



visitor. who works as a volunteer at the South Yorkshire Air Museum that houses the two engines from the crashed P38 Lockheed Lightening from which the propeller was used for Goxhill's Propeller Memorial, wanted to attend the Remembrance Day service at the Airfield. I agreed to pick him up from Barnetby Station and after the service he asked to see as much of the airfield buildings that we could get to. Eventually we stopped, facing an icy NW wind, by the beautiful fishing ponds that were created when the runways were dug up, a number of years ago. I explained, to his disappointment, that this was where the two main runways crossed but that none of the hard surface remains to be seen anymore. It has all gone back to its original use for agriculture. To paint a picture of what the runways were like, I told him a story about a donkey.

A few years after we moved to Goxhill, we were persuaded to take in a Cleethorpes' donkey for the winter and so 'Jacko' came to stay. He was quite happy in our barn, or on the lawn or any other grass we could put him on. My daughter even got a few free rides. However, in January we were going away for a week and Richard Faulding said we could bring Jacko to him where he had several Cleethorpes donkeys in a field on the south east corner of the airfield.



So my wife and I and our two children set off along one of the main runways. It was freezing with a bitterly cold wind howling from the north and we were literally dragging Jacko behind us. The runway was surprisingly wide and it rises up in the middle where the two main runways crossed, so you couldn't see to the other side. It was quite spooky because we imagined that a plane could suddenly appear from over this incline, landing or taking off, and we would have been right in its path. We felt very vulnerable in the vast scale of the runway and could sense the history of the place and imagine all the planes landing and taking off during the war, and the accidents. Eventually we reached the highest point of the runway and could see the hangers on the other side.

LETTER FROM THE VICARAGE

"The heavens declare the glory of God and the firmament proclaims his handiwork." (Psalm 19 vs. 1)

I've has a lifelong interest in astronomy and can recall as a teenager sitting on the roof of our shed and pondering the vastness of the night sky. Living on the very edge of a city meant that light pollution was not a great problem in observing the stars. Saying that, there was only so much that my naked eye (aided by my Dad's binoculars) could make out. Much of my knowledge of the heavens was gained through books. One planet that always fascinated me was Saturn: a gas 'giant' millions of miles away from us but uniquely beautiful because of the rings that surround its equator. Until August this year my knowledge of Saturn was purely second hand but while on holiday in Whitby all this changed. One evening the local Astronomical Society had set up several of their telescopes on the sea front and were inviting the curious to have a look. The telescopes were all pointing to a tiny, unremarkable speck of light to the south west. Upon looking through the telescope this speck of light was revealed to be the planet Saturn: I was thrilled to see first hand the tiny, but perfect, image of something I had known about but never seen.

As Christmas approaches once more and the old familiar stories are heard once again, we will hear of how some other stargazers came to the conclusion that something dramatic had happened miles away from where they lived. The awareness of this somehow compelled them to make the effort to investigate and to personally experience the events, which they believed their astronomical observations had revealed. Their knowledge thus became first hand - they saw, and they believed. In the fields around Bethlehem the shepherds were initially terrified when an angelic choir descended from heaven proclaiming 'glory to God in the highest'.

The glory of God is still, I believe, proclaimed through the beauty, majesty and complexity of his creation. We too are part of God's creation and we have the opportunity to glorify our maker not just with our words but with our actions, indeed with our whole lives.

The shepherds and the wise men returned to their normal lives after their first hand experiences of that first Christmas. Were they changed? We don't know, but it's hard to imagine their lives would ever have been the same again. Should Christmas change us? Definitely. Sadly many would define this change as increased stress experienced (especially in attempting to orchestrate the 'perfect' family celebration, whatever that might be!) Others will resign themselves to increased expenditure, which they may well be ill equipped to afford. Sadly, others will find relationships under strain and it's a sobering fact that divorce rates rise after a Christmas in which fragile relationships finally give way amidst all the pressure, which seems unavoidable.

Maybe if we were really to take the message of the angels to heart and strive to make peace on earth (at least to our little bit of it) a reality and to express goodwill to all people, then the glory of God really would shine forth this Christmas. Have a good one! **Rev. John Girtchen**







I was so looking forward to coming back to school after the long summer break; looking forward to another busy year and welcoming the children and all of our staff (especially those who had their babies in the last academic year), back. We had a really good first week and it was nice to see how eager and enthusiastic the children were in coming into school.

I have been saying for quite a while how very overdue our next Ofsted inspection was when on the Tuesday of the second week I get a phone call from Sophie at Ofsted informing me that Goxhill would be having a visit from an Ofsted inspector the very next day..... Mrs Rajinder Harrison came early on Wednesday morning and commenced what she described would be a very 'demanding' day! By mid-morning having met the staff, carried out a 'Learning Walk', scrutinized our assessment detail; looked at all of the records we retain and keep on each of the children's progress, we were all starting to relax in her company. There's something good about being challenged and given the opportunity to show all of the things we think we do well. It is also good to be given advice, e which is constructive and aimed at improving things which can be done better.

Mrs Harrison was very fair and myself, and all of our management team, certainly learned a lot form her experience and expertise. Her words on parting were that it was 'a pleasure to work with such a keen and interested team who were passionate about the children' in our care.

Short inspection of Goxhill Primary School

Following my visit to the school on 13 September 2017, I write on behalf of Her Majesty's Chief Inspector of Education, Children's Services and Skills to report the inspection findings. The visit was the first short inspection carried out since the school was judged to be good in November 2012.

This school continues to be good.

The leadership team has maintained the good quality of education in the school since the last inspection.

You, and your staff and governors, have high aspirations for the pupils in your care and you clearly want the best for them. Along with your passion to help pupils achieve well, you take good care of them and ensure that school improvement priorities are met effectively. Parents and pupils value the supportive and protective culture that permeates the school. Pupils feel safe and secure at school and thrive as a result, in both their learning and personal development. At the end of Year 6, when they leave your school, pupils are well prepared for secondary school and have the personal attributes to be good citizens in the future.

We were all so pleased and relieved that our long awaited Ofsted came out so positively! The whole Ofsted report is on our school's website.

As many of you know, Mr Travis has been back with us covering Mrs Trafford's maternity leave. He has made a very significant contribution to our school and I am happy to say that he has agreed to continue to help us out both here and at East Halton over the next few

terms. I asked Mr Travis to write about his recollections of the school when he first knew it and was involved with it and draw some comparisons of how it has changed over the years. Here is his contribution. **C Breslin**

I have known Goxhill Primary school since 1990 when as a "young" teacher at a nearby school, we would play sporting fixtures regularly and I remember always coming second to Goxhill whether it was football, netball or cross country! 27 years have passed and having attended discos, bingo evenings, shared residential visits and fayres. I was asked to work at the school from last January to cover a teacher who was on maternity leave. What a pleasurable 10 months it has been. Having started teaching the fantastic pupils in current Year 5, then moving to East Halton to teach Year 1 and 2 and then finally back to Goxhill to work with Year 3 - it is time to hang up my pen again! I would like to thank the fantastic headteacher, staff and pupils at both schools for their warmth, support and kindness. The school has changed considerably over the years, both in the buildings and the facilities. Generations of pupils come and go, having been given a fantastic start to their formal education at the school. The recent Ofsted celebrated the significance of the leaders in the school and the high expectations of all the staff - how true and accurate this is. What I also saw was how the care and guidance of the staff enables pupils to flourish and develop into fantastic ambassadors being proud of their school, their community and their achievements. As one pupil mentioned in the celebration assembly "It was a dream come true for me when I got full marks in the times table Rock stars test!"

Pupils enjoy and feel safe in their school. They have an important voice in the future of their education and what a great job class councillors and some of the older pupils do in helping with certain tasks in school. They proudly talk about their school, are involved in promoting good playtime behaviour through leading games and activities, resolving conflicts where possible, helping at lunchtime in the hall to promote good manners and an enjoyment of their food (fantastically cooked by Angie and her team). They help new pupils settle quickly and give a warm welcome to the many visitors who call into the school. Recently I asked Year 3 pupils, who was the most important person in the school? How refreshing that most of them knew that it was themselves (sorry to all the other important people!).

Pupils' achievements are valued and celebrated across the school and shown through the displays throughout the learning areas both in and around the school. The school has great facilities and an area currently being developed is an outdoor learning classroom akin to a Forest School. Children learn outdoor skills taught by enthusiastic and highly skilled staff. Additionally, the school utilises staff specialisms by employing curriculum experts in Science, music, PE and Technology to name just a few. This is unusual for a primary school as it is often seen as a Secondary School model of organisation. Children start school in the Nursery and Foundation unit, which is extremely well equipped and a stimulating environment to develop a love of learning. Throughout the classes in KS1 and KS2, staff value and encourage the pupils to grow and learn in a safe and

Holy Stones

During the summer, some of you have played a game with pretty stones, painting them and hiding them about the



village so that they could be found. When someone found a stone, they moved it to a new hiding place perhaps adding more colour for someone else to find. I wonder if during your search you noticed the Holy Stones that there are in the village. You will not find them in the Church Yard but they

are everywhere scattered about amongst the houses and the gardens. Go out and look and you can find evidence of the story of the English reformation amongst the stones which lie in our gardens.

The story begins back in the days of King Henry V111. The king needed a male heir but after some years of marriage to Queen Catherine of Aragon there was no male heir so Henry asked the Pope to annul the marriage so that he could have a new queen. The Pope refused to do this so Henry decided to establish a new church in England of which he would be the head and then he could grant his own wishes. Some people were quite happy with this but others were not and in 1536/7 an uprising began in Lincolnshire at Louth. The rebels marched from Louth to Caistor and then to Lincoln. The rebels were defeated and dispersed. Other uprisings and rebel marches in Yorkshire, Cumberland and Westmoreland followed, they became

known as the Pilgrimage of Grace and

were suppressed with great violence.

Henry and his Chief Minister Thomas Cromwell realised that the Abbeys and Monasteries were the centres of the dissent and required them to give assent to his becoming the head of the church. This many of them would not do and so soldiers were sent to destroy them. The Abbot and

not wish to change the religious beliefs, customs and worship of the Catholic Church only its leader. The Abbey was not destroyed and Henry with his new Queen Ann Boleyn visited and stayed at the Abbey which he renamed

as a college. Several monasteries became colleges but unfortunately their catholic beliefs and Henry's requirements were incompatible and they were closed and the buildings were sold. The memory of the college remains with us in the names College Road and College Bridge.

After the Abbey site and the buildings were sold they were owned by several people but unfortunately none of them found a profitable use for them. There was one very inconvenient fact and that was, that to build with stone you need skilled stone masons. There were no stone masons within travelling distance of the site and so the Abbey and the surrounding buildings became a quarry for building materials which could be sold and carried away to make buildings elsewhere. Some of the stone was used in the building of the sluice at South Ferriby and after the site was bought by Charles the 1st Baron Yarborough, Newsom bridge was built with Abbey stone.

The Abbey was not constructed solely from solid blocks of stone basically the buildings consisted of an inside and an outside layer of dressed blocks with the space between



them filled with small stones, off cuts and rubble. Whilst the stone blocks could be sold the small stuff was left on site but this became very useful locally because it is excellent for making the foundations of roads and farm vards and the floors of houses and other buildings. Local people either bought or obtained permission to take cart loads of this broken stone. However, once this had begun people from the surrounding villages began to take the stone for themselves and larger pieces found their way onto the carts for use in floors and foundations. Large quantities of stone were taken. In order to stop this from happening Lord Yarborough appointed a man to live with his family in a cottage close to the abbey grounds as a care taker. In 1938 the fifth Earl of Yarborough passed the care of the remains of the abbey to His Majesty's Office of Works. The site is now in the care of English Heritage and is open to the public. English Heritage has done a great deal of work to make the Abbey and the Gatehouse easily accessible. Archaeological work is carried out during the summer months by Sheffield University. A visit to the site is an interesting and pleasant experience. It is however sad to reflect that there are probably more Holy Stones in the houses and gardens of the surrounding villages than there are at present on the Abbey site. **Maurice Brawn**

Update from National Grid River Humber Gas Pipeline Replacement Project

TUNNEL BORING MACHINE DELIVERY

Winter is an exciting time on the project as we are getting close to the start of tunnelling under the River Humber.

In early December we will take delivery of our Tunnel Boring Machine (TBM) at our site in Goxhill. The TBM is a highly specialised machine and it is essential to our project as it will construct our five kilometre long tunnel under the River Humber. It's also a big and heavy piece of equipment – over 180 metres long when fully assembled!

For the journey from the factory in Germany where it has been built, to Rotterdam then across to Immingham and here to Goxhill, the TBM has been disassembled and will be shipped in pieces. When all the parts arrive at Goxhill it will be re-assembled ready for its yearlong journey excavating the tunnel beneath the Humber to Paull on the north side.

The four largest sections of the TBM will be delivered to our site in two separate deliveries on **Tuesday 5th December and Wednesday 6th December**. The deliveries will be moving through Goxhill between **10am – 3pm**. As the vehicles are slow-moving, we would like to give advance notice that there will be some delays to motorists during this time. The delivery vehicles will then leave Goxhill between **5pm - 8pm** via the same route.

The four largest sections of the TBM will travel from Immingham Docks to Goxhill along the A15 and B1206 via Barrow upon Humber. They will then progress along College Road, entering Goxhill via Thornton Road and on to our site via Ferry Road and East Marsh Road. This route has been carefully planned and agreed with the highway authorities and the police to ensure it is safe and suitable for the transportation of the TBM. No parking will be permitted on the route. The delivery vehicles will also be escorted by Police officers.

Keeping in touch. We will be writing to local residents in advance of the delivery to provide further information, including confirmation of timings.

We've been here before!

This week I have had a feeling of 'de j vu', I met with an engineer and colleagues at the playing field, as I

was walking across the field, I remembered the young people who

we met at that time nearly two years ago, we discussed with them their choice for an ideal Skate park, they must think by now that we didn't care, and that we weren't serious with our promises to develop their very sensible and well thought out ideas. We did try

very hard at that time, but things like this, no matter how hard we try, or how much we do to prove or justify our aims, do not always work out, so here we are again. Colleagues, a new engineer, a representative from the School, and a group of excited young people with their ideas, a brand new design and a new position.

It is understandable that some residents are wary of this type of project, with the belief that they attract problems and unsociable behaviour, but one could attach the same objections to any outside gathering, or any facility provided for any outside sporting activity. But anti-social behaviour, together with damage to property is, and has, already taken place on the Playing field, and other public spaces, on a regular basis, if no one sees this, or if they do, do not report it, sadly it will continue. We should never let this minority spoil it for everyone else, months of hard work has already gone into this project and I hope that this time it will mean success. From raising the funds through grant applications, and adding this to the finance already held ready in the youth fund, the cost should be fully covered.

I think that it is most important to provide local facilities for outside exercise and enjoyment for the young of our village, this way they do not have to find transport to use facilities provided in other areas; they can be active near to home, surely that is exactly what the Playing field is for. But it is equally important that we take into account the many different views, and it is with this in mind that we have sourced a new design which together with the re siting should reduce any noise created, we have also reconsidered the access to give a good clear route for the safety of users.

On the Humber Bank

As I look out over the Humber Estuary in Goxhill I see no barges or other traffic on the water as we were used to watching years ago. So I read the piece written by my late husband and thought you might like to read

Things I remember seeing on the Humber Bank in the 1930's

We watched barges plying up and down the river; one barge with an engine would be towing 2 or 3 more; they were loaded and so low in the water, we were surprised they did not sink



of Hull, probably up to 10 at a time if the tide was right. One day while watching them steam down river towards Spurn Point with black smoke coming out of their funnels, we

trawlers going out





The Danish 'Butter boats' that would come several times a week bringing butter and bacon from Denmark.

One day while passing Salt End Jetty one of them sank; we could see masts and funnel sticking out of the water at low tide.

Eventually barrels of butter and sides of bacon were washed up on our side of the river. Police and Customs officers visited our houses to ask if we had found anything. We were warned that if we did we must report it. In the end the ship was blown up as it was a hazard to shipping. Every day dredgers could be heard dredging across at the docks. At high tide the dredgers would come out into the river, anchoring in different places. At highest tide they all sounded their sirens and unload into the



river. I was told it was done then because the tide would start running out and any mud held in suspension would be swilled down with the outgoing tide.

If you go onto the Humber Bank at Goxhill Haven and turn right to where there is a bend in the river, a lot of stone can be seen at low tide. We used to search amongst it and find tools such as hammers, pincers etc. Looking back this was an interesting time of my life.

The school I attended in Goxhill was at the junction of Howe Lane and Thorn Lane (it still stands today, but is no longer a school).

Thorn Lane was at that time only the width of one vehicle. A row of cottages faced onto Howe Lane. These were demolished shortly after the war and the road widened. When I was about ten years old (1937), I remember returning to school after the holidays, to find

the road widened, and our playground reduced in size. I also remember walking home down Middle Marsh Road, where trees were being planted. I was pleased when one of the men stopped me and allowed me to help plant one of the trees. I still remember that 'my tree' was the third one from Green Lane entrance on the right hand side going towards the village. The Tree planting could have been in commemoration of either the Jubilee of King George V, or more likely the Coronation of George VI. **By Dennis Percy**



SHOPS IN GOXHILL etc - part 3

Further research collated by Elizabeth Fincham following the article on Shops in Goxhill in the Spring 2017 issue of the Gander, collated in response to memories provided by her Dad, Bryan Giles.

One photograph, in the initial article 'Shops in Goxhill' (Spring 2017), in particular sparked a raft of memories for my Dad; the Wardle family, pictured in front of their business in Chapel Street.



T. K. Wardle, the butcher, was Thomas Kirkby Wardle. He had been born in Bonby, as a young man had worked as a Waggoner on a farm at Melton Ross, but in the summer of 1908 had married Alice Naylor of Goxhill. At the 1911 census he is listed working as a Ship Plate Riveter and living in Goxhill with Alice and their two small children Vera and Frank. *In the photograph* Thomas is standing, wearing the hat, with Alice by his side. Frank is by the van door and the small boy with him is Thomas and Alice's youngest child, Wilf. Wilf was born in 1922, some twelve years after his older brother Frank.

Thomas Wardle was in direct competition with another butcher, Tommy Thompson, who ran his business from the premises opposite London House, now called King's Well, and previously mentioned as owned by the Raby family. Tommy too was a farmer and butcher. Dad recollects that Tommy Thompson was so successful that Thomas Wardle couldn't sustain his business against the competition. Thomas Wardle, he says, closed his shop and went to work for Tommy. The Wardle family ultimately lived at Rosegarth, The Square, Thomas died in 1936 when his youngest son, Wilf, was only 13 years old.

Tommy Thompson married his housekeeper and when he died his wife became Mrs Wharton (her second husband was called Ray). They lived in a house past Creasey's shop on the corner of Stothard's Lane. I always remember it because they had a high, opaque glass fence and an aviary in the garden. They later had a bungalow built opposite, in Stothard's Lane. Dad also remembers a Tom Plumtree working in the butcher's shop. Ray Wharton worked occasionally in the shop but it was run by Jim and Mary Sobey who lived in the house attached to the business. I remember Uncle Jim and Auntie Mary being very involved in the Royal British Legion; the Remembrance Day parade to the

British Legion Parade, late 1940s early 50s. Francis Nottingham leading, Mr Stubbs carrying flag, Jim Austin in light coloured jacket, Albert Giles two behind Jim Austin? If you can identify others, please contact the editor.

church started from King's Well.

To return to the Wardle family. Frank went on to own and run car showroom and repair shops in Barrow and on Howe Lane in Goxhill. The Goxhill premises was sold to Ron Parker and Fred Hilton (father of Margaret Hedley who used to live in the village). They then sold on to Nigel Green and it is now run by Andy Holtby. Frank married Vera Moore of Goxhill and they had two children, Rosalie who I remember being a Theatre Sister at Scunthorpe hospital and John who ran the car business, started by his father, in Barrow. At some point, Dad remembers. Frank built a house on land which backs onto the butcher's business but standing on Howe Lane. It is called Torridon and named, he believes, in memory of a crash, on 14 March 1951, in a remote area near the town of Torridon in the highlands of Scotland. The plane involved was a Type B.III

Lancaster bomber modified for maritime reconnaissance purposes. I will return to this later, to explain the significance. The Wardle's eventually lived at New Hall on Howe Lane. My biggest memory of this house is a huge fete held during the mid '60s held in the field, in front of the house, now St Michael's Court, where the guest of honour was Pat Phoenix (Elsie Tanner of Coronation Street) see opposite. I presented a bouquet to her on that day.



Vera, Frank's older sister, married Jack Mellers (who initially ran a Petrol Station at the Howe Lane/Thorn Lane junction). I remember them living at Mayfield (the previously mentioned John Davey's house). Jack also had the garage opposite St Michael's Court, with land adjacent where the Coop now stands. I think he also went on to own West's garage on Howe Lane. Nigel Green later owned this business, next to Well House. Mr and Mrs Mellers built a bungalow on their land next to Mayfield which now houses the village surgery. One of their daughters, Enid, married Doug Wright who later ran the garage opposite St Michael's Court. Their eldest son James lives in the old school on Thorn Lane, opposite Mayfield, his maternal grandparents' home.

I would like at this point, being shortly after Remembrance Day, to return to Wilf Wardle. His name is listed on the World War 2 plaque at the Memorial Hall and also on his parents' headstone in Goxhill cemetery.

1475510 Leading Aircraftman Wilf Wardle served in the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve. He was attached to Bomber Command 149 Squadron servicing, towards

the end of World War 2, Avro Lancaster B.I and B.III bombers. Research on the RAF's own website reveals that the Command's last bombing missing had been 22nd April 1945 and their last mission before VE Day was on 7th May 1945 when twenty four Lancaster Bombers dropped food supplies to the Dutch at Goudank. So why, I wondered was Wilf in the air over France on 5th June 1945? A Google search explains that it was the day of the signing of The Berlin Declaration, by the United States of America, USSR, France and Britain, confirming the legal dissolution of Nazi Germany. Also on Google, an RAF Forum discussion thread reveals further information:

`At 2000ft the aircraft suddenly went into a steep dive but pilot was able to flatten this out before the starboard outer wing and engine fractured and broke away from the aircraft, which then crashed into the ground, burst into flames and was destroyed. The accident is thought to have been caused by a failure of the auto pilot. There was one survivor from the 11 on board.

A further thread reveals:

'Wilfred was not aircrew at all. He was a ground crew, and for the PoWs repatriation flights, No. 149 Squadron

a dearly loved son a brother WILFRED HERBERT WARDLE RAFVE enho gave his life over France DUNE SIN1945 AGED 22 YEARS & was interred of Lille Greater lave hath no man Than this. also of AMCE WARDLE devoted wife a mother.
WHO DIED MAY 25% 1987

despatched a few ground crews at Juvincourt airfield, in France, where they refuelled the Lancasters and checked everything was right. From mid-1940 onwards, all aircrews were at least Sergeant. He was a Leading Aircraftman, so not aircrew. When the PoWs repatriation flights

ended, Lancasters were sent there to retrieve the ground crews and bring them back to Mildenhall. This is how Wilfred unfortunately lost his life, when the Lancaster in which he was a passenger crashed not very far from Vitry-en-Artois airfield. The only survivor of the 11 men onboard was another ground crew, John E. FARLEY, who had swapped position with the regular rear gunner after take-off.

In the thread a responder, who states that he is Wilf's great, great nephew, explains that he has been told that Wilf had been the rear gunner and had volunteered for

A tragic end of the life of a young man at the end of the war in Europe. Dad believes that Frank named the house he built

'Torridon' because there was some connection between Wilf and the eight men killed on that crash in 1951. Wilf is buried in the Lille Southern Cemetery, Northern France.

You would attend local calls - our branch covers Goxhill, Barrow and New Holland - to provide whatever help you can until an ambulance arrives.

It costs several thousand pounds a year to run each group. This includes affiliation to LIVES for accreditation. renewal of medical equipment, replacement of medical consumables as they are used, oxygen supplies and the mobile phone bill. The local group is very grateful to everyone who provides a donation or raises funds for it, whether through organized events like Mr & Mrs Cooke's strawberry teas, individual donations or loose change in a collection box.

Goxhill has been fortunate in having several dedicated, long-term volunteers but also seeks new recruits. No medical experience is necessary and full training is provided without charge to the volunteer. Having more volunteers not only allows the provision of better coverage - ideally 24 hours for 365 days per annum but spreads the load and makes it easier for people to fit being a responder into their own personal circumstances.



Lawn bowling is suitable for all ages, abilities and fitness levels - at Goxhill our oldest regular player is in his late eighties. Most of the time we play in triples (teams of three players) so newcomers have the support of more experienced bowlers. League matches normally involve 3 or 4 triples from each club, start at 6.30pm and last about two hours. Upcoming matches are listed in the pavilion window for you to walk in and read; typically one to three each week will be home matches.



Anyone is welcome to watch all or part of a match, as long as you are content to do so in a polite and restrained manner (chanting has not yet caught on for bowling). We have

bench seats, complete with cushions, in our pavilion which offers a bit of shelter from any breeze or rain; scoreboards show how games are progressing on each rink. If the scoring or rules are unclear to you then there will very likely be some non-playing club members watching and happy to tell you what's happening.

Ofsted confirm Baysgarth School is in the top 10% of schools nationally

An Ofsted Section 5 monitoring visit to Baysgarth School on Tuesday 3rd October 2017 concluded that the school 'has gone from strength to strength' and is making 'good progress on the journey to outstanding'. Her Majesty's Inspectors, Bernard Campbell and Michele Costello, visited lessons and spoke to students, Governors and school leaders. They also took account of the 146 responses from parents, 73 responses from staff and 82 responses from students to their online

They concluded that students are well cared for in the school, remarking that 'The school provides strong support for pupils' mental and emotional health and wellbeing ... Pupils say they feel safe and that bullying is dealt with well.'

questionnaires.

In terms of student achievement, Ofsted reported that 'Overall progress was in the top 10% nationally ... [and] current pupils are making strong progress in all year groups.' 

THE VILLAGE LET DOWN BY NORTH LINCS COUNCIL - FAILING TO PREVENT KEIGAR DEVELOPING THE BROCK!

Friends of the Brock, which became Goxhill Community Pub Limited (GCPL), have gone through two Complaint stages against North Lincolnshire Council because GCPL believe the Council failed to use the powers it had at its disposal to support its own stated wish for the Brock to be sold back to the community.

Complaint to the Ombudsman

Having failed to get any satisfaction from the Complaints process, GCPL have now taken it to the next stage which is to complain to the Local Government Ombudsman. A detailed submission with all the facts and what we, as a village, did to save the Brock, was submitted. But the complaint is particularly that it was North Lincs Council's Planning Committee that made the S106 agreement with Keigar to enable the village to buy the Brock back from Keigar, but failed to make it enforceable. The village did more than anyone could have expected to raise the funds to buy it back and have plans in place for a full refurbishment as a family pub with restaurant. But in the end Keigar simply said it was no longer for sale. There was nothing the village, or apparently North Lincs Council, could do about it.

The complaint to the Ombudsman has resulted in an

investigator being appointed to carry out an extensive investigation of what the Council did or didn't do as their part of this sad process which has left Goxhill without its pub, a registered Community Asset. The Ombudsman has said they will be in contact again in 20 working days, which would bring it to November 28th. So keep your fingers and everything else crossed, that they will agree with our complaint and force North Lincolnshire Council to take action to compensate the village.

Goxhill Community Pub Limited is still alive

Most of the original shareholders have retained a share in the company so that they are in a better position to act if the opportunity to get a family pub back in the village, arises in the future.
