Author, Barton's Ted Lewis, was initially disappointed that it was not set in Scunthorpe and Barton which he originally wrote about, but soon came to terms with the very suitable gritty location. The last financial year has been good and we stand in a more secure and balanced position to start the new one in May. We were hoping that monies could be spent on adding and improving where necessary, but immediately costs have been forced on us by yet more damage and vandalism, caused by some who find their enjoyment or thrills in absolute stupidity. This puts a cost on everyone.

Like all other towns and villages the Queens Jubilee is very much at the forefront of our minds, preparations are in hand for celebrations on the Millennium Green, an ideal location, the organisation of this is in the hands of a very busy group of volunteers, and I am sure all offers of assistance would be very welcome.

Once again we have entered the best kept village competition, this involves everyone, and in the past we have a good reputation, however recently we have just missed out on the awards by a very small margin. We can raise our standards again, there are many excellent gardens and gardeners in Goxhill and hanging baskets and beautiful front gardens add enormously to the appearance

of the village. The roadside boxes will be rejuvenated by all concerned and if we need a theme, and I don't for one minute think that you need a reminder, that Red White and Blue would be ideal!

Under the devolved powers, grass verges are now cut by our own contractors and I'm sure that we all agree over the last few years they have looked excellent, however, every frontage/verge cannot be done this way and additional residential care is always good.

One item I must mention, the old red telephone boxes, which are now book boxes, are an important bit of character in the village dating back a long way, had fallen into a poor state, these have now been completely repaired and redecorated by a very hard working volunteer, Mr Ruddy, grateful thanks to him. I'm sure that they will now stand safely and proudly for many years to come, and what a special year to do it in.

Playing Field. The playing field was recently seriously damaged by someone driving round in circles and ripping up the turf on a very large area, also ripping out the substantial corner post between the allotments and the field, in the process destroying a new wooden gate. This was not youngsters, who always seem to get the blame for any damage, but obviously an older brainless idiot who

# Colin Creasey 20th August 1936 - 14th March 2022. Aged 85 years.





### **News from Goxhill Methodist Chapel**

I have seen people over the years in the Gander and online ask about the old building that sits on Howe Lane looking down Westfield Road. Set back from the road like the house either side, it looks tired and crestfallen despite evident signs that it has not been abandoned by whoever owns it now. I have read people wonder what it was, why it is there and who owns it; I have often wondered the same thing and have none of the answers about its current standing, but I have read about its glory days as a Methodist Chapel.

Despite being a Methodist my whole life and secretary of the chapel for many years, I have never stepped inside the village's former Wesleyan Chapel. Being a lover of old photos and enjoying a good time travel story in TV and film, I have from time to time had dreams in which I found myself in Goxhill a century or more ago. I have walked the imagined streets, subtly different from those I have known for 40 years; what I have never been able to visualise is the former Wesleyan Chapel engaged in worship. In the religious census of March 1851 it was said to host "Public Service twice every Sabbath always in the evening and alternatively morning and afternoon; the Chapel has 224 seats, of which 44 were free; the estimated attendance in the morning 65 with 94 Sunday Scholars and 70 at evening service." On the same Sunday, the Primitive Chape, the one that remains open to this day, had a congregation of 150.

In days gone by there were five chapels in the village as well as All Saints, but in my lifetime we have only had the one. I have some photos of the chapel being packed for major



services (one is attached) and memories of all the pews

being filled for the funerals of important figures in the

Chapel's ongoing story of faith and community work, like

Kees van den Bos, Jack Elwood, and only this spring, Colin

Creasey. But now we count ourselves fortunate if there are

I think Open Gardens always has the chapel looking its best. Even as a hive of activity, with people coming in several times for a drink and snack, it is a place of calm and spiritual refreshment too.

No matter how long you have lived in the village, you can think about how it has changed and what is important for the future. What are the key components of a thriving community with a heart to the youngest and oldest residents? We have been proud to have a Methodist presence in Goxhill since at least 1787, and of our work with our friends in the Church of England and the community. 

Migrants At Last! A compilation of three visits to the local patch at East Halton and Goxhill, with summer migrants arriving proper at last, with a total of 15 new species added to the local patch list, putting me on 125 species for the year to date.

13th April I started at Winter's Pond with a fresh westerly breeze. hoping some visible-migration might happen today. Chiffchaff with at least 5 singing males present and a non singing bird.


As I walked along the floodbank towards the chimney, 3 Barnacle Geese flew by south, probably back to their home at Cleethorpes

The area south of the chimney is often good for migrant Warbler species, didn't disappoint today, with my first 2 Willow Warblers of the year, really smart little birds and that lovely song, always brings a smile to my face, plus 3 singing male Blackcap.

Back to the car park area, a Common Sandpiper feeding on the grassland in amongst the Wildfowl, another new arrival from Africa and a new species for the year.

Good birds continued on the edge of the mitigation area, as the lovely sight of a smart male Wheatear feeding from a fence post, and a female was seen in the same area. I wondered where these lovely migrants were heading, perhaps the Yorkshire Dales or the Peak District to raise their young.

Also observed on the mitigation area 36 Icelandic Black-tailed Godwits, 4 Roe Deer and 2 Brown Hare.

Ruins Pond has been relatively devoid of birds in the past, but recently a flock of Tufted Ducks took up residence, 13 birds including 7 males and 6 females. It would be great if some stop to breed, as they are a rare breeding species on the local patch. At Dawson City, a few birds were here including 3 male and a female Blackcap, 2 Chiffchaff and the pair of Mute Swans still nesting ok, so hopefully some cygnets soon.

A few insects here included Dark-edged Bee Fly and a gueen Tree

Sunday 17th April Starting as usual at Winter's, to carry out my monthly WEBS count. The wind has swung around to the south east now and I hoped for some passage on the Humber, but it was dead. Around the bushes at the edge of the water, another migrant arrival, with my first Reed Warblers (2), Sedge Warbler and Whitethroats of the year, all singing away attempting to attract a mate, it was beginning to feel like spring proper.

Also 4 Chiffchaff, 6 Blackcap and 3 Willow Warblers, all singing males, as well as the 3 resident male Cetti's Warblers.

Next the mitigation area, with highlights - another male Wheatear, 2 more singing male Sedge Warblers, a Willow Warbler, and a nice surprise, a single Short-eared Owl.

At the Skitter area another singing male Whitethroat, plus a single Sand Martin, heading south and 5 Black-tailed Godwit were noted.

Between the Skitter and Dawson City provided some great sightings, including a singing male Grasshopper Warbler, a proper scarce species for my local patch. It used to be a regular feature of my summer birding here, but sadly not as regular these days. Also here, our first Yellow Wagtail of the year, flew overhead behind the pig farm, 4 Ruff and 11 Black-tailed Godwit.

Other bits included another Willow Warbler, a Male Linnet. East Swallow, 44 Curlew still and 4 Roe Deer.

Approaching Dawson City, the rattle of a male Lesser Whitethroat was heard, my 6th new species for the year today, things were

Dawson City held another singing male Willow Warbler, Lesser Whitethroat, 2 Chiffchaff, 2 Blackcap and my first Speckled Wood

Back along the seawall to Winter's, saw a lovely Whimbrel fly by and as we reached the car a Little-ringed Plover became my first sighting of the species for the year, ending a cracking visit.

Monday 18th April With Ring Ouzels being reported around the country and along the coast, I finally find one when I flushed a female from the path bordering Winter's and the car storage area. It was seen in flight on two occasions, giving that metallic, tacking call that gives them away, a great addition to the year list.

Other species at Winter's today included another surprise, a single Jay, the 149th species I have seen on the site.

The 3 Cetti's Warblers were still in good voice along with single Whitethroat, Reed and Sedge Warblers, 3 Chiffchaff, 5 Blackcap and 2 Willow Warbler.

I walked up to the village along Station Road hoping to relocate the Rouzel or another, seeing a pair of Grey Partridge, always a bonus and great to see.

2 Doe Roe Deer and 5 Brown Hare provided some nice distraction from our avian friends and a few Butterflies included my first male Orange Tip of the season.

As I returned along Marsh lane a nice female Wheatear was seen along with 2 more singing male Whitethroat.

The usual suspects were recorded today on the marshes and included a single Whimbrel, male Wheatear again and superb views of the regular Dog Fox. The Skitter area was relatively quiet today, but was brightened by another pair of Grey Partridge. Two more singing male Whitethroat along Skitter Road, completed a decent patch visit today, particularly the Ring Ouzel.

It is really great to have our summer visitors back.

### **Crufts's story**

I had always wanted a dog for as long as I can remember. Sadly, I couldn't get one due to my parents both working full-time but I still had that hope for a dog and knew when it was the right time, we would get our furry little friend.

The beginning - Cooper. Cooper was my mum's friend's cocker spaniel. He had a lovely inky black colour with white paws and chest markings. I adored Cooper. In the school holidays, we would go on camping trips with Cooper, his family and other friends too. This gave me a time when I could look after a dog, something I couldn't experience at home. During the Summer holidays of 2019, we went to the Winterton Agricultural show and Cooper's owners said there was a dog show happening shortly and I could enter a class with Cooper. I was buzzing at the thought of going into a dog show class. I knew nothing about dog shows but later that afternoon I went in the ring with little Cooper on the end of his lead. We entered a class called "owners that look most like their dog". I have very dark thick hair like Cooper, so it was the perfect class for us and I came out in second place. Even though it was a fun dog show, I believe this is what

sparked my interest in dog showing. A year later, I went to another dog show while camping in the Cotswolds. We entered multiple classes, including another "dog that looks most like its owner", but this time we came out with first



place. I couldn't believe it! I also came out with a second in the veteran dog (any dog over 7) so there was a lot of celebration when we returned to the campsite and Cooper received loads of treats as well. Winning that first, opened a whole new world for me. That is where my dog showing journey really began.

My first Crufts. For my ninth birthday, I asked to go to Crufts. I had watched it on the TV and read about it in the papers, but I had never actually been there. Luckily, my mum agreed to it, and we went to stay a night over at my cousins who live closer to the Crufts show in Birmingham. On the 'Best in Show' day, Sunday, we arrived at Crufts and I was completely blown away. There was so much to look at. We went to Discover dogs, a place where there is every single kennel club registered dog imaginable. There were French Bulldogs to the Chihuahua and the Bloodhounds to Beagles. Every dog breed was there. Eventually, my mum

came across the **Lagotto Romagnolo**, a sturdy little gundog with lots of curly hair. We chatted to the breeders and found out more about the dog. They were just perfect for us: they don't shed, I have an allergy to animal hair; they are great with children; have a very loving and loyal personality and they can run which my dad wanted as he runs himself. That day we saw the therapy dogs, golden retriever display, emergency health dogs, guide dogs, flyball final, and the biggest of all the Best in show. I felt on the edge of my seat watching the handlers present their dogs beautifully to the judge. I knew I wanted to be in that ring one day with my own dog.

Lockdown and Bruno. Only a few weeks later, England went into lockdown, and as time went by it seemed everybody got a puppy. As my dad was working from home having a dog became possible and my parents started to consider us getting a dog. We weren't sure about what breed we would want. Border collies appealed to us but then my mum looked further into lagottos and we really felt they were the right dog for us. She got in contact with a breeder and after the covid restrictions calmed down we went to visit them. There were three lovely dogs: Brian, Peggy and Margo. Honestly, the dogs were lovely, but it was a very long waiting list for a puppy, so we kindly declined the breeder. Luckily, my mum then found a puppy on the Kennel Club website and called the breeder asking if there were any puppies left. My mum and dad filled in an application form and after a long conversation with the breeder were selected to have a puppy, a brown boy they called Bear. My parents kept it a secret from me and my brother for a while but eventually sat us down and showed us the images of a little brown puppy. I cried when I saw him and was very excited for when we would start owning him.

This was December of 2020 and we had arranged to pick him up after Christmas but after we found out that the breeder's area was going into tier 3 plans had to change. On the morning of the 23rd of December, I trudged downstairs half asleep to find my family packing up to go pick up our puppy. Later that day after a long 3hour drive we arrived in Norfolk and met him. We called him Bruno. The breeders told us they would like us to start showing Bruno. I was immediately up for the challenge and couldn't wait. Finally, my young childhood dream had come true. In April 2021 I started going to ringcraft classes in Cleethorpes. At first, we weren't very good, Bruno wouldn't let anyone touch him and wouldn't stand still either! After a while, we started to progress and then Mum entered me in a small dog show in Scunthorpe. We continued practising in the garden and thanks to my brother and father we desensitised Bruno to a dog show environment. After a long day at school and work, me and my mum arrived at the dog show and after a nervous wait, we stepped into the ring. To my surprise, we won Gundog puppy, a massive accomplishment that can take years of practice to achieve. When all the other groups had been shown, Bruno and I went into the ring for Best in show puppy. Being in the ring with all the other much more experienced and older handlers I felt out of place. After I lined Bruno up for the final stand, I wasn't paying attention to the judge's movement so when I looked up I saw the judge walking toward me and placing Bruno with the reserved best puppy in show.

We continued doing regular ringcraft classes and dog shows, travelling as far as Malvern and up to Sunderland in the snow. Bruno qualified for Crufts in July 2021 at a Championship Show. I also joined the young kennel club (YKC) so I could compete against children my age. I competed in handling classes for children aged 6-11 and in January 2022 was invited by the YKC to compete at Crufts.

**Crufts.** When the day of Crufts arrived, I felt excited and confident but nervous too; especially because the day before my mum had been contacted by Channel 4 and asked if I would be interviewed about my journey in dog showing. We arrived at the NEC and there were 78 other lagottos from all over the

It was very exciting when *Radzi Chinyanganya* arrived with a film crew at our bench. We began the interview and once I started speaking I felt confident. I'm still surprised to this day that Bruno didn't decide to leap off the crate! It was all surreal and I'm so grateful for the opportunity. After the interview, I only had a few minutes to prepare for my class so it was a bit of a rush getting everything ready but stepping onto that green carpet for the first time is a memory that every Crufts competitor will treasure forever. As expected. I was the only child in the class full of top Lagotto

breeders from all over the world. Through my class, I looked up

UK, Italy, Netherlands, Finland and as far as Croatia.

er.

and saw a banner of Crufts. It hit me then. I was at the world's biggest dog show with my own dog – Something I would never have thought I would accomplish when I was taking Cooper round in a fun dog show ring. Sadly, I didn't place but even being at Crufts was an achievement and I came out of that ring exhausted but proud of my little curly-haired companion who I had trained by myself through tears, sweat and a lot of car miles - thanks Mum!

Next up was the Young Kennel Club, a completely different atmosphere to the breed classes. The classes are extremely competitive, and the children and their parents take them extremely seriously. I entered the ring first, a place which no dog shower wants to be. Bruno did exceptionally well at the mirroring which we had practised loads at home. Even though we placed 6th I was joyous to receive a rosette from the Judge as I just wanted to enjoy this class. Next year if I hopefully qualify again, I will enter the next age category which is the 12-17 full of older handlers. I hope this article inspires more people to follow their dreams and to step out of their comfort zone. If we didn't get Bruno, I couldn't imagine what the past 15 months would have been. I promise you all it's worth everything and the moment of accomplishment that you feel after working on something for what feels like forever is so worth the effort. People reading this - try something new, sign yourself up for that dance class, go train for that triathlon, go buy yourself a dog and train it so you go to the world's biggest dog show. Just try it. Even though I was a complete amateur with my frantic mum and badly trimmed dog, we managed to have a weekend that is going to stay with me for a lifetime.

During the last few months our young people have:


**Beavers** – been working towards the outdoor challenge badge, camp craft, emergency aid and discussing what they could do about the environment.





### **1ST GOXHILL AND BARROW SCOUT GROUP IN 1986**

Back in early 1986 an article in one of the National Papers, said that a strike by teachers working to rule and who were not doing any out of hours 'work', was causing a problem with the plans being made for the Queen's 60th Birthday Celebrations. The plan was to invite school children to Parade down the Mall and present the Queen with flowers and to sing to her. A special song had been written and children from schools were to be invited join in. The



teachers strike however meant that no children from schools in the UK would be included.

I was Akela, at the time, at Goxhill and Barrow Scout Group, so I wrote to the contact named in the paper and asked if our Cubs Scouts could attend this event. I remember Steve telling me it was a waste of a postage stamp, but it was too late because the letter was already in the post.

I received a reply within a couple of weeks and things moved quickly from there. I wrote to the local Schools giving the names of the boys, who were members of our troop, at their schools, asking that the boys could

have the day off, once they had received a letter from each parent asking permission for the son's day off.

It was arranged that Lincolnshire Road Car were to take us, and they turned up for us in a brand new Coach specially arranged for the day, with 2 Drivers, Bradley and Ken who worked at the Scunthorpe depot. Ken just happened to be a Scout leader from Brigg and his wife Mavis Parratt was

Roland Rat was in attendance at the start and when we entered through the palace gates a Scout Marshall took us to the

front of the barrier, so the boys actually got to speak to the Queen. Each boy received a silver commemorative coin and a mug.

I asked some of the boys for their memories of the occasion.

Mog Mosey, "Was a mare of a bus ride I think! Did Ken drive?" Mark Firth, "I remember speaking to the Queen and telling her that I was with

Goxhill cubs and scouts. I can't remember if Dave or I refused to give our daffodil to her because we wanted to give it to Sarah Ferguson".

David Firth, "That was me Mark, she politely asked if they were for her and I told her no they are for Fergie". Eileen Mosey - (Akela of 1st Goxhill & Barrow Scouts, at the time)

### **Considering the Ukraine:**

This editions quote, above, is certainly true at the present with the war in the Ukraine. It's very hard to believe that the world stands by watching and sometimes appearing to do nothing, fearing reprisals.

In our own way we try to help with fund raising in one form or another not only for the humans but also for the animals. The Ukrainian Equestrian Federation Charity Foundation website advises how help can be given www.helpukrainehorses.eu . Forage has been sent but is probably a drop in the ocean when looking at what is needed. One section of the equestrian community has sent two lorry loads of clothes, duvets and nappies and in excess of £48,000 has been raised via a 'Just Giving' page and the FEI (Federation Equestre Internationale) approved a donation of £820,000 which sounds a lot, but it is estimated there are over 100,000 horses in the Ukraine some of which have no shelter or care. Closer to home donations of clothing etc. have been accepted at Palomino Lodge South End and Field Farm Feeds. I am sure there are even more fund raisers on the horizon.

### **Events at home:**

J J Equestrian Services have been hosting an open day on 15th May with a whole host of interesting aspects of horse and rider welfare covered. Some of the proceeds are being donated to the Ukraine so hopefully a total will be available for the next issue.

On 2nd June (Platinum Jubilee Bank Holiday) activities for all the family will be taking place on the Millennium Green. I will be having a stall with all proceeds going to the Ukraine, and I believe other stall holders are of the same mind set. Plants will also be sold which will be timely for Best Kept Village!

At some point I may have another yard sale at 'Shambles' with, once again, proceeds to the Ukraine. If anyone out there is interested in some good office furniture, please contact me.

### Vandalism:

It seems unfair that young people of the age of 18 are staying in the Ukraine to fight for their country while here in Goxhill we have, once again, experienced mindless vandalism on the playing field and on the entrance to the allotment where a gate was driven through and destroyed. Not satisfied with that the perpetrator proceeded onto the field and tore up much of the turf. Both are now repaired but at a cost of your and my money. The Parish Council were very quick to respond but for me comparing the situation in the Ukraine to this wanton vandalism does not sit right. I sincerely hope those responsible will receive some comeuppance for their actions.

### Buying a horse advice:

I was recently involved in helping two friends look for new horses. I feel like I have driven almost around the whole of the UK in this quest. One was quite simple but the second one proved to be a real eye opener. 'Caveat emptor' is Latin for let the buyer beware and when looking for a horse it is true! Several were not the height advertised. Two were obviously lame, one was certainly not traffic proof and quite dangerous. To cap it all most of them were in excess of £8000 with coloured horses commanding a very high price. It's a minefield and I'm pleased I am not looking for one

myself. If you are looking; do as many tests and ask as many questions as you can, ride in a school and in traffic and I recommend the highest level of vetting you can get. Knowing a horse needs some work is one thing. Getting it home and not being able to do what you want is completely

### Horse care:

I cannot remember an April with so many sunny days. I know we will soon be exchanging winter rugs for fly rugs and fly masks. Try not to leave the cleaning of winter rugs until you need them. Brush as much mud and hair as you can off and take them early so, they are ready to go again next

### **'Best Kept Village' preparation:**

In the last edition I included the criteria for the 'Best Kept Village' competition, and I am pleased to have noticed several new pots around the village but there is still much to do to some of the existing areas and a few volunteers would be appreciated.

I volunteered to tidy the corner of the Chapel Street green area at the beginning of the Vicar's Bridge footpath. Which is proving very difficult owing to tree stumps. If anyone has a spare shrub to donate it would be greatly appreciated. Thanks go to Mr Ruddy who has worked hard to remove the ivy off the remaining trees. Jack Lawtey who sprang into action with his strimmer when myself and my niece were struggling to make any headway. Just a phone call for his advice and he was there! Big thanks also to my niece, Tina, who does not even live in the village but gets stuck in to help without question.

### Two men commemorated at the Arras Memorial

Henry (Harry) MAWER D.C.M., Private 201820, 1st/4th Battalion, East Yorkshire Regiment. Died of Wounds 23 April 1917. Aged 21 years. Born 6 August 1895 East Halton. Son of George and Emma Mawer of South Killingholme. No known grave. Commemorated in Bay 4 and 5 on Arras

Memorial, Pas de Calais, France. Initially I was very concerned that I might not be able to identify Harry

Mawer's connection to Goxhill. Harry's father, George, had been born in South Kelsev in 1860 but I discovered that his maternal grandfather. James Parkinson, had been born in East Halton in 1790. George Mawer had married Emma Allison in North Kelsey in 1884 and Harry's older siblings had been born in Winterton, Searby, Somerby and Thornton Curtis. In the 1891 census the family were recorded living in 'Farrow's Cottage' Wootton, closeby Wootton church. After Wootton the census records show the family living in East Halton, Ulceby then Killingholme but I could find no reference to Goxhill.

of Harry Mawer and Dudley Stringer - both of East Yorkshire Regiment.

Bay 1 contains the name of Joseph Dunn, 509th Field Company, Royal Engineers. Killed in Action 21 March 1918 (Gander Spring 2019).

Harry Mawer had been born in East Halton on 6 August 1895. He was one of ultimately nine children. George and Emma Mawer were, in the 1901 census living five of their seven children in the East Field in East Halton.

The East Field is a large area which lays between the main East Halton village roads of Townside and the Skitter Road and is separated from the Humber Bank by East Halton Marsh. Very limited information is provided on East Halton census records. My only option was to write out sections of a number of censuses, compare who had been recorded to try to find consistencies and use a variety of maps to try to analyse where the family had lived. I have come to the conclusion that the Mawer family lived at a farm which lav beyond the bottom of Scrub and Swinster Lanes off Townside in East Halton. The farm buildings are



no longer there but would have stood on the south west edge of where the Hornsea Offshore Windfarm Onshore Substation stands today. In the 1911 census George


and Emma Mawer are recorded living in Ulceby along with their son Tom, daughter Mary Jane (and her husband and a daughter) and Harry, Robert and two younger sisters, Rose and Edith who had been born after the 1901 census. Oldest son Charles was by now married and working at the brickyard in East Halton, which is now better known as Winter's Pond.

By sheer chance I came across Harry's two youngest sisters when I was researching the family of George Henry Howson (Gander, Summer 2019). Kitty Howson had been admitted to Goxhill School on 14 April 1913. Two other girls were recorded with her on the same day, Rose (b. 1901) and Edith (b. 1903) Mawer, the younger sisters of Harry Mawer. The record indi-

cates that the Mawer sisters had moved from Ulceby School and that the family lived in North End. Rose and Edith Mawer remained in Goxhill for just a year, leaving Goxhill School on 10 April 1914 and moving to Killingholme.

It appears that Harry remained in Goxhill when his father

moved the family on from Goxhill to Killingholme. The Hull Daily Mail carried a report on 14 July 1914 stating that Harry had represented Goxhill at a Sports Day in Patrington, Yorkshire. I was initially concerned that this was Goxhill, Yorkshire however competitors from Barton and Killingholme are also named. The article reports that Harry won the half mile and one mile cycle races that day.



I haven't been able to find Harry

Mawer's enlistment papers. However he

Extract from Hull Daily Mail dated 14 July 1914 report of results from Patrington Sports Day

is recorded on the Goxhill Roll of Honour enlisting in the 3rd/4th Battalion of the East Yorkshire Regiment and other records state that when he enlisted he was a resident of Goxhill. The 3/4th Battalion were formed in Hull on 19 June 1915. At some point

Harry transferred to the 1st/4th Battalion of the same regiment. On 21 April 1917 the Hull Daily Mail reported that Harry Mawer had notified his friends that he was to be awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal (D.C.M.). When the Hull Daily Mail reported, on 1 June 1917, that Harry was missing and perhaps a Prisoner of War reference was made again to a D.C.M. I have searched for other newspaper reports, looked through all his associated records, read through the citations for the D.C.M.s awarded to those in the East Yorkshire Regiment and

searched Commonwealth War Graves Commission records. It appears that although Harry and his family believed he was to be awarded the medal the award was never confirmed.

Harry's death is recorded in the Register of Effects as 'on or since 23 April 1917. Death presumed'. On other documentation it is states that he 'Died of Wounds'.

The 23rd April 1917 was the first day of the Second Battle of the Scarpe. The Scarpe is a river that runs through the town of Arras

and the fighting that took place there, including between the 9th April and 16 June 1917, was known as the Battle of Arras.

A contributor to an online discussion forum posted a direct report about that initial attack on that day stating that: 'A hundred yards distant from their own trenches the East Yorkshiremen ran into the British barrage, which was moving too slowly, and at once serious casualties were suffered. In the two flank Companies it was not long before every officer had been either killed or wounded, whilst many NCOs and other ranks had been hit. The enemy's machine gun fire also began to make itself felt. With every officer and nearly all their N.C.O. leaders gone, the flank Companies were in some confusion...'.

Harry's body was never found. His family remembered him on his older brother Charles's headstone which stands in

Killingholme churchyard. Charles had died in Barton in 1915 after moving there from East Halton but he was buried in Killinghome. This headstone gives Harry's age at death as 22. This is possibly because it wasn't until nearly a year after his death that Harry's Register of Effects was documented. Harry Mawer's name is also remembered on the Arras Memorial in Bay 4 and 5. This memorial commemorates nearly 35,000 soldiers of the United Kingdom, South Africa and New Zealand lost in battle. Most of those commemorated were killed during the Allied

offensive of the Battles of Arras in April and May 1917.

Dudley STRINGER, 2nd Lieutenant 10th Battalion; previously Company Sergeant Major 10/152, East Yorkshire Regiment. Killed in Action 3 May 1917. Aged 33 years. Born 1884 Hull. Son of late John Todd Stringer and Eleanor McGarr Stringer formerly of Goxhill. No known grave. Commemorated in Bay 4 and 5 on Arras Memorial, Pas de Calais, France.

Another of those named in Bay 4 and 5 of the Arras Memorial alongside Harry Mawer and who served, like Harry, in the East Yorkshire Regiment, is Dudley Stringer. Dudley isn't named on Goxhill's memorials but he has a strong connection to the village.

Dudley Stringer was the eighth of the twelve children of John and Eleanor Stringer. Possibly five of these twelve children, didn't survive beyond infancy. John Stringer had been a Master Mariner on ships sailing out of Hull. The 1891 census showed him living with his family in Hull. His youngest child, a son named Gordon, was born shortly after the census was taken but died before the year was out.

The next record for the Stringer family is the marriage of John Stringer's eldest daughter, Eleanor (Nellie), in Goxhill on 13

Eleanor married the Reverend William Seed, Vicar of Goxhill, who had been widowed five years previously. The vedding reception or William and Eleanor was held at her parent's home, West View. West View was at that

September 1893.

time one large house. Now two homes, one part of this house, a semi-detached home named The Fold is at the end of King Street and the other semi-detached home is accessed down Pidgeon Cote Lane from Church Side.

John Stringer, Dudley and Eleanor's father, died at West View on 2 December 1896. After her marriage Eleanor lived at The Vicarage on Howe Lane. Dudley Stringer is recorded in the 1901 census living with his widowed mother and three siblings at West View. He had joined the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway on 6 March 1899 working at Grimsby, Hull

and then Chesterfield. He resigned from the railway on the 18 September 1903.

Dudley married in Hull on 29 December 1908. In the 1911 census his wife Bertha and their son are listed living with Bertha's parents in Cottingham, Hull. I haven't been able to find a record for Dudley but do know, from the address on Dudley's Medal Rolls Index Card that Bertha continued to live in Cottingham before moving later to live near Liverpool.

From a range of sources I've discovered that Dudley joined the East Yorkshire Regiment as part of the Hull Pals Battalions at the outbreak of the war. He attained the rank of Company Sergeant Major before being promoted to 2nd Lieutenant. His Medals Rolls Index Card shows that he served in Egypt at the end of 1915. The Hull Pals had been sent to Egypt to defend the Suez Canal. They then sailed from Port Said, Egypt on 1 March 1916 for Marseilles before travelling by train to Northern France.

On 3 May 1917 all four Hull Battalions were involved in heavy fighting at Oppy Wood, part of the Battle of Arras. The website http://humberfirstworldwar.co.uk/1917/east-yorkshire-regiment-at-oppy-wood/

reports that this attack was known as the Third Battle of the Scarpe and that over 40% of those present on that day were killed or injured. Dudley lost his life ten days after Harry Mawer whilst fighting alongside his comrades in the trenches **Elizabeth Fincham** at Arras.


