS

Some of the Hall's users may have noticed a lot of workman wandering around recently. I thought everyone might like to know what has been going on since not all the work that's been carried out is immediately obvious. To improve safety we have replaced three emergency lights and installed another four. We now have smoke and heat sensors throughout the building, linked them to a rather LOUD fire alarm. The kitchen door has been replaced with an emergency door. All the wiring in the building has been checked and where necessary replaced. A new electrical junction box has been wired in. All the portable equipment has been PAT tested and the fire extinguishers overhauled.

Improvements of a more general nature include replacing the oven and hob for newer models, replacing the cracked side window, repainting the walls and woodwork in the snooker room, corridors and meeting room and replacing the old curtains in these areas with new, fireproof blinds. We have also had all the lights in the main hall replaced for brighter ones. They were so high we had to use a mobile platform to get them changed. There is also a new light in the corridor next to the kitchen, so no more fumbling in the dark to find the hall lights.

We hope everyone enjoys these improvements and appreciates that a significant amount of our funds have gone into making the hall safer and more pleasant to use. We hope to continue with the good work by redoing the tennis court, replacing the serving counter and refurbishing the ladies toilets. As always, this is dependent on having the cash and volunteers available. We will be holding several fund raising events in the coming months. – The Plant and Household goods auction in May, and a Scarecrow Trail later in the year. Please support us in our efforts to make your Memorial Hall a place to be proud of.

World Book Day

This year's World Book Day celebrations at school were a roaring success. The whole school joined in attempting to learn the poem, 'Please Mrs Butler' written by Janet and Allan Ahlberg. Two year 6 children were kidnapped and given the secret mission of not only learning the poem with actions but teaching it to the entire school within a day.

Throughout the day (in lessons, on the playground and in the dinner hall) older children and younger children were working in partnership to achieve their goal. There was a real energy around school and it was lovely seeing the children so enthusiastic about both the poem and the task.

Other classes did book reviews and made displays linked to book covers and year 6 participated in poetry workshops – they recited poems and worked together in groups to apply what they had learnt to writing their own poetry.

The day was very successful in inspiring children to be passionate about books and reading. Staff really enjoyed working alongside the children throughout this celebration.



Over the last two and a half years Baysgarth has undergone a complete transformation. In summer 2014 our results were the second worst in the Local Authority and were on a 3 year

downward trend. Since then we have made significant and sustained improvements; in 2015 we were named the most improved school in North Lincolnshire and in 2016 we were in the top five schools in the Humber region, in the top two schools in North Lincolnshire and amongst the top 10% of schools nationally!

This transformation has come about for a number of reasons. Firstly, we raised our expectations of what our students can achieve and insisted on high standards of behaviour and appearance. Secondly, we focused our staff on the quality of learning taking place in the classroom. We came up with our own Baysgarth Learning Model that underpins our lessons and focused on promoting collaborative learning and Kagan techniques in the classroom. Thirdly, we focused on changing the culture of the school to ensure that we promoted strong teams, encouraged creativity and risk-taking, and praised success.

As a result our classrooms have become vibrant and creative places that are enjoyable for staff and students. and we have a very strong teaching staff in all departments. In October 2016 we moved into a brand new school with every classroom fitted with state-of-the-art facilities to enhance learning. The site also includes the Humber Skills Centre, which supplies vocational provision to learners from within Baysgarth and beyond, and the Baysgarth Sports Village which incorporates a wide range of sporting facilities. These will be further enhanced in summer 2017 with the addition of a latest specification full-size, floodlit 3G pitch for use by the school and the community, which is likely to be opened for the autumn/winter season. Securing the funding for the full-size floodlit 3G pitch has been a two year journey, with £425,000 donated from the Premier League and FA, alongside significant investment from the Local Authority. The Sports Village has secured a total investment of almost £1 million. No local school

can match the facilities that Baysgarth has and we are very proud of our provision.

In addition to all the fantastic improvements to the school, we have facilitated a number of trips and expeditions to allow students to obtain skills and

knowledge outside of the classroom, which they can take forward with them throughout their adult lives.

students visited Saalbach in Austria on a ski and snow boarding trip. Students enjoyed an excellent choice of après ski activities for one week during the half term break. Students also enjoyed vast sporting facilities, including climbing walls, a sports center, basketball, table tennis, volleyball and table football, whilst learning or improving their winter sports skills. This trip is a very popular event, with next year's excursion been increased to allow 68 students to take part!

April 2017 took a group of 15 students to the Big Apple, for a 'New York Movie Moments Experience', where they were asked to re-create cinema history on location in all five boroughs of the city. Filming 12 scenes over three days and working in teams, this fantastic opportunity elevated budding actors, along with their media and leadership skills. In between filming, students hit the shops of Manhattan, visited the Statue of Liberty and also took in a Yankees game!

We have also arranged a once in a lifetime expedition to Mongolia and China, which will take place in the summer of 2017. The main purpose of the 21 day expedition is for 14 students to help the orphans and disadvantaged children in the city of Ulaanbaatar. After students trek for two days along the Mongolian Steppe and camp under the stars they will be spending one week in the city. Here they will be spending seven days of hard graft teaching the most vulnerable children in the city and running a day care summer camp. Even though seven days is only a small amount of time to give, the gift students will be giving those in need will be life long and will also help the future generations of this area. To facilitate this trip, students have raised some of the travel fees themselves; they have done a fantastic job by holding fundraising events and securing generous donations from local companies and businesses. This is a mere snapshot of all activities, events, trips,

ongoing work and effort we as school put into every student each day, as we aim to support their needs and develop their futures.

Goxhill Traffic Survey

Back in March a traffic survey was produced to get a general idea and input of residents primarily on Thornton Road and Ferry Road. Some were delivered to the centre of the village but by the time they had been set out printed and delivered we were very much running out of time. A meeting with our MP Martin Vickers and councillor Richard Hannigan had been organised and armed with completed surveys we wanted to draw their attention to residents concerns. The meeting seemed to go well but as yet, nothing has changed. There were only four of us delivering and collecting, sometimes in horrendous weather, so apologies if anyone feels left out.

Just doing it was certainly an eye opener for me. The ones, who seemed least interested, and at times extremely rude, were the horse fraternity. As one rider could not stop and admitted she had just had a "go" at someone in the village made me realise just why people get a certain opinion of riders. Her companion said nothing, as she was busy on her mobile phone! Manners cost nothing.

On the other hand I thought I would have a captive audience if I went to the Community Hall on a Wednesday afternoon. There were people of a certain age and all ladies apart from one gentleman.

Shelia, my friend, and myself had a lovely time. Tea and biscuits and a raffle; lots of banter and laughter. Most filled in the questionnaire while others took one home for their partners. I will certainly go again.

I was invited in to a lovely couples bungalow who also made me welcome. They told me they had both not been well with a virus that they could not shake. Because of this they were not going out and I realised that it does not take much to be isolated but I hope they felt better for my visit.

Before producing the questionnaires both Barricks Haulage and the Tileries were asked if some could be left as we wanted the lorry drivers input. No one was around at Barricks that was prepared to take the surveys in. The manager at the Tileries was away, although some were left no replies were received.

Anyway here are the results of the Traffic survey conducted in response to the increased traffic in the village on Thornton and Ferry Road 19/03/17.

Those who completed the survey

148 people

262 residents were affected

The majority (84%) of those involved were residents (15.5%) were visitors to the Goxhill

1 Lorry and 1 bus driver completed the survey

90% of people commented on the increase in traffic

Of those who had experienced problems on Thornton or Ferry Road

5% were disabled

the majority (78%) were drivers, 20% cyclists, 9% were

38% pedestrians, 22% dog walkers, 16% walked with children, 5% walkers or runners

Issues highlighted

The majority commented on speeding as being a major issue – (83%) and whilst the speed of the HGVs was largely commented on, quite a number were concerned by the residents who speed, especially at 'work' times and in particular there were several who raised the issue of the Tileyard lorries and workers from the Humber Bank speeding to and from work.

Noise and pollution (51%) was a factor – including the mud and dirt on the roads and the effects of the spray and noise from large vehicles on people, animals and

Narrow and unsuitable roads

40% raised a variety of concerns related to the effect the increased volume of heavy traffic (Tileyard lorries, Barricks and sometimes coaches as well as construction HGVs) is already having on roads not designed or built to carry it - they sited the wear and tear and damage already being caused on the roads, verges and railway bridge and people's driveways; traffic congestion has increased (including on Thornton Road where parked cars make it more difficult for lorries to pass); lorries mounting the pavement at sharp bends and where the road is too narrow for 2 lorries to physically pass each other; a few said they have been forced to jump on the verges or swerved to avoid oncoming or passing lorries, especially where there are non-existent footpaths - worse still where there are little or no verges either.

One person said "HGV's have little regard for the safety of cyclists (both children and adults). They do not slow down to pass but career by – leaving the rider to cope with the 'backdraft' that the speeding HGV makes"; horse and dogs are also affected.

13% were experiencing difficulty getting in/out of their driveways - 3 people cited lorries using their driveways as passing places.

14% consider it too dangerous to cycle/walk/dog walk or horse ride and some said they were seriously concerned about walking with young children to /from school.

5 people have had what they call a 'near miss' with a lorry, a cracked windscreen due to stones being thrown up by a passing lorry and, one collision was sited.

Effects on property

House value depreciation was sited by 20% of those surveyed. Issues also raised included houses and windows shaking; damage to driveways,

Suggestions

Traffic lights at North End were commented on by 36 (24%) of those surveyed; in total 14% said no to lights and 11% said yes.

Solutions to the speeding included:

Enforcing the limit with the use of speed cameras (19% said no, 13% said yes).

Other suggestions included 20mph limit for lorries around the bends, the bridge and on Chapelfield Road; speed bumps, speed indicators.

A new road being built from New Holland was the most favoured - 47% yes; a few suggested some kind of one way system or re-routing at least the construction HGVs to Chapelfield Road/South End.

A few made the comment that these are early days: the temporary road construction is already behind schedule and we have another 3 + years of the problem.

One resident said:

"What will happen when tunnelling and extracting thousands of tons of chalk begins - will that too be transported along Ferry Road?

What was once a beautiful area has become a 'racetrack'

for HGV drivers on 'incentive' schemes, who would sooner overtake than slow down.

The Pipeline Project has not yet begun. This is only site establishment that we are experiencing.... Over the project there will also be 30,000 tunnel sections to be transported through Goxhill!"

Another asked:

"Are there any plans ... for a continual repair programme to damaged driveways, verges, pavements, roads? ... to prevent lorries mounting the verges and kerbs " He concluded " ... the main work had still to commence - imagine the damage and chaos"

As you can see speed seems to be the main issue. There is such a simple solution. All traffic just needs to "slow down". In 2015 (before the project started), Highways did a speed check and although the majority were over the limit it was not deemed necessary to take any action. Another one has been taken since then and a third is due to

Our Parish Council is to organise flashing light speed signs along Ferry Road and, although late, are now imminent. I believe the one-way system is now complete and by the time this edition of the Gander goes out it should be fully operational. It was agreed when their shift system starts, traffic will go on site via Ferry Road and off site via Chapelfield Road and South End.

nationalgrid Update from National Grid River Humber Gas Pipeline Replacement Project By Steve Ellison, project manager

We are currently progressing with our pipeline replacement project in Goxhill and we are pleased to announce the one-way system for project traffic is operational.

We are committed to reducing the effect our presence has on the local community and environment and acknowledge that the installation of the passing places and the Soff Lane diversion has taken longer than we had hoped. However, these measures are now complete, allowing us to open a one-way system for our works traffic which will help ease congestion and improve the flow of traffic on the project's route.

All our project traffic including HGVs, plant traffic, and staff vehicles will use the one-way system and Soff Lane diversion during the hours Monday to Friday 0700-1900 / Saturday 0700-1300. Outside these hours only staff vehicles may be driving to and from site.

After listening to feedback from local residents and North Lincolnshire Council we have also put in place a number of additional traffic mitigation measures that go beyond those included in the original traffic management plan. These include additional speed controls at North End, lowering speed limits along our route, installing an additional passing place and implementing moving speed traps. To ensure that Goxhill residents have a dedicated contact, we have appointed Jonathan Compton as our onsite community liaison officer. You may have seen Jonathan in Goxhill meeting residents, recording the condition of the highways and conducting speed patrols.

The River Humber pipeline is a nationally significant pipeline – connecting an import location for gas at Easington on the East Yorkshire coast to the wider network, delivering gas to millions of customers throughout



Sustainability

Recently we have been informed that Goxhill is high on the official list as a sustainable village, which is wonderful news, but even armed with this knowledge, I'm sure that we were all aware that we were not going to disappear from the map at any time soon. With all the ongoing noise, heavy traffic, and disruptions being experienced by many residents at present, with tolerance and patience, and resolve we will continue to evolve. As with any other settlement, changes do occur, from the early years, and continue on through the ages, it is only growth and development that prevent stagnation. We face several years of upheaval while necessary works are carried out with the Humber pipeline, and we know that there is no way that we can avoid that, however, we can plan to ensure that all is put right upon completion. If we take careful note of the conditions at the start, we can not only put things right, but with careful attention we can go one step forward and use it as an opportunity. Very often at home, we don't make changes, we can't be bothered with the mess, we just live with it, we are content with the status quo, but if for any reason change is inevitable for normal repair, or to correct damage, we very often take that time to make a step forward, not just to repair, but to modernise and re-think, how to improve or move on, new ways ,new designs, or new materials can always be found. This village has pulled itself up many times after enforced change of use, and it has come out at the other side a beautiful place to live. We are Eminently Sustainable, and you only have to take a long walk around our village footpaths across the fields, listen to the Skylarks, (which we are told by RSPB are on the danger) list ,especially at this time of the year, and see that nature needs little help from us, but it does need a great deal of patience and a watchful eye to protect it. That is where we should be looking to ensure that all we have now, and what was there before any work started, is not only put back, but expanded upon, enhanced and protected for the future. That is real sustainability.

Street Sport

This has been running at the MUGA for six months courtesy of NLC free of charge. According to the organisers this has been an overwhelming success and as such will continue. The only issue that has been

identified by parents is the lack of volunteers prepared to give a maximum of two hours. The reason for the need for volunteers is that NLC can only commit two staff for the facilities, and owing to various reasons, H&S child protection being a very important one, more parental volunteers are needed. On Quarry Beach - Collected Poems 2008 - 2013 By Robert Jaggs-Fowler



My father was a Goxhill Yank

Warren Baxter Ballard arrived in Goxhill in 1942, a Radio Technician with the U.S.A.A.F.. He met a young English girl called Marjorie in 1944 [she was a war widow – her first husband, Wilfred Taylor, was a member of a tank crew and died in battle] and shortly after they were married. I was born in April 1945 and the three of us started life together in the U.K. After the war Dad found work at Marshalls of Gainsborough but couldn't settle in England, so he took mother and myself to Chicago, his home being a bit of a joker at Marshalls and during his time there gave one

Unfortunately Mother didn't like America anymore than Dad had liked living in England, so when I was just three, Mother took me back to Grimsby, and they were divorced soon after.

My father found a job working for Motorola and whilst there he met Laverne, a divorcee with a baby son, who he married and at the same time adopted the child to whom he gave his name (also known as Butch).

Dad and his new 'family' moved to Albuquerque were he worked for many years for the Sandia Corporation helping develop the first production nuclear bomb for the American Army. He eventually was responsible for handing over the bomb to the army and in his words 'Spend five years in a tin hut in the middle of the desert

with the darn fool thing teaching the army personnel how not to blow themselves up with it'. Another part of his job was to be part of a team that installed the electronics into Air Force One, which is the aircraft used by the President of the United States. was granted the highest level of security clearance of anyone barring the President.

He eventually obtained a job with Northrop in California working on the B2 bomber installing the radio equipment and developing the electronics package.

After my mother and I returned to England we lived with my great-grandfather, Thomas Kiddle, in Hainton Ave., Grimsby, where my mother acted as house keeper. Grandpa Kiddle had a clothing store in Freeman Street.

Life at home before mother re-married and having to start my formal education was very much influenced by my great-grandfather and his wife, Annie, with my mother throwing in the odd comment about how useless my father was.

The signs that there had been a war were very much evident. From my bedroom window I had a view of the railway track and was able to watch steam trains pulling wagons loaded with army tanks and trucks as well as other bits of the machinery of war. Every week the air raid siren was sounded for practice and always brought forth comments of fear from the old folk and distressed looks on their faces as they remembered the bombing raids by the Germans on Grimsby and nights spent in the 'shelter'. Beyond the front gate the rest of the world (in perspective, the rest of the world extended to about 100 yards in either direction and a five minute trolley-bus ride down town when accompanied by an adult) was still recovering from the conflict. On trips to the beach at Cleethorpes we would be entertained by the sight and sound of mine clearance in the Humber with its accompanying loud bangs and plumes of water. This was great fun for a young Rodney who used to do imitations of these explosions whilst having a bath. Most of

grandpa's comments on the noise of my bomb impersonations started with the word 'Bloody' and always had the name 'Rodney' in the sentence. (There was a little notice in the bathroom that said 'You found this bathroom clean, tidy and cool – please don't leave it like a swimming pool' Pity.....at that stage of my life I couldn't read!) Food was in short supply after the war and most things were on 'ration' which basically meant that each household was limited to the amount of things like butter and sugar that they could buy. This meant that essential food like chocolate and, in fact all sweets were in short supply. This state of affairs added considerably to my deprived childhood especially as I heard from an under nourished school chum that America didn't have rationing and the kids there had all the sweets they could eat. Um, pretty good news as I expected Dad to realise any day that something was missing in his life i.e. ME and, dropping by from Chicago to pick me up, would take me home with him and hence a lifetime of sugar excess!

Some 18 years later I began a search for and "found" Dad, and his new family, in Albuquerque where I joined them with my first wife. We were both very young and very English and found it difficult to come to terms with this new branch of the "ready made" family, in a very different environment. I felt very much in awe of this very American man and the way of life in America.

Due to a series of misunderstandings brought about by the difference in cultures, after 5 years, my wife and new born son and I decided to return to England. 25 years went by during which I often though about Dad, and the family in America, but did nothing about it until my second wife, Jenny, bullied me into going to Albuquerque to seek him out yet again. It took a couple of days searching before we tracked them down and arranged a meeting. After a strained and uncertain start, we had an emotional and warm reunion and spent several days together catching up on old times and family news.

I found that my father had worked on a special project in Albuquerque at the Sandia Corporation and had then commuted to California to work on the B2 Stealth Bomber before he retired. Sadly my father died six months after our meeting, but I shall always be grateful for the time we had together and for the opportunity to

hear some of the entertaining stories he told of his time in England, and particularly of Goxhill, and the kindness shown to the Americans by the residents.

Two events in particular stood out in his memory. One Saturday evening he was in the local pub with some of his pals contemplating the cold damp climate, when a little girl appeared in the doorway. "Mam says two of you Yanks can come to tea NOW!" she announced, and he and a friend won the draw. They duly reported for tea and were greeted by the sight of a vast spread of what looked like a whole months rations on the table and a warm welcome from the hosts. It meant a lot to him to know that the family had shared their rations with them, strangers, to make them feel a little less home-sick. (I believe their name was Brown and they ran the grocers shop in East Halton).

The subject of being home-sick is also predominant in one of his other stories, about walking home from the TOC-H hall one evening to find a group of G.I.s and locals around the church gate excitedly talking about a ghost in the church. The sounds of the church organ could be heard on the summer night air playing a hymn tune, only for it to fade out after a few bars into a low wailing sound, and, silence. The silence lasted maybe thirty seconds and then the tune was struck up where it left off. The audience listened enthralled until the arrival of the M.P.s on patrol. Of course the hardy M.P.s held no truck with this ghostly goings on and strode manfully to the church door, threw it wide and entered the church, where they found a very drunk and home-sick G.I. playing the hymns of his church "just like he did at home". The only problem the poor young man had was that the organ had manually operated bellows, which only held enough air for a few short bars before they emptied and he had to run round the back to pump them up again.

My wife and I moved to Goxhill 3 years ago upon our retirement. It had been a long held ambition to live in the village that held so many memories for my father. I can now proudly say that every day I am able to 'walk in my father's footsteps'.

I often wonder if other people have a similar story to mine? Rod Ballard

You will also have noticed the midges are out in full force and these are the culprits for the condition Sweet Itch. They lay their eggs, particularly on manes and tails, which hatch into larvae and it is the larvae that cause the condition. Ponies have been known to rub themselves raw so prevention is better than the cure. Darren from Wild Birds Direct, the animal superstore at Stallingborough, has

very kindly donated two bottles of fly spray for the first two people to phone me and ask for them.

In the last edition two pairs of Grubb Socks, usually retailing at around £9.99 were up for grabs. The two lucky winners were Eva Border and John Robson, who was visiting the village, so congratulations to them for being quick off the mark.

The Industrial Village

A recent enquiry to the Goxhill Gander led to an interesting discovery about the growing of tomatoes in Goxhill. Of course, when tomato growing is mentioned we immediately think of the Dutch families that came to the village and established the glass house industry that was so important here for many years but that isn't the beginning of the story.

In the 1881 census a Mr John Sarjantson is recorded as living

at Lopholme in Church End and he is described as a Gardener. He had been born in 1843 at Mareham Le Fen in Lincolnshire. In the 1901 census, he is found at another address in Church End in a house called Fernlea where he is then described as a florist. We find from the Glandford Brigg valuation of 1900 that as well as a house and garden he had land and probably taken by Mr



greenhouses. A picture Mr Sarjantson Snr (left) and J Sarjantson at Fernlea, on the Square, Goxhill. (unfortunately the photograph was cropped off at the bottom).

Parker the blacksmith who lived nearby, shows Mr Sarjantson and his son in front of their house.

According to the Granddaughter of John Sarjantson he was the first person to send tomatoes to Covent Garden in London. The existence of the railway station at Goxhill with its excellent connection to London through Habrough would have made delivery of tomatoes of the best quality to the early morning market easily possible. The railway was of great importance to the village in that it enabled milk, tomatoes and flowers to be taken to market whilst coal and other goods were easily brought to the village.

This would also have been an important consideration when The Van den Bos and Van Sluten families set up their glass houses in the village. Hawthorn Gardens was founded in 1920, on 20 acres of land owned by Jacob Van den Bos. Mr Herbert. Tyson was a fruit merchant living in Goxhill with a business in the Hull fruit market and much of the produce went to the Hull market by way of the Humber Ferry. Hawthorn Gardens was famous for tomatoes but costs forced owners to specialise in growing cut flowers for market. Tulips, roses, chrysanthemums, carnations and fern were all grown in large quantities. In 1956 the gardens employed 50 people but there were only 7 employees by 1986.

Industry and employment in Goxhill have in the past suffered problems some of which were national and others

which were of local origin. The problem of high cost is perhaps better described as low cost competition. It soon became apparent after we had joined the European Market that any industry that

required large amounts of labour was in danger of being undercut by production in other countries where labour was cheap. In my own industry, I thought how good it would be to take our innovative designs to Europe but I found that in Spain and Italy our designs were copied and sold here and in Europe for low prices.

A much earlier industry in Goxhill was the making of bricks

and tiles beside the Humber bank. Brick making went on for over a hundred years. There were five or more sites which were in use at various times. Clay was dug from the marsh and moulded into bricks which after drying were fired in Kilns. All of the work was done by hand and other than the odd horse there was little mechanical equipment. Each of the yards had a jetty

on the river bank and coal for the kilns and sand, dug from the sand banks of the river were brought in by barge. The empty barges carried the bricks to market. It seems strange that the brick and tile industry could work in this way for a hundred years but the National Grid has been unable to do this for the gas pipeline tunnel.

There were however problems with clay extraction in the marshy sites beside the river, because as the clay was dug out the hole that was left filled with water and this was often contaminated with salt from the river. It was not possible to dig deeper to extract more material and this limited what could be done on each site. The best clay was used for tile production but salt content of some of the bricks reduced their quality. It was not therefore economically possible to introduce powered machinery into the Humber brickmaking industry and as mechanisation developed elsewhere mass production of bricks moved away. Another factor in this was the discovery of clay deposits which contained some hydrocarbons. When the bricks made from this clay were fired the hydrocarbons contributed to the heat produced thus reducing cost.

It becomes increasingly apparent in modern times that

circumstances in the wider world can cause changes which bring businesses to an end and lead to the loss of employment. It is therefore most important locally to ensure that we guard against this. The building of the National Grid Tunnel under the Humber is creating big difficulties for small equestrian establishments and for the tile works and others. Much attention is at present being given to Brexit and there is a lot of aggressive talk about migrants. Perhaps a little look at our past history of migration might be useful at this time. In 1881 John Sarjantson had only travelled a short distance to come to Goxhill but he brought valuable knowledge to the village. Our Dutch friends travelled further but they brought great employment and money to businesses in the area. The village has grown, hundreds of us have come here and have made our own small contribution. We have found a welcome and a pleasant place to live. Some have only crossed the river from Hull others have come from distant lands to find a home. We are grateful that we have been able to raise our families here and to enjoy this village.

THE BROCK - an update

In the last issue, the Friends of the Brock, which has now become Goxhill Community Pub Ltd, an officially registered Community Benefit Society, were within a whisker of signing a contract to secure the Brock for the village. Solicitors representing GCPL had reached agreement with the solicitors for Keigar Homes Ltd and the deposit was lodged with the solicitors ready for exchange.

Then, instead of the final contract arriving, our solicitor received a message retracting previously agreed clauses, leaving conditions that, as the seller was aware, effectively made the purchase impossible. Conditions that were totally unacceptable to the Committee representing the interests of the shareholders and precluded the sale. On their way to presenting the Petition to North Lincs Council



One clause would have made it impossible to raise the extra funds needed to renovate the pub. Another meant it was almost impossible to run it profitably, because of restrictions on trading conditions.

IT WAS AN IMPASSE!

So the petition, signed by 785 residents demanding a Compulsory Purchase Order on the Brock, was sent to North Lincolnshire Council. Four of the GCPL committee were invited to a hearing in the Council Chamber at Scunthorpe and received a more than favourable and very supportive response from the 3 independent councillors and officials, supported by all of our 3 ward councillors.

It therefore came as a huge shock when the Compulsory Purchase Order was turned down on some very flimsy grounds. We are hoping for a resumption of negotiations by Keigar's solicitors to demonstrate a genuine willingness to sell and to get the SAVE THE BROCK campaign back on track.

I can assure you, after a year of work, the committee will not easily give up the fight to Save the Brock!



Health Care Then and Now

There has been so much publicity recently about the 'failing' National Health Service, that I am inspired to relate my recent experiences of the care that I received, and the observations that I made in The Diana Princess of Wales in Grimsby. Before that let me say that I was a young married person in 1948 when this service was started. I lived in both Goxhill and Barrow at that

this service was started. I lived in both Goxhill and Barrow at that time Up until then we did not visit a doctor unless someone was seriously ill 'almost at Death's door'. We could not afford to pay, even though we paid into a scheme each week to a doctor, covering emergencies. So this was great news to us, but it was obvious that now we saw people going to the Doctor for trivial reasons; maybe there

should have been more guidance given about some care that did not need a Doctor's intervention. However the point of this article is regarding my recent experience; in answer to accusations of Hospital failures. I would suggest that 'failure' is not there among the people who work closely with the patients, but with the hierarchy above that is:"too many chiefs and not enough Indians".

I was admitted into hospital on December 21st. to receive a new knee, and be home for Christmas. The pre-op. examination declared me fit to have the procedure; I was given guidance and chose to have a spinal injection, not a general anaesthetic; all the time I was patiently listened to regarding risks etc.; these people must be hearing the same questions day after day, but treated my enquiries with patience and showed me the utmost respect. In theatre I was able to follow the procedures while fully awake; with the help of the anaesthetist, who answered every question I asked, like' what is he sawing now?'.The skill of those surgeons amazed me! I feel privileged to have received such skilful treatment.

Back on the ward: The attention received, and kindness shown by the nursing staff. including the 'care workers', was beyond expectations; even when in the middle of the night I awoke and was so disoriented that I had to ring and ask where I was 'we'd better have a cup of tea' the carer said and sat with me until I got my bearings.

The attention was constant with no complaints about



hard work from the staff .I was unable to go home as expected due to a skin infection. The consultant came round on his ward round each day about eight am; to discuss with me what could be done; and set things in motion; I mention this because when I heard people grumbling in the out patients department that their 9 am appointment was a few minutes late I was able to say 'Hey this consultant has done ward rounds before coming here to his clinic' Many of the public demand immediate attention when the nurses working with staff shortages, are literally 'run off their feet'.

I cannot speak highly enough about my treatment with the NHS in The Diana Princess of Wales Hospital.. As well as the medical staff on the ward, we must not forget the ones who work at cleaning; they're all cogs in the wheel which would not turn if one cog was out of place; so think about these workers who keep our health service working. Stop 'throwing money at it' without specifying how it should be used.

We need no more jobs created for the administration; or long drawn out 'feasibility studies' we need more helpers at the point of care, where it is a struggle to keep going. How many of you also remember the days before the NHS? We do not want to return to that situation.

The most appalling flavoured medicine though was Fennings Fever mixture. It was disgusting. You really had to be very poorly to take it, it was so horrible. It certainly stopped you from

pretending you were ill. Just the threat of a spoonful of that and you were out of bed and off to school. **Jeff Teasdale**



HOW TO FIND PUBLIC TRANSPORT INFORMATION

· Local leaflets published by the Council

These are usually available from Scunthorpe bus station, local link offices, post offices/shops and libraries; however, they are currently under review. Other methods should be used.

· Local leaflets published by the Operators

Most operators have their own leaflets detailing their services. There is a joint leaflet showing the buses operating within Scunthorpe.

· You can plan a journey or get bus departure times on a web site.

www.traveline.info

North Lincolnshire is part of the East Midlands region. Enter where you want to start and end your journey, put in the time you want to depart (or the time you want to arrive at your destination) and click submit. You will be asked to confirm your choices, this is because there are other places in the East Midlands region that have the same name. It might also be that there is a bus stop, address or point of interest at this place.

Once you have confirmed your choices a list of available options will be shown. The traveline system will show all possible connections and not just the obvious direct journey. Scroll through the list to see if there is a direct route, also, check earlier/later as there may be one then. Alternatively, if you know the number of the bus you want you can click the tab at the top of the screen marked timetables. Enter the number of the timetable that you want then scroll through the list until you see the one that relates to you. Be aware that all timetables are separate so there will be a timetable for the Hornsby service 6 and the Stagecoach service 6.

Bus operators also have their own websites.

The SMS code can be found on the website when planning a journey, they are shown on journey plans, on separate pages at the back of each service timetable in pdf format or in the mouse-over text for each stop on an on-screen (HTML) service timetable. They are on Google Maps too. You can use the codes in the traveline-txt SMS service or with NextBuses. Each text costs 25p plus one standard message.

They can also be found on the timetable display at the bus stop.

CallConnect is open to everyone to use regardless of age or status. You can use the service as frequently as required for anything from shopping, travelling to work or school, medical appointment or to a social event.

Social Media

All of the main bus operators use FaceBook and Twitter feeds to inform passengers of any issues relating to bus services. These include planned diversions due to roadworks, unexpected diversions due to accidents or emergencies, delays to services due to traffic holdups or just to say that all services are operating on time.

There are 2 types of display used in North Lincolnshire Separated services – where each route shows the bus that goes from that stop

Blocked display - where all services go to the same point so the times are listed together.

Obtaining Rail Information

The three main train operators in North Lincolnshire are:

First Transpennine Express operate hourly services to Manchester Airport from Barnetby and Scunthorpe. The website is www.tpexpress.co.uk

Tickets can be purchased from Scunthorpe rail station or from the conductor on the train.

- East Midlands Trains operate services from Barnetby to Lincoln. The website is www.eastmidlandstrains.co.uk
- Northern Rail have an hourly stopping service from Scunthorpe through to Doncaster. Saturday services from Brigg and Kirton to Sheffield and Cleethorpes are also available. The website is www.northernrailway.co.uk

There are a number of applications for mobile phones that give live information on the train services. These will provide information for specific stations like Barton or Goxhill on whether a train is on time or delayed. You can also purchase tickets via these applications to be collected from ticket machines at some stations.
